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Dublin, August 6.

His Excellency the Lord Lieutenant arrived here the last night from the *Curragh* of *Kildare*, having taken *Limmerick* on his way home, where he continued two dayes: at his approach to this place, he was met out of the Town by great numbers of persons of quality in their Coaches, who attended him to the Castle, the Regiment of Guards, and the City Militia being drawn up on each side of the streets to receive him.

London, August 14. Letters of July 21 from on board the *Advice* before *Cartagena*, confirm to us the Engagement of that Fregat and the *Guernsey*, to the Westward of *Cape de Gaet*, with seven Turks men of War, whereof the Admiral carried 56. Guns, the Vice Admiral the like number, the Rear Admiral a new ship of 60 Guns, and none of the other less than 40. Guns, telling us that Captain *Tung* and Captain *Allington* were the first men that were killed on either ship in the first days Engagement, which notwithstanding the two Fregats so well defended themselves, that the Enemies Vice Admiral was forced to bring herself upon the *Carreen*, and might have been sunk had not the Fregats tack'd about to preserve their Convoyes.

The next morning they made several proffers to come up again, but did not all between Twelve and One of the clock, but then evidently demonstrated their dislike of the former days entertainment, taking care not to come neer, fighting only with their Great Guns, so that their Small shot did no execution, which fight they continued till about Six of the clock in the Evening, and then stood off to sea, leaving the Fregats with their Convoyes very safe to pursue their course, and were the next morning out of sight.

In this Fight the *Advice* had Seven men besides the Captain killed, and 15 or 16 wounded; the *Guernsey* had none killed besides the Captain, and 3 or 4 wounded. The Convoyes which were the *Sumr. or Island* Merchant, a *Plymouth* man bound for *Allicant* a Victualer bound for the Fleet; the *Alice* and *Frances*, and the *Allicant* Merchant, had not a man hurt, only the Master of the *Alice* and *Frances* struck on the arm with a splinter.

Madrid, July 23. The Count de *Melgar*, one to the Admiral of *Castille*, is lately nominated to succeed *Don Fernando Baldez* in the command of the Regiment of *Lombardy* in the Dutchy of *Milan*, and the charge of Surintendant of Military Justice amongst our Forces in the Netherlands is conferred on *Signior Rouchillo*, who in few days intends to set forwards to take possession of the said employment.

Letters of the 13 instant from *Cadix* inform us that our Fleet designed for the *Indies* put to sea the 10th instant, consisting of 22 sail, amongst which were Four men of war their Convoy, of the rest 13 or 14 designed for *New-Spain*, the rest for the *Canaries* and *Havina*. The Heer *Schey* who commanded Four Dutch men of war, was preparing for his return home, with several Merchant ships under his conduct, & might put to sea within a week.

On Saturday next is the Feast of *St Anne*, the

Queen Regents Patroness, which in compliment to her Majesty is to be kept and celebrated with extraordinary pomp and magnificency, all the Court preparing to appear in rich Habits and splendid Liveries.

The Marquis de *Visso* having with a Squadron of Spanish Gallies, passed along upon the coasts of *Affrick* whilst the Fleet was putting to sea for *New-Spain*, seized upon a Brigantine belonging to *Barbary*, where they took a considerable number of prisoners.

Genoua, Aug. 2. This evening entred here *Signior Hippolito Centurione* with Three French Gallies bound for the Fair at *Messina* in *Sicily*, intending to lade Silk for *Legorn*, this place and *Marseilles*, but the Gallies of this place, and those of the Great Duke being before them, they have little confidence that they shall be able to make any considerable advantage by this voyage.

The Convoy belonging to this Republick intends to continue till the end of *July* at *Cadix*, and may be expected here about a month hence with a considerable sum of Moneys.

From *Milan* we are informed, that the D. d' *Ossuna* intended on the last of *July* to take a general review of the Horse in the Plain before the Cittadel, and in the mean time has given order, that all the Foot which were not present at the general Rendezvous of the Infantry shall be mustered at their respective Quarters and Garrisons.

