WHEREAS We are informed, that the Orders We have already given for the Reformation of the Stage, by not permitting anything to be acted contrary to Religion or good Manners, have, in great measure, had the good Effect We propos'd; and being further desirous to reform all other Indelicencies and Disorders of the Stage: Our Will and Pleasure therefore is, and We do hereby strictly Command, That no Person, of what Quality soever, presume to stand behind the Scenes, or come upon the Stage, either before, or during the Acting of any Opera or Play: And, that no Person come into either of our Houses for Opera or Comedy without paying first the establish'd Prices for their respective Places. All which Orders, We strictly Command the Managers both of Our Opera and Comedy, to see exactly observed and obey'd. And if any Person whatsoever shall disobey this Our known Pleasure and Command, We shall proceed against them as Contemners of Our Royal Authority, and Disturbers of the publick Peace.

Given at Our Court at Hampton-Court, this 13th Day of November, in the Tenth Year of Our Reign.

Berlin, Nov. 14. N. S. The Czar of Muscovy arriv'd the First Instant at Crossen, where he was entertain'd by the Prince-Royal of Prussia. On the Fifth his Majesty departed from thence, in order to return into his own Dominions. The same Day General Flemming arriv'd here from Crossen, and had the Day following a long Audience of his Majesty: The Prince-Royal return'd hither likewise that Evening, and went immediately to visit the Princess his Consort, who is with Child, and has of late been under some Indisposition. Monsieur Golofkin, the Muscovite Minister, is also return'd hither from Crossen, together with Monsieur Kamke, Privy-Counsellor to his Prussian Majesty. On Thursday last the King receiv'd an Express from Monsieur Kniphauen, his Majesty's Envoy to the King of Denmark, advising, that the Danish Artillery, arriv'd lately near Grypswald, consists of seventy Pieces of Cannon and thirty Mortars; and that their Fleet is compos'd of twenty-eight Ships of the Line, besides Transports and Tenders. The Duke of Mecklenburgh has sent a Minister hither, to complain of the Oppression his Subjects are under, and the excessive Exactions of the Danes, and to desire his Majesty's Intercession in their behalf; but as the Danish Army are under great Necessities, it is generally believ'd that no Redress can be obtain'd in that Affair. The King having appointed Monsieur Marthal to repair to England, with the Character of Envoy Extraordinary from this Court, that Minister is preparing for his Journey thither, and will be ready to depart from hence about the beginning of the next Month.

Hanover, Novemb. 17. N. S. On the Twentieth of the last Month his Czarish Majesty arriv'd

at Torgow. The next Day the Nuptials between the Hereditary Prince of Muscovy, and the Princess of Wolfenbittel were Solemniz'd after the manner of the Muscovites, in the Presence of the Queen of Poland, the Duke of Wolfenbittel, the Bride's Parents, and several other Persons of Distinction. The Day after the Solemnity, the Czar of Muscovy presented the young Princess his Daughter with Twenty-five thousand Ducats, and having receiv'd the usual Compliments from the Princes and other Persons, that assist'd at the Ceremony, he set out for Crossen, at which Place he was expected the first Instant. Since this the Duke of Wolfenbittel, and the whole Court are return'd to Brunsvick, from whence the Prince of Muscovy departed last Week, in order to wait on his Czariish Majesty at Thorn. He was attend'd out of the City by a great number of Coaches, and Yesterday the young Princess and her Court follow'd him. The Earl Rivers, who arriv'd here the Beginning of this Month, is come back from Geure, where he has been to wait on his Electoral Highness, and is preparing to return forthwith to England. The Dutchess of Cell having likewise been with the Court at Geure, is return'd to Lunenburg the usual place of her Residence. Several Troops of Prussian Horse have lately march'd through the Neighbourhood of this Place, being to be Quarter'd this Winter in the Electorate of Brandenburg. The Elector of Hanover has given Orders to the Guards posted on the Elbe, not to suffer any Persons whatever to pass into this Country, unless they are fully satisfy'd, that they come from Places free from Infection. We have Letters from Pomerania advising, that the Armies of the Allies are preparing Barracks for their Soldiers, in order to continue the Blockade of Stralsund during the Winter. The Suedish Garrison in Wismar, have burnt several Villages belonging to the Duke of Mecklenburgh, on a Complaint that they have not paid their Contributions, and the Danes have done the like on their side, and for the same Reasons.

Hague, Novemb. 13. N. S. On the Sixth Instant the Duke of Marlborough arriv'd here from Flanders. His Grace Din'd that Day with the Earl of Strafford, the Queen's Ambassador Extraordinary at this Place, and was afterwards in Conference with the Grand Pensionary. So soon as the Convoy arrives from England, his Grace will set out from hence for the Brill; and Baron Bothmar, Envoy from the Elector of Hanover, to Her Britannick Majesty, will take the Benefit of the said Convoy, and embark likewise for England. Both the Province of Zeland, and that of Utrecht, have at length offer'd to consent to a Prohibition of Trade with France, in the same manner as it was heretofore propos'd to them by the States of Holland, and to which they have hitherto refus'd their Concurrence. Prince Kurakin having been appointed Envoy Extraordinary from the Czar of Muscovy to this State, arriv'd here some Days since, and was in Conference with the British Ambassador soon after his Arrival. The States of Holland continue assembled, and have order'd all their Troops, both Horse and Foot to be in a readiness to take the Field

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
