Rome, August 2. Monsegnior Borromeo arrived on Munday in the Evening at Civita Vecchia, from his employment as Nuncio in Spain, from whence he made his Voyage in 26 dayes; the next day he arrived here in the Duke de Bracciano's Coach which was ordered to attend him, and was the fame day introduced by the Cardinal Patron to kiss the Popes Foot, who received him with Extraordinary kindness, rising from his Chayre to embrace him, and after fome discourse dismit him, desiring him to repose himself for some days, and to keep within to avoyd the inconveniences of the Air, which is usually dangerous to perfons who arrive at this feafon of the year.

The Caidinal Patron, and Monfegnior Marefcotti defigned his Succeflor to the Court of Spayne, have had frequent Conferences with him in order to the affairs of that Crown, of which the latter efpecially defires a full information, being fuddenly to be imployed thither with the fame Character of Nuncio.

Since the Return of Borromeo, tis confidently believed that the Marquis d'Aftorgas is the perfon defigned by the Court of Spain for the Vice-Royalty of the Kingdom of Naples.

On Munday in the afternoon the Pope held a Private Confiftory, in which he difpoled of feveral vacant Archbishopricks and Bishopricks, according to the proposals of the several Cardinal Proteftors.

Some difputes about Precedency having happened between the Refpigliof and the Conftable C)-Ionna, the Cardinal de Medicis, and the Venetian Ambafiador interposed as Mediators, and have at the last ended the dispute, but so as the Constable shall for the first time give the hand, as has been pfually done in respect to such as have been acknowledged Nephews to the Pope.

Chevalier Borri has been delivered into the hands of the Inquisitor General at Rimini, who is bringing him to this place with a great Train, confifting of three Coaches filled with the Fathers of the Order of St Dominich, an hundred Officers belonging to the Inquisition, with their Trumpets and 30. Serjeants.

From Naples they tell us, that the Popes Gal leys pafied lately by Nifita on their way for Sicily, and that fix of the Maltha Galleys which were employed against the Pyrates, were by foul weather forced upon the Coafts of Calabria, where they unexpectedly fell upon two Caravels of Argiers, with whom they immediately ingaged, and after fome difpute funk one of them, and took the other, aboard which they found 300. Turkifh flaves, and delivered about 200. Chriftians, which thofe Corfairs had taken upon their neighbouring Coafts: the Caravel with the Slaves they fent away with one of their Galleys to Maltha, the reft having received fome final danimage in the incounter are refiting, and will be fuddenly out again at Sea.upon the fame imployment.

The Viceroy having had feveral Complaints of the numeroufnels and infolency of the Banditi, fent four hundred Spanish foot into *Abruzzoto* difperfe them, who being informed of their approach retired to their Mountains and fastnetles, whole avenues are not cafily to be palled.

Madrid, August 6. On the 30th past the King was again divertifed with the Ball sports, in which he is much delighted ; whilft preparation was ma-king in the Place Royal for this Diversion , the Count de Melgar paffing by with his Coach, a fouldier beat one of his Lacqueys, who drawing his fword to defend himself, many other Souldiers fell upon him, thereupon the Count with Don Miguel Noronna came out of the Coach, and with their fwords in their hands Commanded the Souldiers to let go his Servant, but they grown infolent, with much rudenefs began to push them, which obliged the Marquis de Gueuara with feveral other persons of quality, to leave the Belconies where they were feated, to go to the affiftance of the Count, where the Marquis received a cut on the head with an Halbard, of which he lyes dangeroufly ill. The Offi-cers having appealed this Tumult, and the Sports ending, fome of the young Lords diffatisfyed with the Souldiers, taking with them fome reformed Officers, came into the Place Royal, and feighned a quarrel, with intention to have drawn in the Souldiers, upon whom they had defigned a revenge, but the Marquis de Caftel Rodrigo having defired the Lieutenant of the Guards, to confine the Souldiers to their Posts, went down with the Queens Major Domo, and with fome difficulty perfwaded the young Lords to return home. Their Majeflies then returned to the Pallace, and gave Order that the Souldiers of the Guards should immediately retire to their-Quarters, and confined the Count de Melgar to Bourgas, and Don Miguel de Norronna to Tolede.

The next day hapned a greater tumult, begun by fome Souldiers who would have refcued a woman out of the hands of the Serjeants, in which difpute an Alguafil hapned to kill an Officer, who interpofed himfelf in the quarrel; the Souldiers meditating revenge; came the next day to the place where the Alguafils ufually meet, where they fought fome time, killing one or two of them, and wounding others. The next day the Alguafils baving got together about 150 perfons, fet upon 20. Souldiers, and wounded the Sarjeant Major of the Regiment who came in to have appealed the Tumult; the people taking part with Alguafils, much hurt might have been done, had not the Souldiers been Commanded to repair to the Corps de Guard: fince this, complaints have been made on both fides, but upon Examination Don Pedro Salzedo the chief of the Alguafials is to be put out of his Office, feveral others of them to be made Exemplary, and fome of the Souldiers to be flot to death, and both Citizens and Souldiers commanded by Proclamation by beat of Drum, upon pain of death, to abstain from offring any affronts to each other.

