Hambergh, December 29. N. S. The Reports from Vienna still continue concerning the Deposition and Imprisonment of the Grand Vizir, and that his Papers were seiz'd, in order to be examin'd by the Divan at Constantinople, and the Hostages given to the Port by the Czar of Muscovy, were put under a closer Confinement than formerly. A Commissary from King Augustus is arriv'd at Dantzick from Stralsund, with Dispatches and Orders for the Magistrates of that Place; and this gives Occasion to believe, that his Majesty will bring back his Troops into the Provinces of Great Poland, and the Polish Prussia. Letters from the Army in Pomerania say, That Stralsund had been Cannonaded with red hot Bullets, from that side where the Saxons and Muscovites had taken their Quarters, but without any great Effect; and in the mean time, the Danes were mounting their Cannon upon their Batteries. A Detachment of ten Battalions having been made from the Army, five of them were arriv'd at the Camp before Wisnar, and the other five are still at Bouchaw, with the Artillery, belonging to Rostock, which consist of Threescore pieces of Cannon and

Mortars; they have been much damag'd by the badness of the Roads, but care is taking to restit them. On the Sixteenth, the Horse-Guards of King Augustus March'd from before Stralsund, and his Majesty is said to be on his way for Leipfick. The King of Denmark has caus'd some of his Infantry to take Possession of Boisenburg, to secure that Passage. The Lieutenant-General de Ranfow has assur'd the Magistrates of Rostock, that he will restore to them their Train of Artillery, as soon as the necessary Occasions he has for them are over.

Warsaw, January 2. N. S. There has been no Answer yet made to the Letters which the Great General of the Crown has written to the Serasquier of Bender, and the Grand Vizir, to know whether the Ottoman Port will admit of an Embassy, which has been propos'd to be sent from King Augustus and the Republick of Poland. The News of the Removal of the late Grand Vizir has so alarm'd the Muscovites, who were marching out of these Territories, that General Ronne has stop'd with his Cavalry near Metziboz, to observe a Party of Swedes, as well as the Palatine of Kiovia, who has projected an Irruption into this Kingdom with his Troops, and a great Body of Tatars and Walucks, as soon as the Neither shall be frozen over: This has likewise broken the Measures taken by the Commissioners at Leopold for the Regulation of the Winter-Quarters, and occasion'd the Grand General to send a Detachment of his Troops to reinforce the Garrison posted upon the Frontiers, and to hinder the Swedes from penetrating into this Country, and so prevent our being engag'd in any War that may happen between the Ottoman Empire, and the Czar of Muscovy.

Vienna, January 9. N. S. On the Sixth Instant, being the Birth-day of the Empress Regent, Her Majesty was attended by the Knights of the Golden Fleece, in the Habits of their Order, and receiv'd the Compliments of the Foreign Ministers and the whole Court. Yesterday the Count Sigismund Frederick Kevenhillery, Hereditary Captain of the Province of Carinthia, being nominated by his Imperial Majesty to be Lieutenant of the Lower Austria, took the Oaths and his Seat in Council, in Presence of the Empress; and the Prince Leopold de Trautson, Grand Chancellor of the Court, and the Baron de Seilern, were introduced at the same time with the usual Solemnities. We continue the Preparations for the approaching Campaign with great Diligence; and Orders are sent to Hungary, for the speedy Departure of twelve Regiments for Germany, that are to take their Quarters in the Kingdom of Bohemia, and the Electorate of Bavaria. If Reports coming from the Frontiers to Peterwaradin may be credited, the late Grand Vizir is confin'd to the Island Candia.

Berlin, January 12. N. S. His Prussian Majesty is entirely recovered from his late Indisposition, and Preparations are making for the Anniversary of his Coronation.
