Turin, April 30. N. S.

Besides the Four German Battalions that march'd for Suza the last Week, his Royal Highness has thought fit to order those that remain at St. Baleine and Montanaro to advance that way, whither the rest of the Troops expected from Italy, as it is generally thought, will likewise march, so that the whole Body of the Forces will be speedily join'd at the Foot of the Mountains. The Court is gone into Mourning upon account of the late Dauphiness of France, who was a Daughter of his Royal Highness.

Lisbon, May 1. N. S. The King of Portugal has been somewhat indisposed, upon which his Physicians have advis'd him to a change of Air; and his Majesty having made a Visit at Salvaterra to his Brother Prince Don Francisco, who lately fell from his Horse in Hunting and broke his Thigh a little above the Knee, it is thought that he will continue there himself, 'till his own Health be better re-establish'd, especially since he is attended thither by his two other younger Brothers. The Queen is said to be several Weeks gone with Child. Although we have no Intelligence that the Enemy have made any great Preparations on their side, yet our Court have thought fitting that all the General Officers shall set out for the Frontiers: And the Lord Portmore, who lately return'd from reviewing the Garrison of Gibraltar, will set forwards in two or three Days towards the Province of Alentejo. The Brazil Fleet being expected home, Admiral Baker will to Morrow or next Day be ready to set sail for the Western Islands, in order to meet and Convoy it hither in its return. Commodore Morrice waits only for a fair Wind to sail with the Storeships for the Streights.

Tournay, May 18. N. S. On Saturday the Thirteenth Instant, his Grace the Duke of Ormond, Captain-General of the British Forces, review'd the two Battalions of the British Guards at their Camp at Basieux. Prince Eugene, the Earl of Albemarle, and the other General Officers at this Place, accompany'd his Grace, and were all extremely satisfy'd at the fine Appearance those Corps made, being compleat, and newly Cloath'd. Lieutenant-General Withers, who is Lieutenant-Colonel of the First Regiment of Guards, entertain'd his Grace, the Prince of Savoy, and other Generals, at Dinner; as General Lumley did the Lady Albemarle, with other Ladies and Persons of Distinction, who were at the Review. A good Number of the Imperial Troops which March in separate Bodies for their better Subsistence, and the ease of the Country, is arriv'd in this Neighbourhood, and the rest advance with all possible Expedition. It is agreed, that there shall be two Armies, one Commanded by his Grace the Duke of Ormond, and the other by the Prince of Savoy: The Regiments of which each of them are to consist, being appointed, and all other Matters finally adjusted, the Disposition is made for assembling all the Troops, which are passing the Scaupe, and forming the two Armies on Friday the Twentieth Instant, between Doway and Marchiennes,

where his Grace designs to join his Army with that of the Prince the same Day, and there concert such Measures as may be proper for their future Motions, in order to begin the Operations of the Campaign. The three Regiments of Imperial Horse, which arriv'd here Yesterday, fell in with two Parties of the Enemy, consisting of One hundred and fifty Foot, of whom they kill'd Sixty, and brought in Twenty Prisoners. The Enemy continue in their former Camp, between Cambray and the Desfette.

Brussels May 16. N. S. The Affairs concerning the Bread and Forage for the Imperial Troops that serve on this side, are now entirely finished, to the satisfaction of the Imperial Generals and Ministers. The States of the Provinces of Brabant, Hainault and Flanders, with Machlin, having consented to pay the Eleven hundred and fourteen thousand Guilders granted for that Service, in to the Imperial Commissaries Office established in this City upon that Occasion. Monsieur Vanderburgh, the Ordinary Dutch Deputy, is gone this Morning for Holland; and Mounseur Heems, the Emperor's Envoy, will also set out to Day on his return thither. Twelve Squadrons of Imperial Dragoons, with the Five Battalions of Eight hundred each, which arrived two Days ago, are to proceed this Morning from hence towards the Army under the Command of General Feltz. Count Tilly, General in Chief of the Dutch Forces, remains indispos'd at this Place.

Hague, May 15. N. S. On Friday in the Evening the States General held an extraordinary Assembly, at which four of their Plenipotentiaries, who came hither some Days since from Utrecht, were present: There was another Assembly held this Morning upon the same Occasion, and in the Evening the same Plenipotentiaries were in Consultation with the Pensionary Heinsius at his own House. The States of Holland and West-Freizland having taken their Resolution upon several weighty Affairs, are separated 'till the Thirty first of this Month.

Utrecht, May 17. N. S. Yesterday Morning most of the Ministers of the Allies had a Conference at the Town-house: In the Evening Mounseur Gossinga, Mounseur Randwyck, Mounseur Kniphuyzen and Mounseur Buys, four of the Plenipotentiaries of the States General, who some Days ago went to the Hague, came back to this Place, and having notified their return to the Plenipotentiaries of the Queen of Great Britain, and deliv'd at the same time, a Conference as soon as possible with their Lordships: Accordingly, by appointment, they met this Morning at the Earl of Strafford's House, where they had a Conference with him alone, the Lord Privy-Seal being not as yet perfectly recover'd of his late Indisposition. Brigadier Briton, who is frequently in Conference with the Prussian Ministers, has deferr'd his Journey to that Court for some Days. The Baron Forstner, Plenipotentiary from the Duke of Lorraine for the Treaty of Peace, is gone from hence to embark for England, where he designs to make but a short Stay, and return to his Post here.

Crookhaven, May 1. On the Twenty eighth of the last Month, Captain Camock, Commander of Her Majesty's Ship the Monk, having Intelligence of Two French Privateers upon the Coast, set Sail from Kinsale, and coming up with One of them the next Morning, made Prize of her, being a Vessel of Sixteen Guns and an Hundred and Fifty Men, nam'd the Salamander, commanded by Mounieur de Surville of Havre de Grace. On the Thirtieth he chas'd three Ships more, which prov'd to be the other Privateer and two Bristol Gallies which she had taken about Three a Clock that Morning. About One in the Afternoon, the Captain re-took one of the Gallies which was most a-stern, call'd the Bogle, of the value of Six thousand Pound, and gave Chase to the other two Vessels, but a Calm falling, he was forc'd to put into Crookhaven, from whence, with the first fair Wind, he will proceed to Kinsale.

Dartmouth, May 9. This Day came in here the Prince-George Privateer, of and for Jersey, Captain Papin Commander, but last from Falmouth, from whence he brought with him into this Port the Mary, a French Prize he took in February last, laden with Flower and other Provisions, bound for Martineco. He hath taken in all seven Prizes this Cruise and sent them for Jersey, but believes some are miscarried. Sunday last was Seven-night he went into the Road of St. Martins, and there found at Anchor a French Ship of Thirty six Guns (formerly a Man of War, but now the Charles of Saint Maloe) which he boarded under French Colours, and enter'd between Eighty and Ninety Men, and found One hundred and thirty French Men on board her, Commanded by the second Captain, (the first being ashore) who made little or no opposition; he cut her Cables, and brought her off, with all the Men: There was on board One hundred Tuns of Salt, a great quantity of Bisquet, and other Provisions, being bound for Newfoundland.
