Petersburg, March 2. N. S. The new Married Couple retir'd to the Prince's House, and staid there till Ten of the Clock, and then proceeded to the Czar's Palace, where all the Company was gather'd day laft, and was to have departed Yesterday to according to the Invitation. Florence, March 22. N. S. General Zuminghen, with feveral other German Officers, have been to view Fort Philippo, which is fituated on a Pro-montory over against Porto Hercole, and it is thought necessary it should be taken before they can regularly befiege the latter. Upon their ap-proach, the Governor of the Place made several. Discharges of his Cannon, but without any effect. The Snows are deep, and the Weather has been very levere in these Parts, but as soon as it grows better, the Imperialists defign to Attack the Place in Form; for which purpose they are to be joyn'd by a Body of Troops that have been fent from Naples, and arriv'd on the Thirteenth Instant at Orbitello, with a Train of Artillery, and all other things necessary for fuch an Enterprize. We have advice from Genoa, that a Vefiel from Barcelona has brought: Orders to the Duke of Uceda, to prepare, all things for the Embarkation of Eight thousand Foot, and Fifteen hundred Horfe, that are to be transported to Catalonia.

Hanover, April 1. N. S. We have advice from Carelicroon, that the Suedes intend to transport demn'd to have their Heads struck off, for having held a Correspondence with the Danes, and their Father, who was privy to these Actions of his Sons, and did not difcover them, is confind to a perpetual Impriforment. Some Days fince-two hun-dred Men Sallied out of Stralfund, with a Defign to cut Wood for Palifadoes, on the fide of Roitock, but were attack'd by Six hundred Danes belong-ing to the Garrifon of the Place, who deteated them and took feveral Prifoners. His Danish Majelty is still at Coldingen, and they write from thence, that his Infantry is recruited and compleac,

but that the Cavalry want a great many Horses. Berlin, April 2. N. S. The Prince of Hesse Caffel being very well fatisfied with his reception here, fet out Yelterday for Flanders; during his Stay in this Place, he had feveral Conferences with the Prince Royal, Monfieur Ilgen, and Monfieur Kamke about the Succession of the Principality of Orange, but it is not faid they are come to any conclusion. General Fleming arriv'd here on Sun-day last, and was to have departed Yesterday to the Prussian Ministers, concerning several impor-