Legorn, Aug. 4. On the 30th past arrived here the Dutch Convoy from *Spain* and *Genoua*, consisting of Four men of war and Two Merchant ships, Three of the men of war are to return to their Vice Admiral *Van Ghent*, the other is ready to proceed Convoy for *Venice*.

The *St Louis* a French ship is departed for *Smirna*, Captain *Ghigo* with his ship for *Alexandria*; the *Tunizine* is upon departure for *Constantinople*, and the *African* for *Tunis*.

Hamboure, Aug 15. From *Berlin* we are informed that the Gentry of that place having been much offended by the *Sieur Buttier*, a Member of the Elector of *Brandenbourg*'s Council, were gotten together in a considerable number intending to have done him some publick affront, but the Governour of the Castle having timely notice of their intentions prevented them. This tumult of the Gentry is ill resented by the Elector.

The City of *Lubec* are sending a deputation of 24 persons into *Denmark* to compliment that King upon his succession to the Crown.

The Count *Furstenberg* Bishop of *Strasbourg* has continued about 10 days at *Copenhagen*, during which time he has had several private Audiences from the King and the Queen Mother, and before his departure took a view of all the Danish men of war.

His Excellency the Earl of *Essex*, Ambassador from His Majesty of *Great Britain* left *Copenhagen* the last of *July*, and is now well advanced on his way homewards.

Amsterdam, August 15. Letters of the 30th of *June* from our men of War under the Command of Vice Admiral *Van Ghent* inform us, that the *Cor-fairs*

fairs have brought in there several considerable prizes but none of them belonging to these Provinces: amongst others they tell us of one *Portugaise* from *Brasile* laden with 120 Chests of Sugar, 400 Quintils of Tobacco, much Wood and Elephants teeth and other loading, having on board 28 men, two Negro men and one woman. One *Guiny* ship belonging to the *Canaries*, having on board 3000. pieces of 8. One French ship of *Rouen* bound for *Cadix*, and another from *Rochel* intended for the *Maderas*, the said Corsairs esteeming these prizes at the value of more then 100. thousand pieces of 8.

Brussels, August 20 Don Antonio Pimentel, has been lately Employed to *Antwerp*, in the name of the Count de *Montreuy* the Governor of these Provinces; to press them for the speedy raising of the Eight hundred thousand Florins, granted by the States of *Brabant*, which they have hitherto demurred upon, till they shall have obtained some encouragement in point of Trade.

Since this his Excellency has been pleased to be present there at the Procession, upon the Feast of the Assumption of our Lady, whither he was solemnly invited by the Magistrates, where he has been honourably Received and Entertained, with a great part of the Nobility who attended him thither.

To morrow in the Evening his Excellency is expected at *Ghent*, the Horse and Foot are to be in readiness to march out to receive him, and the City Militia to be drawn into Arms.

On Sunday last the Count de *Sore* designed Envoy from his Excellency to His Majesty of *Great Brittain*, lodged at *Ghent* on his way for *Offend*.

The Duke d' *Aerschot* expects the Resolution of the States General of *Flanders* for the advance of a Million and eight hundred thousand Florins, of which they have taken some time to consider, but tis believed will be reduced to a Compliance: he has been since at *Mons* to make his proposals upon the same Subject to the States of *Hennu*.

From *Spain* we are informed that the Conde de *Molina* sent away his baggage the 23 past, and intended suddenly to follow on his way for *England*.

Don *Peñra de Runkilio* is lately made Surintendant of these Provinces, and the Marquis de *Castel Rodrigo* chief President of *Flanders*.

Paris, August 20. The 18th instant His Majesty went to divert himself at his Camp at *St Sebastien*, where the Army being drawn out into two Divisions, His Majesty being at the Head of one of them, and the Marechal de *Crequy* commanding the other, they skirmish in imitation of a fight, and charged each other with paper Granadoes, in which they shewed much dexterity and address.

