Berlin, Oct. 27. N. S.

**O**N the Fourteenth Instant a French Abbot arrived here from Hanover, and went from hence the Friday following to Dantzick. On the Twenty-third, in the Evening, General Fleming came hither from the Camp before Stralsund. He saw no one of the Court, nor made any Stay here, but departed immediately from hence, in order to wait on his Czarish Majesty at Torgow. The next Morning Monsieur Wibe, one of the King of Denmark's Privy-Council, arriv'd here likewise from Pomerania, together with Baron Schack his Danish Majesty's Envoy to the King of Poland, Monsieur Marshall the Prussian Envoy to the said Prince, and Monsieur Manteuffel, the King of Poland's Minister at this Court. Monsieur Wibe was introduced to his Majesty the same Morning, and went from hence in the Afternoon with Baron Schack, both those Ministers having receiv'd Orders from his Danish Majesty, to attend likewise on the Czar of Muscovy. They write from the Camp before Stralsund, That, according to the Report of several Deserters, Provisions begin to grow exceeding scarce in that Place. This Consideration, and the Difficulties the Suedes will find in throwing any Supplies into the Town, give the Allies a promising Prospect of Success in their Attempts against it, notwithstanding the Inconveniences of the Season, which is already far advanced. The Danish Train of Artillery being arriv'd at a Place near Grypswald, the King of Poland made a Present of six of his finest Horses, richly harness'd, to General Scholten, who first sent his Majesty Advice of it. These Letters add, That that Prince had receiv'd an Express from the Crown-Generall, importing, that the Grand Signior has acknowledg'd his Majesty for lawful King of Poland; for which News, it is expected that all the Artillery in the Camp will be Discharged. The Suedes have had several small Frigats cruising off Stralsund, in order to preserve a Communication with that City, and the Isle of Rugen; but it is thought the Arrival of the Danish Fleet on that Coast will soon destroy the said Communication between those two Places.

*Frankfort, October 18. N. S.* The Elector of Mayence left this Place on the Twenty-fifth Instant, and will not return hither till his Imperial Majesty has fix'd the Day for his Coronation at this Place. The Elector Palatin is gone from hence to Swetzingen, a small Town about three Leagues from Heidelberg; the Elector of Treves is likewise remov'd to the same Place, and it is believ'd both those Princes will continue there the greatest part of the Hunting Season. They write from Spire, that the Army of the Enemy began to separate, in order to march into their Winter-Quarters. They have fix or seven thousand Men in Alsace, where we hear they are to be Quarter'd this Winter. The Marechal d'Harcourt is already gone from the Army, and is

set out for the French Court, whither he is likewise follow'd by the Marechal de Bezons, who has left the Forces to the Command of the Count de Bourg. Signior Albani, the Pope's Nephew, return'd hither some time since from Swetzingen, where he has been to confer with the Elector Palatin. Immediately upon his Arrival here, he was visited by the Plenipotentiaries of Saxony and Bohemia, soon after which he set out for Cologn; from whence we are advis'd, that he staid but one Night there, having receiv'd an Express from the Pope, requiring him to return without delay to Rome. Count Kinski, Vicechancellor of Bohemia, and the second Plenipotentiary for that Kingdom, is gone from hence to Spire, and most of the other Ministers, that assisted here at the late Election, have likewise left this Place, but propose to be present at the Coronation of the new Emperor; and it is expected, that upon the Return of the Express sent lately from hence to his Imperial Majesty, we shall know what Day is appointed for the performance of that Solemnity. They write from Dresden, that the Hereditary Prince of Muscovy was Marry'd to the young Princess of Wolfenbuttel, on the Twenty-fifth Instant at Torgow, from which Place his Czarish Majesty is preparing to depart, in order to return into his own Dominions.

*Bristol, November 5.* Yesterday came in the St. Francis, of and from the Groin, in thirty Days, and brought over with him Captain Joseph Ruddock, Commander of the Alexander Frigate of this Port, who was Taken by a Dunkirk Privateer of thirty Guns, in his Passage from Kinsale to Lisbon, laden with Corn, and carried into the Groin. Captain Ruddock himself was Wounded, as were likewise several of his Men, and two were Kill'd. The Privateer had thirteen Men Kill'd, and seventeen Wounded. Her Majesty's Ships the Hastings and Lizard, are in Kingroad, with several Outward-bound Merchant-men.

*Hampton-Court, November 6.* Monsieur Lieth, Envoy Extraordinary from the Czar of Muscovy, had this Day his first private Audience of Her Majesty; to which he was introduc'd by the Right Honorable Henry St. John, Esq; One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cottrel, Master of the Ceremonies.
