Genoa, December 27. N. S.

ON Tuesday last one of our Gallies came back from Marfeilles, having carried an Envoy Extraordinary from this Republick to the Court of France, and the Captain of that Vessel reports, that there were several Corsairs of Barbary cruising in those Seas. The next Day there arriv'd here two English Men of War, who have taken in great stores of Ammunition for Barcelona, and set Sail Yesterday for that Place, having under their Convoy several Vessels laden with Corn and other Provisions for the Army in Catalonia. Colonel Killegrew, who is come hither from Great Britain, is going for Barcelona; and the Count de Molaert has made use of this Opportunity for his Passage thither, with some Dispatches from his Imperial Majesty. The Count de Medignani, Senator of Milan, who is to be Regent of the Council for Italy at Barcelona, is likewise gone on Board one of the same Vessels.

Vienna, Jan. 16. N. S. We have an Account here, that his Imperial Majesty was pleas'd, upon the Eighth Instant, to promote the following Persons to be Knights of the Order of the Golden Fleece; Duke Anthony Ulrich of Wolfenbuttel, the Duke of Modena, the Duke of Guastalla, the Prince Emanuel of Savoy, the Prince of Swartzenberg, the Prince of Bisignano, the Prince of San Severo Sangro, the Prince Don Livia Odeschalchi, the Prince de Sirmia, the Count de Kinski, the Count Rodolf de Sinzendorf, Great Chamberlain, the Count d'Altham, the Count de Palsi, Ban of Croatia, the Count de Thau, the Count de Cifuentes, the Count de Colebrat, the Count de Oropeza, the Count de Sentellas, the Count de Colorado, and the Count de Paar, Post-master General of the Imperial Hereditary Countries. Yesterday upon the opening of the Council of the Empire, several new Counsellors took the Oaths required there, and their Seats in that Assembly. The Count Nicolini Palsi, Velt Marschal of the Emperor's Armies, and Guardian of the Crown of Hungary, took his Seat in the Privy-Council, in the Presence of the Empress Regent, and is to set out to-morrow to Compliment the Emperor in

the Name of the said Empress. Our last Advices from Prague, the Capital of Bohemia tell us, that several Deputies from that Kingdom, were departed thence, to meet and attend his Imperial Majesty, who was expected at Glattau upon the Twentieth, and according to the Rout he had propos'd, would be at Prague upon the Twenty-seventh.

Berlin, January 19. N. S. The Anniversary of the King of Prussia's Coronation has been solemnized here with the utmost Magnificence; and his Majesty receiv'd the Compliments of the whole Court, as well as of the Nobility, the superior Courts of Justice, and all the Foreign Ministers. His Majesty has been pleas'd to make a Promotion of four Persons to be Knights of the Order of the Black Eagle; who are, the Prince de Nassau Dieft, the Count de la Lippe, the Count de Spaen, and the Baron de Siebourg. We have Letters from Dresden which say, that the King of Poland arriv'd there on the Fifteenth, being accompanied by several of his General Officers; and, that the Campaign in Pomerania was entirely over, the Armies being march'd to take their Winter-Quarters; and that the Sieges of Stralsund and Wismar were deserr'd till the Spring. We have Advices from the Frontiers of Turkey, by the way of Poland, that the King of Sueden was making great Magazines at Bender; which, if true, looks as if he had some Prospect of inducing the Ottoman Port to enter into some Engagements in his Favour.

Cologne, Jan. 19. N. S. The Elector Palatin pass'd by this Place Yesterday in his return from Frankfort, and was saluted with a triple Discharge of the Cannon from the Ramparts of the Place, and by the fire-Arms of the Burgesses, who were drawn out on the Banks of the Rhine upon that Occasion; two Burgomasters went to Compliment him on board his Brigantine, and made him a Present of Wine and other Refreshments; They accompany'd him to Mulheim, where his Electoral Highness lay that Night, and went the next Day for Dusseldorp, where he was receiv'd with the Discharge of their Cannon and Artillery, and all other proper Marks of their Duty.

Brussels, Jan. 25. N. S. Monsieur de Claerbergue, one of the Deputies of the States-General of the United Provinces, went from Lille to Douay on the Twentieth; and was receiv'd at Pont a Vendin by the Count de Hompesch, who in Company with his Excellency, visited the Works that were making upon the upper Deule, between Lille and Douay, to repair the Damages which had been occasioned by the Enemy. They labour incessantly to clear the Scarpe, and with so good success, that it is hop'd, in six or seven Days the River will be render'd Navigable as before. They intend to raise several Redoubts in the Places which are most expos'd, to secure the Navigation, and prevent any Enterprizes of the Enemy for the future. Letters from Namur say, the Elector of Bavaria had Advice, That the Duke de Ossuna, and the Count de Bergheyck, set out from Madrid on the Fifth of this Month, but were retarded in their Journey by the badness of the Roads, and the Snows which cover the Mountains. It is expected they will reach Paris by the beginning of the next Month.

Falmouth, Jan. 26. Yesterday came in Her Majesty's Ships Dolphin and Lizzard, with about Seventy Sail of Vessels from Milford, Swanzy, &c. but last from Scilly. Arriv'd also the Black Swan from Viana, and the Honour-Gally from Malaga, both of this Place, and the Swallow Pacquet from Lisbon, but landed her Mails at Mounts-bay.

Plymouth, Jan. 27. Yesterday sail'd the Berwick and Breda to the Eastward, with about Thirty Ships under their Convoy, most for London. This Day arriv'd the Mary and Rebecca, of and for Southampton, with Wine, in Seven Days from Viana.

Dartmouth, Jan. 27. Yesterday a Dutch Privateer coming from the Westward, took a small French Privateer of Six Guns and Fifty-five Men, and carried her into Torbay. This Day Sail'd for London the Spanish mention'd in my last from Bilboa.

Cowes, Jan. 28. The Fleet mention'd in my last for the Downes, Sail'd not till Yesterday between Eleven and Twelve, about which time the Fleet from Plymouth, with the Ten Ships past by this Island, so that they must certainly join.

Deal, Jan. 29. The Queen's Ships and Outward-bound as mention'd in my two last, are still here, Yesterday Afternoon came in hither Her Majesty's Ships August and Roebuck, and under their Convoy about forty Sail, most being Coasters, and all last from Portsmouth. This Morning came down Her Majesty's Ship the Loo.
