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*Genoa, Novemb. 15. N. S.*

**O**UR last Letters from Barcelona advise, that both the Armies in Catalonia continue in their former Stations; but it is believ'd that the French under the Command of the Duke of Vendome will speedily decamp; soon after which, the Allies will likewise break up, in order to go into their Winter-Quarters. The Duke of Argyle has been ill of a Fever, which oblig'd him to leave the Camp, and remove to Barcelona, where we hear the Fever is much mitigated, and that his Grace is in a fair way of Recovery. The Earl of Peterborough is arriv'd at Milan, from whence his Lordship proposeth to proceed very speedily to Turin.

*Florence, Nov. 17. N. S.* On the Thirteenth Instant, the British and Dutch Admirals, with the Fleet under their Command, sail'd from Leghorne with a fair Wind for Vado; and it is believ'd they reach'd that Port the same Night, or early the next Morning. It is said here, that those Ships are to Convoy the Transports, with Four thousand Germans on Board, from Vado to Barcelona. Four Dutch Men of War continue in the Road of Leghorne, in order to sail with the first fair Wind to Naples. The British and Dutch Cruisers have lately taken several rich Prizes on these Coasts, most of which belong'd to the Merchants of Marseilles.

*Venice, Novemb. 20. N. S.* The Ambassadors sent from hence to Compliment the Emperour in the Name of this State at Milan, had their Audience of Leave from his Imperial Majesty last Sunday on the Frontiers of the Trentin, and are since return'd hither in order to give the Senate an Account of their Embassy. They write from Rome, that the Pope hath at length receiv'd Letters from the Emperour, notifying his Election to that Dignity; and such of the Cardinals and Nobility as are known to be well affected to the House of Austria, have likewise receiv'd the same Information from the Prince of Avellino, the Spanish Ambassador. Signior Sagredo, General of the Morea, being much impair'd in his Health, has been oblig'd to demand his Dismission; and the Senate have dispos'd of that important and beneficial Post in favour of Signior Delphino, who was lately General in the Terra Firma. They write from Naples, that the News of his Catholick Majesty's Election to the Imperial Dignity was receiv'd there with extraordinary Demonstrations of Joy; and, that Orders have been sent from the Emperour to prepare a Detachment of some Troops, and a Train of Artillery: but it is not yet known for what Service those Forces are design'd.

*Hanover, Decemb. 1. N. S.* On the Twenty-eighth of the last Month, the Elector of Hanover

and the whole Court return'd hither from Geure. Two Regiments of Dragoons, that were order'd by his Electoral Highness to return out of Flanders into this Electorate, have since been countermanded, and will continue this Winter in the Low Countries. They write from Poland, that it has been resolv'd there, to retain the Muscovite Forces in that Kingdom 'till they have receiv'd certain Advice, that the Grand Signior has oblig'd the King of Sueden to remove out of the Turkish Territories, and that his Majesty is return'd into his own Dominions. Our Letters from Vienna advise, that the Emperour will shortly remove from Inspruck to Lintz, where his Imperial Majesty will reside till every thing is in a readines for the Coronation at Francfort. These Letters add, that according to their Advices from Canstantinople, the King of Sueden had obtain'd the Grand Signior's Consent to continue this Winter at Bender, but that it was to be apprehended, that his Majesty's Person was in some Danger from the Populace, who seem much Disaffected to him.

*Brussels, Dec. 3. N. S.* Letters from the Frontiers advise, that on the Twenty-sixth Instant a great Convoy of Forage and Meal parted from Namur, in order to be convey'd up the Sambre to Maubeuge, under a Guard of Six thousand Men, which were drawn out of the neighbouring Garrisons for that purpose. Those Letters add, that a French Commissary had lately been Assassinated by some Officers belonging to the Garrison of St. Quintin, for his having complain'd against them to the Court, upon occasion of some Disorders their want of Pay had oblig'd 'em to commit. Letters from Madrid of the Sixteenth of November, by the way of Paris, advise, that the Duke of Anjou and his Court were return'd thither, and had been receiv'd with the general Acclamations of the Inhabitants. They write from Paris, that Orders had been issued out to all the Officers belonging to the Army in Flanders, requiring 'em to have their Regiments compleat by the Month of March next. Messieurs Vegelin and Capel, two of the Dutch Deputies to the Army during the last Campaign, who continu'd on the Frontiers to change the Magistrates of the Conquer'd Places in French Flanders, came hither on the Twenty-eighth of the last Month, and proceeded from hence to the Hague on the Thirtieth in the Morning.

*Hague, Decemb. 4. N. S.* On Wednesday last, the Imperial Ministers were in Conference together at Baron Heems's House, as wore Yesterday his Excellency the Earl of Strafford, Baron Heems and Baron Gerdford, with the Deputies of the States-General in the Chamber of Treves. Monsieur Vegelin van Klairbergen and Monsieur Capel, who have been this last Year in the Camp, in the Quality of Deputies from this Republick are return'd hither, and have taken their Seats in the Council of State.
