E have no affurances here that the Peace will be maintain'd by the Port; and the Letters V from Poland, give us Apprehensions of an ensuing Rupture. In the mean time great Preparations are making, for putting all things in a good Posture of Defence, and the Magazines are stor'd with Fire Arms. The Velt-Marshal Czeremetoss has fent Orders to Major-General Gunther, to be in a readiness, with the Officers of the Artillery, who are Quarter'd in this Town, to March to-wards Chioff, to prevent any Incursions that may

be made by the Tartars.

Vienna, April 30. N. S. The Count de Martinitz, who was formerly the Emperor's Ambassador at Rome, and Viceroy of Naples, being made a Member of the Imperial Privy-Council, has ta-ken the usual Oath and his Place accordingly. The Emperor, fome Days ago, declar'd the Count Khevenhiller to be Stadtholder and President of the Council of the Province of Lower Austria; and has regulated that College, by removing fifteen Members, restoring several that had been displaced, and creating some new ones: The like Regulations are daily expected in the Imperial Aulick Council, in the Treasury-Chamber, and some other Colleges. The Count de Paar is made Postmaster-General of the Hereditary Countries; and his Imperial Majesty has nominated the Court Ferdinand Kinski for his Ambassador at the Court of Great Britain; and likewise appointed General Heister to take upon him the Command of the Army in Hungary, during the following Campaign. within Cannon Shot of the fame.

Florence, April 27. N. S. The Convoy from Naples, which arriv'd at Orbitello on the Eighteenth of this Month, confided of two Men of War, seventeen Tartanes, and ten Felucias, having on Board some Troops, eighteen Pieces of heavy Cannon, besides some Mortars, two thousand Bombs, four thousand Grenadoes, with Powder and other Ammunition of War in proportion. The Duke of Tursis is arriv'd at Leghorn with three Gallies: They gave out at first, that they defigned to convoy Succours into Porto Ercole; but as they have few Soldiers on Board, and are but ill man'd, they seem not to be in a condition to give affistance to that Place. There have There have been such great Innundations in the South Parts of France, occasion'd by the late Rains, that they begin to fear a scarcity of Corn for this Year; and for that reason have already sent to buy up great quantities at Leghorne, which will confide-rably raise the Price of it in the Great Duke's Dominions.

Frankfort, April 28 N. S. The Marshal de Be-zons being return'd from visiting the Posts upon the River Louter, has provided a large Train of Artillery, and made great Preparations for a Siege: The Cavalry have been Canton'd about eight Days ago, and the Infantry are to be affembled this Week, and to be join'd with several Troops, which are now upon their March from the Neighbouring Provinces, fo that the Enemy will have a considerable Army upon the Rhine. Several of the imperial Forces, pass'd Yesterday by this Place, in above fifty Boats, for the Low Countries, and the remain-

der will follow with the first Opportunity.

Hamburg, May 6. N. S. Yesterday the several
