

*Crookhaven, May 1.* On the Twenty eighth of the last Month, Captain Camock, Commander of Her Majesty's Ship the Monk, having Intelligence of Two French Privateers upon the Coast, set Sail from Kinfales, and coming up with One of them the next Morning, made Prize of her, being a Vessel of Sixteen Guns and an Hundred and Fifty Men, nam'd the Salamander, commanded by Mounieur de Surville of Havre de Grace. On the Thirtieth he chas'd three Ships more, which prov'd to be the other Privateer and two Bristol Gallies which she had taken about Three a Clock that Morning. About One in the Afternoon, the Captain re-took one of the Gallies which was most a-stern, call'd the Bogle, of the value of Six thousand Pound, and gave Chase to the other two Vessels, but a Calm falling, he was forc'd to put into Crookhaven, from whence, with the first fair Wind, he will proceed to Kinfales.

*Dartmouth, May 9.* This Day came in here the Prince-George Privateer, of and for Jersey, Captain Papin Commander, but last from Falmouth, from whence he brought with him into this Port the Mary, a French Prize he took in February last, laden with Flower and other Provisions, bound for Martineco. He hath taken in all seven Prizes this Cruise and sent them for Jersey, but believes some are miscarried. Sunday last was Seven-night he went into the Road of St. Martins, and there found at Anchor a French Ship of Thirty six Guns (formerly a Man of War, but now the Charles of Saint Maloe) which he boarded under French Colours, and enter'd between Eighty and Ninety Men, and found One hundred and thirty French Men on board her, Commanded by the second Captain, (the first being ashore) who made little or no opposition; he cut her Cables, and brought her off, with all the Men: There was on board One hundred Tuns of Salt, a great quantity of Bisquet, and other Provisions, being bound for Newfoundland.
