TE are advis'd from Milan, that the Ambaffadors of this State have made their Entrance into that City with great Magnificence, and receiv'd a publick Audience of the Emperor. They write from Rome, that the Pope has not yet receiv'd any Notice from the Emperor of his Election to the Imperial Dignity, nor of Signior Albani's Arrival at Milan, where he is order'd to abour, in Conjunction with the Cardinals Imperiali and Archinto, to obtain the Restitution of Comachio. The French Court have sent a very angry Letter to the Pope, wherein they exposulate with him, in high Terms, upon his sending a Legat a Latere to Milan. He has likewise promis'd, that they shall not march above One thouland at a time, and that the whole Detachment shall be made in Fifteen Days.
