Turin, Novemb. 14. N. S.

THE Duke of Savoy, upon Advice of my Lord Peterborough's being arriv'd at Milan in his way hither, put off his intended Journey to the Frontiers, in order to give his Lordship an Audience before his Departure: Since which, his Royal Highness, accompany'd by the Generals Rhebinder and St. Remi, set out to take a View of Suza and other Frontier Places, and was expected back at La Venerie the Nineteenth. The Prince of Piemont has had a slight Indisposition, but is now pretty well recover'd. The Marquis of Caraglio, who attended his Imperial Majesty at Milan, is return'd, well satisfied with the Honours he receiv'd.

Vienna, Novemb. 21. N. S. According to our last Advices from Inspruck, the Emperor was expected there Yesterday. They add, That his Imperial Majesty had been pleas'd to signify to the Baron de Seilern, Minister of the Czar of Muscovy, his Resolutions of maintaining a good Correspondence with the Emperor his Master; and that if he had any Complaints to make, they should be inquir'd into, and Satisfaction given him. The Envoy of King Augustus, who has been here these two Months, is preparing to set out for Constantinople, upon Advice, that the Port had acknowledg'd his Master for King of Poland. They are assur'd, that the Court has receiv'd Accounts from Wallachia and Transilvania, that the King of Sweden is like to continue at Bender this Winter, and that the Ottoman Port will endeavour to conclude a Peace between his Suedish Majesty and the Czar. The Troops of the Neutrality, that were in Silesia, are separated, and the Imperial Regiments are gone into Winter-Quarters in the Neighbouring Towns. The Prince Palatin, Great Master of the Teutonic Order, went Yesterday for Breslaw, in order to be present at the Diet intended to be held there. Count Philip of Dietrichstein, Master of the Horse to the Emperor, set out this Morning for Francfort, where Count Staremberg, President of the Chamber, will be in a short time, in order to assist at the Coronation. Some Advices from Germany say, that the Emperor will make great Efforts towards carrying on the War with more Vigour than ever; and that the four Associated Circles have, at the Instance of his Imperial Majesty, resolv'd to augment their Troops which they hope, may have a good Effect in the present Conjunction. The Recruits for the Forces are continu'd here, and in the Neighbouring Places, with very good Success. The States of Lower Austria were to assemble the Twenty-fourth of the last Month, to receive the Propositions that should be made them on the Part of his Imperial Majesty.

Dresden, Novemb. 20. N. S. They write from Leopold in Poland, of the Twenty-fifth past, that the King of Sweden had desired Leave of the

Port to repair to Constantinople, having several Matters of Consequence to propose to that Court; that thereupon the Body of Turks lately arriv'd at Bender, had receiv'd Orders to be in a Readiness to attend that Prince thither. Letters from Lemberg in Poland, of the Thirtieth past, advise, That a Party of Dragoons of the Crown Army, in a Quarrel which had happen'd between them and some of the Muscovite Troops, had bound several of the latter Hand and Foot, and sent 'em to Lemberg. Those Letters add, That the Lithuanian Parties grow dayly more numerous, and make Excursions as far as Lublin, where they lately seiz'd some Officers belonging to the Crown-Army, with the Soldiers under their Command, and carried them off Prisoners. They write from Warsaw, of the Sixth Instant, that at length the Turkish Troops were broke up from the Camp, wherein they had continued so long, on this side of the Danube, and were by Order of the Grand Vizir retir'd to their respective Winter-Quarters; as were likewise the Tartars. On the Twentieth Instant parted from this Place a new Train of Artillery, consisting of twelve Pieces of Cannon being twenty-four Pounders, which are to be Transported to Pomerania.

Hague, Decemb. 1. N. S. This Morning his Excellency the Earl of Strafford has been in Conference with the Grand Pensionary. Letters from Mons of the same Date advise, that the States of Hainault had met there the Second of this Month. A Body of two hundred Men had been detach'd from thence to dislodge the Enemy from a Post near that Place, and they talk still of fortifying the little Town of Binche. The Convoy of Forage and Provisions that parted from Namur three Weeks since, stop'd within a League off that Place, not daring to proceed, though guarded by a Body of eight thousand Men, being under apprehensions, that they may be attack'd by the Garrisons of Mons and divers other Places, which hold themselves in a readiness to march for that purpose. It has been thought convenient to add some new Works to the Fortifications of Mortagne and St. Amard; a great number of Men are now employ'd therein, and a considerable Sum of Money has been sent from Tournay for this Service.

Dartmouth, Novemb. 25. Yesterday came in here the Golden James, of and for Pool, Thomas Young, Commander, from Newfoundland in Seventeen Days, who parted with the Fleet two Days after he left the Land, and has not seen any of them since. Came in also the Diligent Privateer of Guernzy, Captain Mosier Commander, having been out but two Days, and forc'd in here by bad Weather, as is this Day the Hardy Privateer Guern-