Here is lately arrived in this City Monsieur de *St Andre Montbrun*, a person well known through the world for the many testimonies he gave during the Siege of *Candia* of his eminent valour and conduct, he has not yet made his Compliments to the Court, of which he intends to take his leave, having it seems obliged himself to return to the Service of the Republick of *Venice* in *Dalmatia*, for Three years, for which they are to assure him of the yearly Pension of 12000 Crowns.

We are even now informed of the arrival of Three rich ships belonging to the *East-India* Company upon the coast of *Bretagne*, their Cargo valued at above Two millions of *Liures*; and that Monsieur de *Mondovergue*, lately Viceroy of *Madagascar* is returned with them.

We have not had of late any farther account of

any fresh disturbance or new appearance of the Rebels of *Vivarois*, which confirms us in the belief that they are totally suppressed.

Edenbourg, July 30. This day was passed here an Act, authorising certain Commissioners to Treat with the Commissioners of *England* for the Weale of both Kingdoms, as followeth.

Forasmuch as the Kings most Excellent Majesty from His Princely Zeal and Fatherly Care of the welfare and happiness of His Subjects (persisting in the same pious and prudent resolution of His Royal Grandfather King James of ever blessed memory, to endeavor a nearer and more compleat Union between His two Kingdoms of *Scotland* and *England*) hath recommended it to the Parliaments of both Kingdoms, that Commissioners might be nominated to Treat and Consult concerning this Union; to the end that His Majesties Royal and Gracious purposes therein may be accomplished, and such a farther Union may be Treated and Agreed upon, as may Compleat and Confirm for ever a constant mutual Love and Friendship between the Subjects of both Realms.

Therefore His Majesty with the advice and consent of his Estates of Parliament, doth hereby Statute, Ordain, and Enact, That such persons or Quorum thereof as shall be nominated by His Majesty under His Great Seal of *Scotland*, are by Vertue and Authority of this Act Authorised, Commissioned and Empowred, to meet and Assemble at such times and in such places as His Majesty shall appoint; and thereon to Treat and Consult according to the tenour of their Commission and Authority in that behalf under the Great Seal, with the Commissioners authorised by the authority of the Parliament of *England*, and of concerning such an Union of the Realms of *Scotland* and *England*, and of in concerning such other Matters, Causes, and Things whatsoever, as upon mature deliberation, the greatest part of the said Commissioners Assembled as aforesaid, and the Commissioners authorised by the Parliament of *England*, according to the tenour and purport of their Commission in that behalf, shall in their wisdoms think convenient and necessary for the honour of His Majesty, and the Weal and common good of both Kingdoms, during His Majesties life (which Almighty God make long and prosperous) and of His Heirs and lawfull Successors for ever; which Commissioners of both Kingdoms, shall according to the tenor or purport of their Commissions in that behalf, reduce their doings and proceedings therein into Writings or Instruments Tripartite, every part to be subscribed and sealed by them, to the end, that one part thereof may in all humbleness be presented to the Kings most Excellent Majesty, another part thereof to be offered to the consideration of the Parliament of *Scotland*, and another part to be offered to the consideration of the Parliament of *England*; at their next Sessions to be held in either Kingdom respectively, after such Writings or Instruments shall be subscribed and Sealed by the said Commissioners; that thereupon such farther proceedings may be had, as by His Majesty and both the said Parliaments shall be thought fit and necessary for the Weal and Common good of both the said Kingdoms, to whom the entire consideration of the whole, and the allowing or disallowing thereof for any part thereof, as they shall think fit is wholly reserved; like as His Majesty with the advice and consent aforesaid, doth hereby Statute and Declare, that no matter or thing to be proposed, treated of or agreed by the said Commissioners by vertue of this Act, shall have any force or effect, or be put in execution until it be confirmed and established by Act of the Parliament of *Scotland*.