From Cadiz we are informed of the arrival there of Captain Clarke on board the Holmes Fregat, who having cruifed on the Coafts of Sally, met there with the French Vice-Admiral, who fent their Boat to him with their Complyments, he had with him two other French men of War, a fireship and a Tartan, who had chased in two Sally men of War with two Prizes, and might probably have given a good account of them, the Moores having quitted them, and were not able afterwards in two dayes to get them over the Bar, but the French left them, having contented themselves with chacing them under the Command of the Castle : a little after Captain Clark arriving before Sally, chaced two of their fhips into a Cave or hollow of a Rock, where he battered them for some time with his Guns, the shallowness of the water not permitting him to come to them, and some days aftet chased in another ship of that Port, which made a shift with Towing to get over the Bar, which he pursued within shot of the Castle, which fired many Guns at him but with little damage.

He is now cleanfing, intending to return speedily to the fame Coasts to watch the motion of those Corfairs, who have not above 9. men of War, of which the biggest carries not more then eight Guns, and as many Murderers.

An Express from the Count D'Humanes, Viceroy of Gallicia, gives us an account that the Portugais had laid an Ambuscade in a little Island near the Town of Tuy, upon the River Minho, to fall upon the people of Gallicia, to force them from their right of Fishing upon that River; but the people taking the Alarm, got together, and fell upon the Portugais, killing their Captain Brento de Britto, and forcing the rest to retire. The Viceroy has sent one of his Captains to Lisbonne, to inform the Prince of the truth of their whole business, to prevent all misunderstanding.

Vienna, Aug. 10. We have now confirmed to us the furrender of Caffovia and Eperies in the Upper-Hungary, which are both contented to take in Imperial Garifons. General Sporch has fince fent away feveral Regiments toward the Fort of Muran, which is also inclined to hearken to conditions of Surrender. Colonel Heifter was also fent away with another party towards Mediuk, a ftrong Town or Fort in the Mountains, but having intelligence that 300 of the Rebels had poffeft themselves of the ftreights by which he was to march, with an intention to dispute his passage, he thought fit to retire, and to defire that a greater force might be fent with fome Canon, to force them to obedience.

The Emperors Recruits march daily towards the Army in Hungary, which tis believed cannot confift of lefs then 40000 men, which pleafes not the Turks, who had a defign to attempt upon Poland.

Ghent, Aug. 23. On Thursday last the Bishop of this City entertained his Excellency the Count De Wonterey, with a great Train of the Nobility at

Dinner, in his Caftle Lochriftey, four Leagues distant from this place. About four in the Afternoon his Excellency took a view of 1400. Horfe and Foot which were drawn up about a League from hence, by the Baron De Limbeck ; where they faluted him with three Vollies of fhot, which were answered by the great Guns from this City and Caffle. From thence his Excellency, preceded by his Horfe Guards, and followed by all the forefaid Horfe and Foot, marched towards this City; and in the first place took a view of the Caftle, with its Fortifications; which done, he entred the City, the Grand Bayliff, with all the Magistrates attending him at the first Bridg, and presenting him with the Keyes : From thence he rode to the Great Church, through the City Militia, which was drawn and ranged on each fide of the way, the Nobility and General Officers preceding him, who was immediately fol-lowed by the Popes Nuncio, and Don Estevan de Gamarra, Governor of the Cittadel, and late Ambaffador to the United Provinces. At the Door of the Church he was attended, and thence conducted into the Quire, by the Bishop and all the Canons in their Habits, where he heard Te Deum, and was afterwards magnificently entertained at the Bishops Palace, and diverted with excellent Fireworks.

Yesterday about fix in the Morning he went hence, intending to lodg the last Night at his own House at Maldingbam, and this day to Visit Ostend, having sent the Prince De Steenhuise to command in Chief at Brussels, in the room of Major General Carolo Campi, whom he has ordered to be committed prifoner to Vilvord-Castle, he having at the intercession of the Dutchels De Villa Hermola, suffered a Spanish Souldier, condemned to be shot to death, to escape the hands of Justice.

Ghent, Aug. 27. On Saturday last his Excellency the Count De Montercy visited the strong Fort at Damme, on his way to Oftend, and from thence came to the Skipfall near Bruges, to pass the River, where a rich Tent was erected, and the Count De Rash, with the four Members of Flaunders, and the Lords of Bruges attended him, and treated him with an excellent Collation, whils the great Guns about the City, and on board the Ships, were often fired, to proclaim his Welcom. His Excellency is now at St Ouvres, and intends on Tuesday next, ou his Return, to visit Bruges, where they are making great preparations for his Reception.

Paris, August. 27. The 25th instant the Army at St Sebastien was drawn up reviewed and exercifed by His Majesty, and is this day to dislodge, and to be sent away into more convenient quarters, a great Mortality having hapued amongst their horse, by reason of the heat of the Sands about the Camp, and the great scarcity of Forage.

On Saturday last the whole Court removed to Versaile, where they were entertained with a small Representation of a Sea fight in the new Channel, where a great ship curiously adorned and furnisht was attacqued by feveral final Boats, but without Guns, because of the Presence of the Queen and the Ladies of the Court, who filled most of the Boats; and were entertained with a great noife of kettle Drums, Trumpets and a band of Violins : after this they passed into the Pallace, where they were treated with an excellent Banquet and enter-tainment of Fifh and Fruits, and afterwards with a Pastoral by way of Opera, performed with great Variety of Excellent Mulick: which ending, the King went the fame night to St Germains, and His Grace the Duke of Buckingham, who was present at all these Divertisements came to this Town, where he has fince continued.

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
