Plymouth, Aug. 28.

His day arrived here from the Streights feveral English Merchant ships, which came in company with the Holland and Smirna Fleet homewards bound, amongst others a ship of this Town formerly taken by the Sally Corfairs, and turned into a man of war, and fine, retaken.

From on board the Revenge off the North Cape, Aug, 13. On the 19th paft Sir Edward Sprage with his division, having at Lisbonne taken in his provisions and cleansed, went out to sea, having under his Convoy feveral Merchant ships bound for England; the next day early in the morning hearing feveral Guns to the Weitwards, he made all the fail he could towards the noife, and in lefs then an houistin e discovered Two Turks men of war attacquing a Swide, to whole timely refcue he came, the Turks imme at ly m. king away with all the fail they were able; after some time spent in a fruitlefs chace, Sir E 'mut i teturned to his Convoys, lea-ving the Swede to her lilerty, who had Three men only killed. The 27th ftanding in with the floar under Gep Monte, he d icovered anoth r Turk close under the floar, but no wind then flirring, the Turk had time to recover his boat which had been fent to shoar, but returned with so much halk, that Twelve of their men were left behind to the mercy of the Portugues, who killed Three of them and took the reft prifoners; about Four of the clock the wind blowing Northerly, the Turk kept his course to the Southwest, right with the Burlings, towards which place the Warmick with fome other veflels in vain pursued him, leaving the farther chace of him to Van Ghent with his Dutch squadron, who then was riding under the Burlings.

The 5th inftant Sir Edward came to an Anchor off Oporto, whither came to him five Merchant hips from that Port bound for England, who put themfelves under his protection, who being the 18th inftant again under fayl, he met with the Lifbonne Merclant an old Collier in 14 dayes from London bound for Lifbonne, mostly laden with Coals, but had the fortune the set inflant near the floar in th Luturde of 42 degrees and an half, to be let upon by the Admiral, of Argier of 60. Guns, and 700. m n, with his confort of 40. Guns and 500. m n, (luppofed to have been the fame, which a little before had attempted the Swede) The Admiral immediately boarded the poor Merchant, who had only 25 men and 16 Guns, clapping on as many men as they thought fufficient to have maftered her, and went off again, but the Englishentertained them with fo much pourage, that they in little time cleared the ship, forcing all the Turks overbourd, with little lofs, befides that of the Mafter of the ship, one Newman, a young man who was knockt on the head ; The Turks Admiral perceiving the ill fuccefs of his men, came up again and boardedthe Merchant with a great number of men, who continued the dispute for about three Glasses, in which time they loft many men, the reft being forced to throw themfelves overboard, amongit whom was one *Browne* a Renegado, but now Lieutenant to the Admiral, and a leading man in this encounter: After this the Admiral came up the third time; but his men were fo terrified, that only feaven of them durft adventure on board, whereof fix were immediately killed, and the other taken prifoner; This done the Turks left her to purfue her Courfe, wearing very eminent marks of that Encounter. Sir Edward Spragge gave her all the affiftance he could, and left her on her way for *Lifbonne*, himfelf going on to fecure the fhips uader his Convoy.

Cadiq, July 30. Here is newly arrived a French Tartan which left Teruan the 26th inftant, informing that Taffilette having intelligence that the people of Suq had united their forces with thôle of Santia Cruq, marched towards the farther part of Suq, with an Army of One hundred and forty thousand men, which fo terrify'd those people, that they prefent 4 him with their Leaders head, and with great fubmission b-gged his pardon; in confidence whereof, Taffilette matched towards Santia Gruq, with whose Governour, the people of Suq repenting of what they had done, underhand renewed their Legoue, and un xpectedly fetting upon his Army, who i.d the Van, himself hardly escaping, by night ent ed Morocco only with four Horse; the great Army dispersed and wholly broken in pieces: He has fince font to Feq, Tetuan, and other, places for recruits, but was refused, which is staken as a certain Omen of his approaching defiruction.

Cadiq, Aug. 10. Sir Thomas Allen with a fquadron of Six Fregats touched lately at this Portsfrom whence he departed the 6th inflant, having not met with any confiderable adventure upon the coafts of Barbary, more then the taking of an excellent Brea gantine of 28 Oars, and well equipped, belonging to the Duan of Argiers, which he forced on fhoar, and aft rwards fetched off with his Pinnaces without any lofs, and defigned her for the fervice of the Garifon of Tangier.

N adrid, Aug, 20. The 7th inftant Sir William Godolphin had an Audience from the Queen Regent upon the death of Madam, to whom he delivered Letters from His Majelty of Great Britain his Mafter upon that fubject which the Queen received with many expressions of forrow the Court hath fince put on mourning upon that occasion, and the Nobility, Councellors, and forreign Ministers made their compliments of condolence to the faid Sit William Godolphin.

On the 8th dyed in this Court Limofnera, Mayor to the Queen and Patriarch of the Indies in the 85th year of his age, the Queen has been pleafed to confe that dignity apon his Nephew Don Annonso Manrique.

The Presidentship of Flanders which has been long vacant, is conferred on the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo, who is also to retain his Charge of Master of the Hotse,

The 13th inftant, the Conde de Molina began his journey towards England,

Dantzig, Aug. 20. The General Land-day for 1 Prussia, is broken up without any Resolution, by reason of a quarrel between Bonkousky the Uayuode or Palatin of Pomerella, and Inliasky Uayuode of Mariemberg, the former appearing with a Company of Foot, a Company of Dragoons, and a Troop of horse, the latter having only with him 30. Horfe, thought it necessary to call in several of the Gentry, to ballance the number of his Adverfary, during the Aflembly fo much opposition was made on either fide, that the Deputies of the Cities fearing they might proceed with fo much violence as to hazard the Peace of the Country; refolved to depart and put an end to that Affembly; fome other of the leffer Diets in Poland have been alfo broken up with as little fuccefs, which gives us fome reason to fear the islue of the General Affembly.

