Hamburgh, Novemb. 20. N. S. LIHOUGH we have had many Reports of the Arrival of the Danish Artillery near Grypeswald, it appears now, that they had received no certain Advice of that Fleet ill the Sixth Instant, at which time it came to an Anchor in the Height of Rugen, at a Place alld Dors, about three Leagues from Stralfund. Three of their Veffels, laden with Bombs and Caraffes, had the Misfortune to run on the Banks of Sand, where they were all lost: And our last Letters from Pomerania advise, that the rest of the Ships had luffer'd extreamly in a late Storm, informch that the whole Fleet was dispers'd, twelve of the Ships, with part of the Artillery on Board, having been driven into Rostock, and the rest forced to retire towards Holstein. According to our Letters from Gustrow, eight of those Ships which put into Rofock have been fince burnt by a Party of Suedes detach'd from the Garrison in Wismar. Notwithflanding these Disappointments, the Allies continue fird in the Resolutions taken to attack the lile of Rugen. Accordingly, they have chosen out Eight thousand of the best Men in the whole Army to be employ'd in that Expedition, and have given em a Ducat a-piece to encourage 'em in the Service. The Suedes having of late much interrupted the Communicipies between this City and Williams. nication between this City and Wishnar, a Muscovite Regiment, confishing of Six hundred Horse, hath been detach'd from the Army before Stralfund; and as these Muscovites move in strong Parties through the Dutchy of Mecklenburgh, this will effectually contribute to the entire Ruin of that Country. On the Second Instant, at Ten-a-clock at Night, a tertible Fire broke out at Altena, and continu'd till near Ten the next Morning; during which time, apwards of One hundred Houses were destroyed: and if the Inhabitants had not receiv'd Affistance from hence, the whole City would, in all Probability, have been reduced to Ashes. The Czar of Mufcovy arriv'd the Eleventh Instant at Elbing, from whence he propos'd to proceed, in five or fix Days time, to Petersburgh; whereupon Orders have been fent to Northead to prepare every thing there for his Majefty's magnificent Reception at that Place. The Danes have been promis'd a large Supply of Mony from that Prince, and accordingly expect great Remittances next Week by the way of Amilterdamand this City. They give out, that his Majefty will make the next Campaign in Person, and bring an Army of Thirty thousand Men into Pomerania.

Hanover, Novemb. 20. N.S. The Right Honorable the Earl Rivers, who return'd hither from the Court at Geure on the Tenth Infant, went the next Day to the Castle, where he presented the young Princes, the Queen of Great Britain's God-Daughter, with Her Majesty's Picture richly set in Diamonds. Early the next Morning, the Earl left this Place, in order to return to England. The Body of Horse, and two Companies of the Foot-Guards,

fent to Quarter in the Bishoprick of Hildesheim, are return'd from thence, pursuant to the Orders they had received from his Electoral Highness. They write from Breslaw, that Atoph has been deliver'd up to the Turks, and that the Ottoman Army was thereupon separated. These Letters add, That the Grand Vizir having at length consented that the King of Sueden should continue this Winter at Bender, was himself return'd to Constantinople; into which Place he was to make a publick Entry. The Elector of Hanover proposeth to continue three Weeks longer with the Court at Geure.

Bruffels, Novemb. 23. N. S. They write from the Frontiers, that the Enemy had lately laden feveral Boats with Forage at Charleroy, in order to fend them up the Sambre; but upon Advice that the Garrison of Binch had notice of it, and was in motion to endeavour to intercept them, they defisted from their Design; and as the Fortifications of that Place are now in a good Condition of Defence, it is believ'd, the Troops posted there will be able to prevent them from making any Magazines on the Sambre. The Brabant Regiment of Meldeghem, is Quarter'd at Vilvorde, for the Security of the Navigation between this Place and Antwerp, and has been employ'd with fuch good Success, that none of the Enemies Parties have of late infested the Passage on this Canal. The Right Honourable the Earl of Or-rery, the Queen of Great Britain's Plenipotentiary for the Affairs of these Countries, left this Place three Days ago, in order to pass into England. Letters by the way of France, from the Armies in Catalonia advise, that General Wetzel had attempted to surprise Tortosa, but being discover'd by the Enemy, before any of his Men could throw them. selves into the Town, and perceiving that the Garrifon was affembled, and prepar'd to make a very great Refistance, he thought fit to retire with his Party, and defift from that Enterprize. They write from Paris, that the Army in Savoy being separated, a Detachment had beeen made from thence of Eight thousand Foot, and Two thousand Horse to the Lamourdan; and that the Duke de Noailles was making Instances at Court for a further Reinforcement of Twelve Battalions more. The Duke of Anjou was expected on the Twenty-fixth of the last Month at Alcala. Mareschal Villars is return'd to Court, and found a very favourable Reception from the King his Master, who approv'd of all he had done the last Campaign in Flanders, declaring that it was pursuant to the several Orders and Instructions he had receiv'd from his Majesty.
