This Evening Count Ottavio Sanferini, Envoy from the Duke of Parma, had a Private Audience of Her Majesty; to which he was introduc'd by the Right Honourable the Earl of Dartmouth, Her Majesty's Principal Secretary of State, and conducted by Sir Clement Cotterel, Master of the Ceremonies.

St. James's, February 5. This Evening Monsieur Lith, Envoy Extraordinary from his Czarean Majesty, had a private Audience of the Queen; to which he was introduc'd by the Right Honourable Henry St. John, Esq; One of Her Majesty's Principal Secretaries of State; and deliver'd a Letter from his Master, notifying the Marriage of the Prince-Royal his Son, to the Princess Charlotte Christina Sophia of Brunswick Lunenburg, Granddaughter to the present Duke of Wolfenbuttel.

Dartmouth, February 5. Yesterday came into our Road Her Majesty's Ships the Dolphin and Lizzard from Wales, but last from Plymouth, and under their Convoy several Vessels from thence laden with Coals and Culm for this Place, Timmouth and Topham. Came in also the young Abraham, a Privateer of Flushing. Sail'd the Dragon Privateer of Jersey.
