Orders have been given here for the speedy Recruiting the Regiments which are in Hungary; and as this Court are under no Apprehensions of any farther Commotions in that Country, it is believ'd several of those Regiments are intended to reinforce the Army on the Rhine against the next Campaign. Yesterday Monsieur VVyberg, the King of Denmark's Envoy Extraordinary, set out from hence for Milan, in order to compliment the Emperor in his Master's Name; and several other Persons of Distinction are preparing to depart from hence for Inspruck, upon Advice, that his Imperial Majesty is expected there towards the End of this Month. It is believ'd his Majesty will not continue long at that Place; for which Reason, the Officers of his Household are order'd to repair forthwith to Frankfort. No Day is yet fixed for the Coronation; but this Court are employ'd in providing the Sums necessary to defray the Expences of that Solemnity. Several great Remittances have already been made for that Service; and some Persons have engaged for all the rest upon certain Conditions, which it is believ'd here will be readily approv'd by his Imperial Majesty.

Dresden, Octob. 23. N. S. Our Letters from Poland advise, that a Contagious Distemper has carry'd off great Numbers of the Inhabitants of Lublin, and begins to appear at Mohilow in Lithuania, and in the Neighbourhood of that Place. The Senate have sent a Deputation to the King of Poland, wherein they represent to his Majesty, the Hardships impos'd on the several Palatinates through which the Muscovite Forces are marching under the Command of General Bayer, in order to join his Czarish Majesty's Troops in Pomerania. They complain, that those Forces observe no Discipline; that they exact large Supplies of Forage and Provisions in their March, and oblige the Poles to furnish Draught-Horses for all their Waggons. These Letters add, that the Army under the Command of the Crown-General continues encamp'd on the Frontiers, where they suffer much from the Severity of the Season; but it is believ'd, that they will not

break up from thence, till an Answer is return'd to the Letters sent some time since to the Grand Vizir, relating to the King of Sueden's Passage into his own Dominions. As it is uncertain what Resolution will be taken by the Turks in that Affair, the necessary Orders are given for the Defence of the Passes, if there should be Occasion; and the Muscovite Generals are directed in that Case, to assist the Forces of the Republick. Some Advices tell us, that the Grand Vizir had propos'd to the King of Sueden to return home through Transilvania; but his Majesty has not yet thought fit to declare himself on that Point; and in Case the King shall insist upon a Passage through Poland, the Convoy appointed for that Purpose, will be directed to attend him no farther than to Lemberg.

Hamburgh, Octob. 30. N. S. They write from the Camp before Stralsund, that the Czar of Muscovy is speedily expected in Pomerania, in order to have an Interview with the Kings of Denmark and Poland; notwithstanding which, we have some Letters from Torgow advising, that his Czarish Majesty propos'd to go directly to Elbing, and proceed from thence into his own Dominions. The Hereditary Prince of Muscovy will continue in Germany this Winter, and remove with his Princess, in the Spring, to Moscow. All our Letters from Pomerania agree, that the Suedish Garrison in Stralsund is very much in want of Provisions; and, that several of the Soldiers die suddenly there as well as in the Camp of the Danes. The Kings of Denmark and Poland are frequently in Conference together, and Orders have been sent to hasten the March of the Muscovites under the Command of General Bayer. The Approach of those Troops gives some Umbrage to several Courts in the Empire; and we hear the Count de Welfeck has been dispatch'd from Vienna to the Czar of Muscovy, in order to induce that Prince to countermand 'em.

Bristol, November 7. Last Night came in the Anne-Sloop of Boston, VVilliam Everton Master, in thirteen Days from Fiall. Her Majesty's Ships the Hastings and Lizard are in Kingroad, and the Sarah and Hannah of London, Thomas Markin Master, for

for Virginia; with several other Outward-bound Merchant-men.

Deal, Novemb 8. The Ships mention'd in my last to be remaining are still here. And Yesterday in the Afternoon came down Her Majesty's Ship the *Ruffel*, as did also the Venetian-Gally from the Streights, and the Providence for Guinea. Yesterday in the Afternoon came in hither the Anne-Gally from Lisbon; and this Morning came in Her Majesty's Ship the Hampshire.
