

Brussels, Jan. 25. N. S. Monsieur de Claerbergue, one of the Deputies of the States-General of the United Provinces, went from Lille to Douay on the Twentieth; and was receiv'd at Pont a Vendin by the Count de Hompesch, who in Company with his Excellency, visited the Works that were making upon the upper Deule, between Lille and Douay, to repair the Damages which had been occasioned by the Enemy. They labour incessantly to clear the Scarpe, and with so good success, that it is hop'd, in six or seven Days the River will be render'd Navigable as before. They intend to raise several Redoubts in the Places which are most expos'd, to secure the Navigation, and prevent any Enterprizes of the Enemy for the future. Letters from Namur say, the Elector of Bavaria had Advice, That the Duke de Ossuna, and the Count de Bergheyck, set out from Madrid on the Fifth of this Month, but were retarded in their Journey by the badness of the Roads, and the Snows which cover the Mountains. It is expected they will reach Paris by the beginning of the next Month.

Falmouth, Jan. 26. Yesterday came in Her Majesty's Ships Dolphin and Lizzard, with about Seventy Sail of Vessels from Milford, Swanzy, &c. but last from Scilly. Arriv'd also the Black Swan from Viana, and the Honour-Gally from Malaga, both of this Place, and the Swallow Pacquet from Lisbon, and landed her Mails at Mounts-bay.

Plymouth, Jan. 27. Yesterday sail'd the Berwick and Breda to the Eastward, with about Thirty Ships under their Convoy, most for London. This Day arriv'd the Mary and Rebecca, of and for Southampton, with Wine, in Seven Days from Viana.

Dartmouth, Jan. 27. Yesterday a Dutch Privateer coming from the Westward, took a small French Privateer of Six Guns and Fifty-five Men, and carried her into Torbay. This Day Sail'd for London the Spanish mention'd in my last from Bilboa.

Cowes, Jan. 28. The Fleet mention'd in my last for the Downes, Sail'd not till Yesterday between Eleven and Twelve, about which time the Fleet from Plymouth, with the Ten Ships past by this Island, so that they must certainly join.

Deal, Jan. 29. The Queen's Ships and Outward-bound as mention'd in my two last, are still here, Yesterday Afternoon came in hither Her Majesty's Ships August and Roebuck, and under their Convoy about forty Sail, most being Coasters, and all last from Portsmouth. This Morning came down Her Majesty's Ship the Loo.
