**O**UR Letters of the Twenty-sixth Instant from Paris, advise, That frequent Expresses pass from the French Court to those of the Duke of Anjou, and the late Elector of Bavaria, and that the Ministers have been employ'd in providing Means for the Subsisting of their Forces with Bread and Forage, during the Winter-Season. After several Proposals receiv'd on that Head, a Contract has been made with some Persons, who have undertaken that Service, and are to be paid in certain Proportions, by the Money arising out of the ordinary Revenues, and the Tax of the Tenth-peny. Notwithstanding the many Expedients that have been enter'd into on that Account, they continue to meet with great Opposition in the Levying that Tax; and there is in general so great a Scarcity of Money throughout the Kingdom, that it is certain, the Sums necessary for the present Exigencies will not be rais'd without many Difficulties. According to these Letters, an Express is arriv'd at Court from the Duke of Vendome, and has brought the King an Account of an Interview he has lately had with the Count de Staremberg, which it is generally believ'd, regarded only the Exchange of Prisoners. The Duke of Vendome expects speedily to be reinforc'd by a Detachment of Ten thousand Men out of Dauphine; from whence they write, that the Army under the Command of the Duke of Berwick, having consum'd all the Forage in the Valleys of Oulx and Pragelas, were separated and gone into Winter-Quarters that have been assign'd them by that General, who is speedily expected at Court, where he will endeavour to prevent the making any such Detachment from those Forces into Catalonia. These Advices add, that the French have made themselves Masters of Castell-leon, a small Fort in the Valley of Aran, obliging the Garrison to remain Prisoners of War for six Months, after which they have Capitulated to be restor'd. The Marquis de Bay having been supplied with Money from Madrid, is march'd with the Army under his Command, towards the Frontiers of Portugal. On the other hand, the Portuguese are assembling their

Forces, and preparing to oppose him. The Duke of Anjou was to set out with his Court on the Twenty-fourth Instant, from Corella to Madrid, where he proposeth to reside during the Winter. They write from Lisbon, that the Portuguese had fitted out Thirty Ships for Barbary, whither they were to Sail under the Convoy of four Men of War, in order to freight themselves with Corn in that Country: But as there are several French Privateers Cruising in the Streights Mouth, they are not without some Apprehensions for those Ships. The Dutchess of Lorraine was deliver'd on the Fifteenth Instant at Night, of a young Princess at Luneville. The French Army being separated, we hear the Mareschal de Villars is going to the Waters at Bourbon, where he intends to continue some time, before he returns to the French Court. All the Troops, of which the Army of the Allies was compos'd this Campaign in Flanders, are marching to their respective Quarters; and the Regiment of Westerlo is order'd to Ghent.

*Plymouth, November 9.* This Day sail'd Her Majesty's Ships the Chichester, Cumberland and Suffolk; to the Eastward; with the Leyfield from the Canaries, and Hannah from this Place, both for London; and two Vessels for Topsham.

*Yarmouth, November 9.* This Morning sail'd hence the Wright and Mercury Gallies of London, laden with Herrings for the Streights; as did also at the same time, several Coasters to the Southward, under Convoy of one of Her Majesty's Ships. Yesterday came into our Road the Hazard of this Town, John Bateman Master, from Norway, bound for London. Several of Her Majesty's Ships continue in our Road.

*Bristol, November 10.* This Day came in the Minerva Gally of Glasgow, Archibald Mac Neale Commander, in twenty-two days from Cadiz. Her Majesty's Ships the Hastings and Lizard, with several Outward-bound Merchant-men, continue in Kingroad, being detain'd by contrary Winds.

*Deale, Nov. 11.* Yesterday Her Majesty's Ship the Ruffel sail'd towards the River, and the Dragon to Harwich; at the same time came down the Portugal Gally for Lisbon, and the St. George for Ireland: so that

that we have at present in the Downs, Her Majesty's Ships the Berwick, Breda, Mountague, Monk, Canterbury, Centurion, Newcastle, Hampshire, Falkland, Pearl, and Mary-Gally: Likewise Outward-bound, the Nathaniel for the East-Indies, the Samuel for Maderas, the Prince-George for the Mediterranean, the Fame and Incomparable for the Streights, the Dispatch-Packet for Falmouth, the Susannah for Oporto, the Portugal-Gally for Lisbon, and the Saint George for Ireland: Besides, nine Store-Ships from Russia, and some Coasters.

*The Principal Officers and Commissioners of Her Majesty's Navy, having receiv'd a Letter, dated at London the 5th Instant, without any Name or Letters to it, giving an Account of Alterations frequently made of Seamen's Tickets, to render them payable by the late Act of Parliament: These are to give notice to the Person that wrote the said Letter, that if he will attend the said Board, and discover any such Abuses, he shall receive all fitting Protection and Encouragement.*

*Whereas the Commissioners for taking care of Sick and Wounded Seamen, &c. have received Directions from the most Honourable the Lord High-Treasurer of Great Britain, to state and lay before his Lordship an exact Account of the Moneys due from their Office for Quartering Sick and Wounded Seamen, and Sick Prisoners of War, to Michaelmas 1711; and whereas the Quartering-Tickets in the smaller Ports may happen to be dispersed in divers Hands, who not being apprized of the Method of Payment of the same, may make a Difficulty of parting with their said Tickets out of their Custody, without which the Debt cannot be adjusted; the said Commissioners do hereby give Notice, That in case any Person possessed of Quartering-Tickets shall neglect or refuse to bring, or transmit the same by a lawful Attorney to their Office in Prince's Court Westminster, with all possible Dispatch, they will be excluded from the present Payment, and deprived of any Benefit from their said Tickets.*
