Milan, Octob. 17. N. S.

ON the Thirteenth Instant, in the Evening, his Catholick Majesty arriv'd at this Place, and was receiv'd with a triple Discharge of our Cannon, and the general Acclamations of all the People, who were assembled in an extraordinary manner on this Occasion. His Majesty was met by his Royal Highness the Duke of Savoy, at a Place call'd la Cava, on the Road leading from Genoa to this City. After a short Conference between those two Princes, wherein they made to each other the most solemn Professions of an extraordinary Affection and Esteem, they separated; His Majesty continuing his Journey to Pavia, where he Din'd, and the Duke of Savoy returning to Turin. On the Fourteenth, his Majesty went on Foot to our Cathedral-Church, where he was receiv'd by the Cardinal our Archbishop, at the Head of the Clergy, who conducted him to the High-Altar; after which, *Te Deum* was sung for his Majesty's safe Arrival at this Place. On the Sixteenth, in the Morning, an Expre's came hither from Frankfort, with the acceptable News of his Majesty's Promotion to the Empire; whereupon he has been Complimented by our Magistrates and the Nobility, as well as by all the Strangers of Distinction, of whom there is at present a numerous Concourse in this City. The Emperor has appointed the Count Uberto Stampa to carry the News of his Election to the Court at Barcelona. His Majesty proposeth to reside here till towards the End of this Month; at which time he will proceed to Inspruck, and from thence to Frankfort, in order to receive the Imperial Crown at that Place. They write from Rome, That the Pope continues highly incens'd against Signior Molinos, on account of his late Conduct, notwithstanding all the Endeavours of the Cardinal de la Tremouille; who, in a late Conference on the Tenth Instant, pleaded much in his behalf. This Inflexibility in the Pope, is chiefly attributed to the great Indifference Signior Molinos shews on this Occasion: for tho' the Pope has forbidden him to say Mass, and given several other Instances of his Displeasure, he has made no steps towards a Submission, but continues to justify his own Behaviour, and depend on his Master, the Duke of Anjou's Protection.

Coire, Octob. 20. N. S. Mr. Masner's Friends have complain'd, that the late Tribunal at Ilantz acted with more Severity against him than his Case requir'd; notwithstanding which, we are told that the French Ambassador seems dissatisfied at their Proceedings in that Affair, declaring, that he only desired the Punishment of his Person, which they have suffer'd to escape, and not the Confiscation of his Estate, and Ruin of his Family. As the Process form'd against him has been Printed by Order of the late Tribunal, Mr. Masner is soliciting the Uni-

versity of Tubingen in Suabia to declare that it is faulty, and without due Proofs in every Particular. His Lady is likewise gone to Milan, in order to throw herself at his Catholick Majesty's Feet upon his Arrival at that Place, and implore his Protection. On the other hand we hear, that General Buol, Colonel of the Garrison Regiment in the Dutchy of Milan, has receiv'd Orders from this Government to represent to his Majesty the State of the Cafe, and their Reasons for proceeding in the Manner they have done against Mr. Masner. The Baron de Greuth, the Imperial Envoy to this State, having been absent about four Months, return'd hither some time since from Vienna. Notwithstanding it was lately thought that Monsieur de Sais, Envoy from this Place to the States-General, would be recall'd home, we are now assur'd that he is to continue some time longer at the Hague.

Brussels, Oct. 29. N. S. On the Twenty-seventh Instant the Prussian Forces, consisting of eleven Regiments of Horse, and fifteen Battalions, march'd through this Place in their way to the Winter-Quarters that have been assign'd them between the Meuse and the Rhine. They write from Lisle, that the Prince of Holstein-Beck, Governour of that Place, return'd hither on Sunday last from Aix la Chapelle. Part of the Garrison belonging to Lisle are already arriv'd, the rest being this Day expected, together with a large Convoy of Forage and Ammunition from Ghent. These Letters add, that on the Twenty-seventh the Duke of Wirtemberg made a Forage in the Neighbourhood of Ipres, without receiving any Disturbance from the Enemy. The same Evening the Deputies of the States-General arriv'd there from the Army; and it is expected that the Magistracy of Lisle will be renew'd on Monday or Tuesday next by those Ministers.

Falmouth, Octob. 27. Yesterday arriv'd the Sarah-Gally, of and for London from Jamaica in eight Weeks, Paul Surrel, Master.

Falmouth, Octob. 29. Yesterday sail'd the David and Joseph, of and for London from Virginia, without Convoy, William Arnold, Master.

Dartmouth, Octob. 30. A Dutch Convoy being in Torbay with several Merchant-Ships bound for Holland, the Elizabeth, Good-luck (Captain Hammill) which was re-taken some time since by a Dutch Privateer, and brought into this Harbour laden with Sugar from the West-Indies, and now clear, sail'd out of this Port, and is gone for Torbay, to join the Convoy bound for

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Plymouth, Octob. 30. Yesterday came in the David and Joseph; of and for London, William Arnold, from Virginia; since which she is drove ashore, and Bilg'd. This Day came in Her Majesty's Ships the York, Chichester, and Cumberland, from cruising.

Deale, Novemb. 1. We have here, the Crown, Monk, Centurion, Winchester, Litchfield, Lark, Bedford-Gally, Pearl, Le Moor, Mary-Gally, Queen's Ships. Outward-bound, Nathaniel — Negus for the East-Indies, Samuel — Smeaton for Madaras, Prince-George — Studman for Leghorne, Dispatch-Pacquet — Hooper for Falmouth. Yesterday in the Afternoon came down the Mediterranean — Clark for Venice, and Fame-Gally — Saunders for Leghorne. Also Nine Ships from Arch-Angel, with Stores for Portsmouth and Plymouth.
