

Whitcheaven, April 16. Captain Rombald arriv'd on the Twelfth from Carolina, and reports, that he left Charles Town in South Carolina, about the middle of February last; that about Ten Weeks before, a great number of Indians came down upon the People of North Carolina, and plunder'd and ravag'd the whole Country. Three Weeks before Captain Rumbald sail'd, the Governour of South Carolina sent a Party of White Men and Indians, to the number of Four hundred, against them, who still remain'd in North Carolina, but knows not what Success the said Party had.

Deal, April 22. Her Majesty's Ships the Arundel and Dover sail'd this Morning with some small Craft for Ostend.

St. James's, April 23. This being the Anniversary of Her Majesty's Coronation, She receiv'd the Compliments of all the Great Officers of State, the Nobility, Foreign Ministers, and other Persons of Distinction. In the Evening, in the Cities of London and Westminster, there were ringing of Bells, Bonfires, Illuminations, and all other publick demonstrations of Joy, suitable to so happy an Occasion.
