Venice, Novemb. 13. N. S.

WE are advis'd from Milan, that the Ambassadors of this State have made their Entrance into that City with great Magnificence, and receiv'd a publick Audience of the Emperor. They are order'd to attend on his Imperial Majesty, who was to leave Milan on the Tenth Instant, as far as the Frontiers of the Trentin, in case it will be permitted; and Signior Farseti is appointed to receive his Majesty on the Borders of the Veronesse. They write from Rome, that the Pope has not yet receiv'd any Notice from the Emperor of his Election to the Imperial Dignity, nor of Signior Albani's Arrival at Milan, where he is order'd to labour, in Conjunction with the Cardinals Imperiali and Archinto, to obtain the Restitution of Comachio. The French Court have sent a very angry Letter to the Pope, wherein they expostulate with him, in high Terms, upon his sending a Legat a Latere to Milan. This gives him the greater Uneasiness, since he is not likely to obtain the Fruits he propos'd to himself from the Steps he has taken in that Affair. The Prince of Lorain set out from hence on Monday last for Francfort.

Florence, Novemb. 14. N. S. The Emperor has given Directions for Eleven Battalions and Five hundred Horse, to march into Tuscany, in order to reduce Porto Longono, and such other Places on the Coast, as continue in the Hands of the Duke of Anjou. These Troops were to Rendezvouz on the Twelfth Instant at Borgo San Domino, a Place between Placenza and Parma, and on the Twentieth they are to enter the Grand Duke's Territories. That Prince has appointed Commissaries to supply 'em with Provisions during their Passage through his Country, pursuant to a Treaty lately concluded between the Emperor and this Court; in which his Imperial Majesty engageth to pay for whatever his Troops shall be furnish'd withal. He has likewise promis'd, that they shall not march above One thousand at a time, and that the whole Detachment shall be made in Fifteen Days. They write from Milan, that Cardinal Imperiali, the Pope's Legat, made his Entrance into that City on the Eighth Instant. On the Ninth he had Audience of the Emperor, and deliver'd his Majesty the Presents that had been sent him from Rome. The same Day his Imperial Majesty gave Audience likewise to the Venetian Ambassadors, and several other Ministers, and on the Tenth in the Afternoon, his Majesty set out for Inspruck, by the way of Mantua, and will soon proceed from Inspruck, to his Coronation at Francfort. Our Letters from Leghorn advise, that Sir John Jennings is detain'd there by contrary Winds. Two Privateers have brought into that Port a French Prize bound from Alexandria to Marseille, laden with several Bales of Coffee, and other rich Commodities.

Hamburg, Novemb. 24. N. S. They write from Elbing, that the Czar of Muscovy was to leave that Place on the Fifteenth, and proceed by Water to Koningsberg; and from thence to Riga and Petersbourg. The Muscovite Troops, under the Command of General Czernietoff, are to continue this

Winter in Poland; and it is believ'd that they will not be order'd to evacuate that Kingdom till the King of Sueden is return'd into his own Dominions. A Negotiation has lately been on foot, and a Neutrality propos'd to be observ'd between the Suedish Garrison in Wismar, and the Danes appointed to the Blockade of that Place; but hitherto no great Progress has been made in that Affair, the Danes insisting, that after the Conclusion of that Treaty, they shall be at liberty to return to the Army before Stralsund, to which the Governor of Wismar will by no means consent, but that they shall retire into the Duchy of Holstein, or continue in Mecklenbourg. The last Post from the Camp before Stralsund having been intercepted by the Suedes, we have of late receiv'd no Letters directly from thence. Those from Copenhagen advise, that the Sickness is much abated there, and that Twenty-two thousand Four-hundred and Six Persons have died since it first began to appear in that Place.

Brussels, Novemb. 26. N. S. We have receiv'd Letters from Madrid, importing, that the Duke of Ossuna, the Count de Bergheysk, and the Marquis of Monteleon (Envoy at present from the Duke of Anjou to the State of Genoa) are named by that Prince to be his Plenipotentiaries at the future Congress for a General Peace. The Duke of Vendome is said to have march'd with his Army on the Twenty-fourth of the last Month towards Cardona, in order to reduce that Place, having not been able to execute his Designs on Pratz del Re. They write from Paris, that Signior Emo is daily in expectation of receiving Orders from the Venetian Senate to return home, the French King being highly offended at the Venetians, for their acknowledging his Imperial Majesty as King of Spain; for which reason Orders have been given for the Confiscation of all the Ships belonging to that State, that shall be taken by the Privateers of France. The French Troops that serv'd this last Campaign in Flanders, continue to file off; and we hear that several of those Forces will be Quarter'd this Winter on the Loire.

Hague, Nov. 27. N. S. His Grace the Duke of Marlborough, who had been detain'd for some Days by contrary Winds at Helvoetsluys, embarked Yesterday for England; as did the Earl Rivers, and the Earl of Orkney, under a Convoy appointed for the former. We are advis'd here, that the Elector of Hanover, who had preisd the Return of two Regiments of his Dragoons from Flanders during the Winter Season, has since countermanded them, having just Grounds to apprehend, that his Example would have induc'd some other Princes to have taken the same Measures in relation to some of their Troops in the Service of the Allies. The States-General have lately publish'd an Order prohibiting the Exportation of Hay and Oats into the Enemies Territories, or elsewhere, on any Pretence whatever. The Breach of the said Order is made Capital to the Transgressor, whose Effects likewise are to be Confiscated in favour of such as shall inform against him. They write from Flanders, that the Enemies Garrisons commit great Disorders in the Frontier-Towns, especially at Valenciennes,