The Polish Letters farther tell us, that the Coffacks of *Dorofensko's* party have taken and burnt the Town of *Bialacierkieu*, and were belieging the Caftle, which was feared might run much danger for want of Ammunition, but that General Sobiesky had fent away a Convoy of all noceflaries for its relief, with 2000 men, under the Command of the Sieur Chelmsky.

Venice, Aug. 23. Our Letters from Conflantinople inform us, that Chevalier Bayly Molino arrived there the 27th of June, having left the Vifier at Gallipoli, intending from thence to pafs to Adrianople to confult with the Grand Segnior what meafures to take in relation to the prefent flate of affairs in Conflantinople, where the Emperors brother has much gained upon the affections of the Janifarics, who feem refolved to protect him : the Vifier fiill continues careful for the repeopling of Candia, to erect there Magazines, and to eftablish a Trade.

On Saturday last went hence the Gally called La Braevianz, bound for Dalmatia, having on board Two Companies of Foot, which are to be dispeled of for the reinforcement of some of our Garifo's: the next day failed the Sampson and the Golden Cross, two of our men of war for Zante, with many Gentlemen on board them, carrying also the sum Ao thousand Ducats, configned to Proveditor General Bernardo, and so thousand Cecchines for General Molino.

The fame day arrived here the Gally Barbarigo from Zante: telling us, that Ten fhips are lately come in there with many Horfes and Soldiers aboard them, bound for Liefena; and that the Proveditor Bernando intended in perfon to undertake their Convoy, and to return again by the 25th inftant, to take order for the exchange of feveral prifoners with the Turks.

A Petach arriving from *Aleffandria* tells us, that the Plague rages much at *Tripoli* in *Syria*, and *Cyprus*, whereof the English Conful is dead; but that in all those places they are in great expectation of Confuls from this Republick, and the return of our Trade to those parts: this Petach met with the Captain of our Galeasses upon his way towards the Cape Santa Maria, having had intelligence of Four Pyrats who had much infested those feas, and had made fome attempts upon an English ship, and one other belonging to Legorn, but were forced off without fucces: at Zante he met with Segnior Battaglia, late Governor of Suda, who had delivered up his charge to his successfor Pesaro, who was well received by the Garrison, which he found in great order and good disciplinc.

The Senate have now given out their dispatches to Segnior Giou: Marosini, who will in little time fet forwards to enter upon his charge of Proveditor to the Armata; fevoral ships of great bulk are fitting

up to attend him, and amongst others, the great Alexander.

Segnior Michaeli, the Ambaffador from this Republick in the Court of *savoy*, being at his Audience, one of his Pages upon an affront received from a Page belonging to the French Ambaffador, happened to draw his fword, at which the Duke being offended, fent afterwards to the Ambaffador to demand his Page, whom he refufing to deliver, the Duke fent his Guards to befet the Ambaffadors houfe, who then was forced to deliver up his Page, who was immediately reftored to him again by the Duke. This Republick ill refenting this procedu e of the Duke, have recalled their Ambaffador, and fent to Rome to the perfon defigned by the Duke of Savoy for his Ambaffador to this place, to let him know that they cannot (upon what has happened) entertain him with that welcome which otherwife he might have expected.

Hague, Sept. 5. The news of the fudden march of the French forces put the States upon their Guard, who immediately ordered forces to be fent to ftrengthen the frontiers, but upon better information, that those forces were defigned ugon Lorrain, all jealoufies are vanifit, but it is full thought fit ro reinforce Maestricht with Six Companies of Foot, and Two Troops of Horse: the Ritinegrave, the Governor of that place is alfo endeavouring to put the Townsmeninto Arms, and to form them into Twenty Companies of Foot, who are to be exercifed and infructed in the war for the batter defence of the place; he is likewife taking care that the Corn in Outremcuse and Vroonhove may be thraffied out and brought into the Magazine at Maestricht.

The Government of Boifleduc, lately void by the refignation of the Prince de Tarante, is conferred on Colonel Kilpatrick a Scotch Officer, who has long ferved the States.

The East-India Company have lately refolved to fet out 28 ships, and to fend with them 8000 soldiers into the East-Indies, and to encourage such persons as are willing to go over to inhabit their Plantations in those parts, have promised them a free passage thither.

The Commander Schay is lately returned with his Convoy into the Texel, only one of his number was caft away at the entry into the Texel, but most of the Goods laved.

Paris Sept. 6. The Army defigned for Lorrain, on Thursday last Encamped near Reims, from whence they intended to march to Menebon. The Chevalier de Fourille who posses of the Marcy, sent lately a Summons to the Governour of Chaftel upon the Moifelle, and to know whether he kept that place for his most Chrissian Majesty, or for the Duke of Lorrain, but he answering for neither, but for his Soveraign Prince Charles of Lorrain; he has not yet resolved in what method to proceed with him.

The Prince of Tarente having quitted his Employment in Holland with his Religion, on the third inftant made a folemn profession of the Roman Catholick Religion at St Angers, in the prefence of the Bishop of that place.

Monfegnior Offave de Perigny Prefident of the third Chamber of Enquests, and Tutor to the Dauphin, dyed the first instant at St Germaines of a continued Feavor. The Dauphin has been ill of a Tertian Ague, which after two dayes changed into a double Tierce, but the fits less violent then before; Little Madam has been also ill, but upon change of the Air (she being now at Ruel) is senfibly upon Recovery.

The Mareshal de Crequy lay the 30th past at Mets, and was expected at Nancy the first instant.

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
