Hamborough, February 12. N. S.

THE Administrator of the Duchy of Holstein having notice that his Danish Majesty would pass through those Territories, went accompany'd with the Count Dernath, and the Baron Goertz, to wait upon him at a Place call'd Pophiotz, where they had a Conference of two Hours, Monsieur Klepping, first Aid de Camp to the King of Denmark, is arriv'd here with a Commission from his Master to King Augustus, in order to consult with him concerning the Operations of the next Campaign: He is likewise to treat with several Princes of the House of Saxony, to put several thousand Men into his Master's Service; so that the Danes affirm, that in the beginning of May their Army will be ready to enter Pomerania with thirty thousand Men, without comprehending the Saxons and Muscovites; and that his Czarish Majesty will raise eight thousand Men to augment his Troops in Pomerania. The King of Denmark will have his Army all cloath'd in red, and accordingly their Habits are making at present in this City. His Majesty arriv'd at Coldingen on the Twenty eighth, where General Scholten, and all the Danish General Officers, are expected to assist at a Council of War. His Majesty has likewise sent Orders to his Council at Copenhagen to come to Coldingen, and attend him there during the remaining part of this Winter; but they will be oblig'd to perform their Quarantine before their Arrival there.

Hanover, February 12. N. S. The Duke of Wolfenbuttel, together with the Hereditary Prince and Princess, and the two Princes of Beven, came to this Place upon the Twenty-fifth of January, to partake of the Diversions of the Carnival. The Duke, after a small Stay, return'd to Brunswick, to prepare all things necessary for the Fair, which began on the Eighth of this Month. The Count de Schonborn, who was formerly the Emperor's Minister at Hamborough, to compose the Differences between the Magistrates and Inhabitants of that City, arriv'd here on Sunday, and set forward Yesterday in his way thither, with a new Commission to the same purpose from his present Imperial Majesty. Monsieur Groat, Envoy from the Elector of Hanover, is preparing to follow him in a few days. Monsieur Urbich, Minister of the Czar, who had attended his Imperial Majesty at Frankfort, is gone through this Place to Vienna, where he is to reside in a publick Character. We have Advices from Poland, and several other Places, which say that the Port is resolv'd to renew the War against the Muscovites, and that the Cham of Tartary has already given Orders to part of his Troops to march into Muscovy, and attack it on the other side of Asoph, if it were possible. These Letters add, that the Sultan himself would go into the Field, together with the Cham of Tartary, who is very much in his Favour. They say the King of Sweden is still at Bender, and the Palatine of Kiovia is not march'd from thence; but, that they expect the Declaration of War, and a Body of

Troops to join them; after which, they will enter upon Action. We hear by the last Post, that the Cham of Tartary was gone from Constantinople, to give necessary Orders, and to put all his Troops in Motion. This Day will put an end to the Diversions of the Carnival.

Hague, February 26. N. S. The Earl of Strafford, who came hither for some Days, has had several Conferences with the Ministers of this State, and departed hence for Utrecht on Tuesday last, after having renew'd several Treaties for Troops that are to be paid by Her Majesty. The Plenipotentiaries of the Emperor, of Portugal, of Hesse Cassel, of Munster, and other Princes, are likewise set forward for Utrecht. Messieurs Effchenbrenar and Solemaker, Envoys Extraordinary from the Prelates of the Chapter of Cologne, who arriv'd here Yesterday, have deliver'd their Credentials to the States-General, and have been acknowledg'd by them in that Quality. The Baron d'Elts, who is appointed by the Elector of Treves, to assist, on his part, at the Congress at Utrecht for a General Peace, is preparing to set forward thither.

Utrecht, March 1. N. S. Yesterday-morning the Plenipotentiaries of the Allies held their usual Conference; at which the Ministers of Treves, Munster, and Hesse, assisted for the first time, and exhibited their full Powers, as did likewise the Imperial and Portuguese Ministers, who were at the Hague when a former Conference was held on this Occasion. The Ministers of the Allies did likewise, at this Conference, agree upon the Manner in which they are to deliver in their Demands to those of France on Saturday next, after they have been mutually communicated to each other; which all the Ministers of the Allies hope may be done at their next Conference on Thursday. An Express is pass'd through this Place in his way to the Hague, being dispatched from the Dutch Ambassador at Constantinople to the States, with certain Advice, that the Turks had declared War against the Muscovites, and designed to enter upon Action very soon in the Spring. Baron Gerisdorff, the King of Poland's Minister, is arrived here from the Hague; he has been in Conference with the British and other Plenipotentiaries, and designs to return in a few days. Yesterday-morning a Conference was held at Count Sinzendorff's, of all the Ministers of the Empire, about Matters relating to the Interests of their respective Masters, Members of that great Body. Messieurs Buys and Gossinga, with the Count de Rechteren, three of the States Plenipotentiaries, went on Saturday to the Hague, and are expected back to Morrow, with the last Resolutions of the States agreeable to the present Situation of Affairs, before they give in their Demands to the French Ministers, who continue to assure us, the King their Master is in very good Health, notwithstanding the Reports rais'd here to the contrary.

Falmouth, February 18. This Day put in here the Snell Beak, the Porto Bello, both of and for Amsterdam, the Popkansburgh for Middleburgh, all from Curacao; who in their Passage home took one

of Mons. du Caffé's Fleet of sixteen Guns; and report, he sail'd from Martinecs with one Man of War more, and seventeen Sail of Merchant Ships.
