Turin, March 30. N. S.

THE Detachment which his Royal Highness sent for from Italy, begins now to arrive at St. Balein and Montanaro, within Eight or Ten Miles of this Place, where they are to continue till the Snow, which is yet considerable on the Mountains, begins to melt, or that the Enemy, who are yet very quiet, shall begin to move. This Detachment is commanded by Lieutenant-General Regal and Major-General Wackerden, besides a Prussian General, who are daily expected here to receive his Royal Highness's Commands, and to inform him of the Condition in which their Troops remain at present. The Contador General Fontana, one of his Royal Highness's Plenipotentiaries at Milan, for arbitrating and determining several Differences between his Imperial Majesty and this Court, has been here Five or Six Days, to give the necessary Orders for the subsistence of these Troops, and to inform his Royal Highness of those Negotiations, and is to return again to Morrow, with new Orders to solicit the speedy conclusion of those Differences. His Royal Highness, with the Dutchess his Consort, the young Princes and their Court, design to go to the Venerie this Afternoon, and to continue there for two or three Months.

Venice, April 1. N. S. They write from Naples, that the British Men of War, with the Johnston, and some Tartanes, were to sail the latter end of the last Month, with Provisions for Port Mahone. The Senate have thought fitting, considering the great Preparations of the Turks on that side, to provide for the Security of the Morea, and in order to it, will in a little time distribute Commissions for the raising of ten thousand Men. The Signior Antonio Paluzzi is to set out in a few days for Naples, with the Character of Resident from this Republick.

Brussels, April 14. N. S. The States of Brabant have consented to the four hundred thousand Florins, demanded of them by way of Extraordinary Subsidy, towards furnishing the Imperial and Palatin Troops that are to serve on this side, with Bread and Forage, during the next Campaign: In a few Days the States of Flanders will have taken their final Resolution, upon the six hundred thousand Florins demanded of them for the same Service. Her Majesty's Forces in Garrison at Gand, are march'd out to Day towards the General Rendezvous of the Army; as are likewise the two Battalions of Foot Guards from hence, with the Regiment of Cadogan, and the Troops of Hanöver from the Deiner.

Utrecht, April 15. N. S. A General Conference was held on Wednesday the Thirteenth Instant, in the Town-house, at which all the Ministers residing here, as well of the Allies, as of France, assisted. Those of the States-General took that occasion to deliver from their Masters, a Passport to the latter, which they had some time since desired for the security of their Couriers. It was design'd that another General Conference should be held to Morrow, as usual, but the French Ministers have desir'd,

that if the Allies have nothing particular to offer, it may be put off, as has been often done on the like occasion. The Prince of Nassau Ziegen is lately come to this Place, in order to lay before the Ministers of the Allies, the Pretensions he has to the Principality of Orange. Don Louis Da Cunha, one of the Plenipotentiaries from the King of Portugal, has this Day notify'd his arrival here. Yesterday in the Evening, the British and Dutch Plenipotentiaries were in Conference together, as those of the Protestant Allies were this Day at the Lord Privy Seal's House. Monsieur Hymen, Envoy Extraordinary from the King of Prussia to the States-General, arrived here this Morning from the Hague. The Earl of Strafford designs to go to that Place for three or four Days, Mr. Harley being not as yet return'd from thence.

Utrecht, April 19. N. S. On Saturday the Sixteenth Instant there was held a General Conference, as usual, notwithstanding the Proposals which had been made the Day before, for putting it off: The Ministers of the Allies enquiring again of those of France, whether they were ready to give Specifick Answers in Writing, they excus'd themselves on Account of their not being as yet fully instructed from the King their Master, on that Subject. In the Evening Prince Eugene of Savoy, accompany'd with the Duke of Wirtemberg and General Schulenburg, came hither: That Prince receiv'd Visits from all the Ministers residing here, and having return'd them set out last Night, together with Count Sinzendorff for the Hague. Yesterday Morning it being agreed, that no Conference should be held in the Town-house between the Ministers of the Allies, those of the Protestant Princes met at the House of the Ministers of Savoy, in order to confer with them on settling Matters of Religion in that Country: This Conference ended much to the Satisfaction of the former, the Plenipotentiaries of his Royal Highness having given them good Assurances that a due regard would be had to what they had offer'd, in relation to those Affairs. To Morrow being appointed for a Solemn Fast in this Country, no General Conference will be held before Saturday next, against which time the Ministers who are now at the Hague are expected here.

Hague, April 19. N. S. On Saturday the Sixteenth Instant, his Excellency the Earl of Strafford arriv'd here from Utrecht; and besides several Conferences he has had with the Pensionary and other Ministers of the States, a Deputation from their Body came Yesterday Morning to his House, where there was a Conference held, which lasted about an Hour. Prince Eugene, who went on Saturday in the Evening to Utrecht, return'd hither this Morning, together with Count Sinzendorff; both which assisted this Afternoon at another Conference the States General had desir'd with the Earl of Strafford. To Morrow being appointed a solemn Day of Devotion, there will be a Cessation of Business, as well here as at Utrecht; to which Place the Earl of Strafford intends to return on Thursday Night, in order to assist at the General Conference on Saturday next. Mr. Harley continues

ffues still here, and is making the necessary Preparations to proceed on his Journey to Hanover.

Whitehall, April 9. This Day his Grace James Duke of Ormond, Captain-General of all Her Majesty's Land Forces, set out from hence for Flanders, being accompany'd on his way by a great many of the Nobility and Persons of Quality.

Cowes, April 7. Last Night arrived here, in Twenty Nine Days, from New-York, the Flying-Horse of that Place for Holland, under Convoy of Her Majesty's Ship Lestoff, who in his Passage took a French Ship, bound for Newfoundland.

Bristol, April 9. This Day came in the John and Mordajca-Sloop of and from Barbadoes in Seven Weeks, and came over with a Packet from the Governor, as Express.
