Warsaw, Novemb. 23. N. S.

THEY write from Leopold, That the Muscovite Generals Czeremetoff and Ronne being arriv'd there, the Conference with the Polish Deputies were begun, about settling the Winter-Quarters of the Muscovites in that Country. The Disputes at first ran very high between 'em, the Deputies making great Complaints of the Disorders committed by the Muscovites, and demanding that they should forthwith quit the Kingdom, otherwise they should enter into such Measures, as should oblige 'em to it; so that 'twas believ'd, that Affair would be attended with great Difficulties; but at length the Proposals of the Generals were comply'd with, and Quarters assign'd in the Neighbourhood of that Town. The Sieur Siniawski, Great General of the Crown, had wrote in very civil Terms to the Sersquier Bassa of Bender, acquainting him with the Resolutions of the Poles to adhere to the Interest of King Augustus, and acknowledge no other King of Poland; hoping at the same time, that there would be a continuance of the good Correspondence and Friendship between the Port and Republick, as had hitherto been. Our Advices from Wallachia confirm, that the Grand Vizir and the Cham of Tartary were sent for to Constantinople, in order to assist at a great Council of War intended to be held there, the Result of which, and the Consequence of the late Reconciliation between the Vizir and the King of Sweden, 'tis believed, will be the renewal of the War against the Muscovites, upon Pretence, that they have not perform'd the Articles of the Peace concluded between the two Nations, in delaying to evacuate Azoph, and demolish the other Forts stipulated in the Treaty.

Hamburg, Dec. 5. N. S. Letters from the Camp before Straßfund advise, that the Artillery lately landed at Grypswald is at last arriv'd there. The King of Poland is retrenching the unnecessary Expences of his Household; and the Money arising therefrom is intended to be put into the Military Chest, and employ'd towards defraying the Charges of the War. A Detachment from the Garrison of Wisnar has attempted to surprize the Danes in their Quarters; but they met with so warm a Reception, that they were oblig'd to retire with great Precipitation, leaving several Kill'd and Wounded upon the Spot. Notwithstanding which Discouragement, the Swedes still continue their Excursions; and one of their Parties lately intercepted the Post-Waggon going to Gustrau, and made Prisoners a Danish Captain and a Cornet, who were coming hither to raise Recruits. Another Party has likewise taken a Convoy of Wine design'd for the King of Denmark's Use. Mr. Pultney, Envoy Extraordinary from the Queen of Great Britain to his Danish Majesty, has receiv'd Orders to intercede with that Prince in behalf of the Duke of Mecklenburg, that the Danish Troops might not take their Winter-Quarters in that Dutchy; and 'twas hop'd the Representations of the said Minister would prevail with his Majesty to ease the Country of so great a Burthen. We are advis'd from Stockholm, that a Project had been form'd

there for making a Descent upon Danish Holstein, in order to give a Diversion, and the Execution of it earnestly press'd; but that Design had been disapprov'd by the Senate as too hazardous an Attempt, for that the Convoy employ'd in such an Expedition would be in great Danger of being intercepted by the Danish Fleet then in those Parts. The Marquis de Langalerie is arriv'd here with a Design to offer his Service to some of the Northern Princes, having at present no Employment. The last Letters from Copenhagen say, that the Contagion is entirely ceas'd in that City.

Hague, Decemb. 11. N. S. The Sieurs Capel, de Gollinga and Vegelin van Claerbergen, who have been last Year in the Camp, in the Quality of Deputies from this Republick, have made a Report of the Execution of their Commission to the Assembly of the States. Monsieur Capel having been appointed Deputy from the Province of Guelderland, to the College of the Admiralty at Amsterdam, has taken his Seat in that Council accordingly, and the Conferences about settling the Affairs of the Navy for the next Year are already begun. The States-General have lately dispos'd of several vacant Commissions in their Gift. The Foreign Ministers wait for their Instructions, after which they'll repair to Utrecht, where several Houses are already hired for their Accommodation at the ensuing Congress. We have Advice from Brussels, that the Enemy having drawn together a great Body of Troops, had appear'd near Mortagne and Hannon, and have since made themselves Masters of the Post of Pont a Vendin, which they have intirely ruin'd, and are at work on filling up the Canal between Deuay and Lille, to render the Navigation of the same impracticable. Whereupon the Earl of Albemarle had given Orders for assembling from the Neighbouring Garrisons, a sufficient Force to oppose the Enemy, and was gone with Major-General Ivoy, to put himself at the Head of 'em, and endeavour to disappoint the further Designs of the French.

Hague, Dec. 18. N. S. On the Sixteenth Instant came an Express, sent by the Earl of Albemarle, with an Account that the strong Body of Troops assembled under the Marschal Montesquion, retir'd on the Fourteenth with the utmost Precipitation at the Approach of our Forces commanded by his Lordship, leaving behind 'em several Pieces of Cannon. However, the Enemy had time to break down the Bridges on the Deule, and sink several Boats in the Searp, for obstructing the Navigation of those Rivers to Bouay: but 'tis assur'd the Damage they have done may be repair'd in a few Days. Great Numbers of Deserters are come into the Frontier Towns, and 'tis computed the whole amount to fifteen-hundred Men. All our Forces are return'd to their respective Garrisons. Yesterday in the Afternoon France Eugene arriv'd here from Frankfort, and soon after had a Conference with the Grand Pensionary. This Morning his Highness receiv'd Visits from most of the Publick Ministers, and in the Afternoon return'd that of his Excellency the Earl of Strafford, with whom he was in Conference two Hours.
