This Day arriv'd here the Lord Forbes from Barcelona, with the following Account.

THE Siege of the Castle of Cardona having continued above a Month, the Maresthal Staremberg form'd a Design for Relieving the Place; and pursuant thereto, on the Seventeenth of December, N. S. he detach'd four hundred chosen Grenadiers from the Army under the Command of a Colonel Edward Stanhope, to join Lieutenant-General Pathes at the Bridge of Malagamega, who had been thereabouted during the best part of the Siege, with a Detachment of two thousand Men from our Army, together with the Miquelets and Voluntiers, to lay hold on any Occasion that should offer of succouring the Place. On the Eighteenth, Colonel Stanhope, with his Desachment, joined Lieutenant-General Pathee; the same Day Count Traun like-wife arrival with the Mareschal's Directions. The Nineteenth, and part of the Twentieth, was frent in the necessary Preparations for the ensuing Action. The Twentieth, at Five in the Evening, all our De-

fifty Foot; Count Guel accompany'd him as Vo-Juntier, and had also the Command of two hundred-Grenadiers more; the Miquelets follow'd these to The number of four hundred, led by Lieutenant-Co-lonel Geschwint; after whom came all the Provisi-ons for the Castle; and in the Rear of all march'd the remainder of our Detachment, confisting of eight hundred Foot, and two Battalions, one of the Regi-ment of Geschwint, and the other of Oshabroug, commanded by the Colonels Schonbourg and Roharr, together with sive hundred Imperial dismounted Dragoons, commanded by Colonel Beaufort; Lieutenant-General Nabot, with a good number of Miquelets and Voluntiers, march'd by the way of the Redoubt on the Hill of Colamena, and join'd the Lieutenant-Colonel of Schopberg's, who had with him four hundred and fifty Foot, for to attack the The Twenty-first, at Five in the Morning, Count Guel, with his Detachment of two thou-fand Grenadiers, march'd to attack the Posts which the Enemies posses'd on the Heights above their Camp, on the side of the Escurial. Colonel Stanhope march'd at the same time to attack those Posts in another Place, and made himself Master of them, after a very warm Dispute, in which we took Rrison her Count-Melon, one of the Enemies Brigadiers, who soon after dy'd of his Wounds. Upon the loss of this Post, the Enemy immediately form'd twelve Companies of Granadiers, and four Battalions in the Plain of the Escurial, and attack'd our Grenadiers on the Hill with so much Resolution, that they put them into great Disorder; but Colonel Stanhope. with the few that stood firm, desended the top of

the Hill with the utmost Bravery, till the Officers be had fent to rally the Men, had brought them up again; and then he attack'd the Enemy with puth of Bayonet, that he drove them precipitately down the Hill, killing four hundred of them on the ipot. and twenty two Officers; but in this Engagement he received a mortal Wound, of which he div d on the Twenty-third: His remarkable Bravery in the Defence of this Post, was esteem'd as a principal Occasion of the happy issue of this important Assay: During this Dispute, General Nabot, with his Incty, carry'd a Redoubt on the Colomena; the Ene; my endeavourd to re-take it, but were repuls'd with great loss. The Lieutenant-Colonel of Schonberg, that was of Nabot's Party, at the same time attack'd that Post which was on the other side of the Escurial, and carry'd it with great shughter of the Enemy, and march'd immediately from thence to join Colonel Stanhape, who had repuls d the Enemy before. The Enemy by this time had made a se cond Attack upon our Grenadiers on the Hill with the same Troops that attack'd them the Day before; but were again repuls'd and drove over the River, with the loss of fix hundred Men; the Colonel St. Martin, and leveral other Officers were taken Prisoners: Upon which the Enemy allembling together from their leveral Encampments, march'a off leaving behind them fourteen Pieces of Batteting-Cannon, four Field-pieces, and four Mortars, with all their Ammunition, Tents, and Baggage, and all their Sick and Wounded, amongst whom was a Co-lonel and reveral Field-Officers; and besides these, they loft in the two Days Action above Two thou-fand Men, besides Officers, We, on our side, had not above Two hindred Men and Three Officers Killd. General Napot, with his Miguelets and Volunteers, pursued them, and did them conside-rable Damage till they join'd their Army on the Twenty-sourth, about which time our Detachment likewise join'd our Army. The Twenty fish, about Two in the Morning, the Duke of Vendoin's taking the Opportunity of a thick Fog (which is common in those Hills from Mid-taght till Mid-day) march'd off with his whole Army, lea-

ying a few Drums along his Line to beat, the Geheral at Break of Day; a little before which time, the Mareschal had Intelligence the Enemy was march off: upon which; he order deals the Cavaley, Picquets, and Grenadlers to purse him. whom they foon came up with; but the Fog was fo thick, that the Mareichal did not think it proper to begin any Action. The next Day, and Day's following, the Enemy continued their March with little Halting till they got in Safety on the other fide of the Segra, abandoning their strong Post at Cervera, and the fertile Plains of Urgell; apon which the Mareichal separated his Army into Winter-Quarters, which are by this Action much enlarg'd. And thus ended this Campaign, which the Enemy began with a Superiority of Twelve thoufind Men, yet have been defeated in every of their Undertakings with the Loss (at several times) of at least Ten thousand Men of their Army: And we have reap'd all the Advantage of a complext Nictory without the hazard of a Battle.

We have lately Bruffels, February 22. N. S. been alarm'd here by some Advices my Lord Albemarl receiv'd at Tournay, as if the Enemies Garrisons on that Frontier were come out upon some new Attenipt; but fresher Letters from thence fay, all things remain quiet there, and that there seemed to be no appearance of the Enemies making any Incurfion at present. The Letters from Paris of the Nineteenth, do not only confirm the Death of Madam the Dauphiness of the Measles, on the Twelfth, but likewise bring an Account, that Monsigneur the Dauphin dy'd of the same Distemper on the Eighteenth; which Accidents have caus'd a great Conflernation in France, there being feveral other Perfons of Quality fallen ill of the same Distemper.

S. that Madam the Dauphiness, Mary Adelaide de Savoy, died at Versailles upon the Twelfth of this Month, in the Twenty-fixth Year of her Age: This Lofs was follow'd, fix Days after, by that of Monseigneur the Dauphin, Louis, of France, who died at Marli upon the Eighteenth: He was in the Thirtieth Year of his Age, being born the Sixth of August in the Year One thousand six hundred and eighty two.
