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Whitehall, May 16.

Yesterday in the Evening his Excellency the Earl of Strafford, Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary to the States-General of the United Provinces, and One of Her Majesty's Plenipotentiaries for the Treaty of a General Peace at Utrecht, arrived here from Holland.

Dantzick, May 11. N. S. The Muscovite Generals have order'd the Troops which had their Winter Quarters in the Bishoprick of Ermelandt, and the Regiment of Guards of Sinionowsky to join them here. Prince Dholorucky, who is come hither from Thorn, and has taken up his Quarters at Natzenhoven; and General Bruce, who Lodges within half a League of the City, have made a Review of the Troops, and it is not yet known when they will proceed for Posterionia. The Vessels prepared at Elbing laden with Artillery, Bombs, Granaadoes, and other Ammunitions of War, are in a readiness to sail. Yesterday General Bruce desir'd to speak with some of the Magistrates, who sent two of their Councillors, Monsieur Duffeldorp and Monsieur Schoeman, to confer with them. The General told them, he had formerly made some Proposals to them, to which they had given no satisfactory Answer; but he expected, that if the Sums demanded might seem too large, they would at least contribute the half of them. The three Orders of the City assembled Yesterday, and are not yet come to any Resolution.

Frankfort, May 8. N. S. The Marshal de Bezons has ordered all the Villages in Alsace, to furnish a large quantity of Hay and Straw for the French Army near Haguenau; he is now gone for Strasbourg, to inform the Marshal d'Harcourt upon his arrival there, concerning the Posture of Affairs upon the Upper Rhine. The latter is expected with the utmost Impatience by the Troops, and especially the Officers, who hope for the Payment of their Arrears, and that they shall be enabled to raise Contributions on the other side of the River. On the other hand, the Duke, Regent of Wirtemberg, uses his utmost Application to put all his Forces in a readiness, and is forming the Imperial Army at Etlingen; towards which, the Troops are daily marching. Two Battalions, one belonging to the Emperor, the other to the Circle of Swabia, are pass'd thorough this Place for Etlingen, having with them Twenty Pieces of Cannon, design'd to be plac'd in the Forts of Benheim, Rothberg and Scholbrun. The Circle of Swabia will raise two new Regiments for the farther Security of their own Country. Several Members of the Empire have brought in their Quota's in Money for the Operations of the ensuing Campaign.

Hanover, May 13. N. S. The Count de la Verne continues still under his Confinement and Examination, which, as soon as it is finished, will be sent to the Court of Vienna, at whose Instance it was, that

he was seiz'd in the Territories of this Electorate. The King of Denmark, upon the Representations that have been made to him by Monsieur Bickler his Electoral Highnesses Minister, has resolv'd to suspend the Commerce with Seeland for two Months. The same Minister has been very solicitous with the Council of the King of Denmark, to obtain the restitution of two Vessels belonging to the City of Hamburg, which were seiz'd in Norway, without having receiv'd any other Answer, than that they could come to no Resolution in that Affair, till their Master had receiv'd Satisfaction in several other Matters relating to that City. His Electoral Highness, with his Court, will take the opportunity of the first fair Weather, to go to his Palace of Herenhausen, where the Court will continue during this Summer.

Berlin, May 14. N. S. On Monday last the King and Queen went from Oranienbutz to Potsdam, and were follow'd by the Prince and Princess Royal, and will continue there for some Weeks. His Czarrish Majesty is sending a Body of his Troops, consisting of Twelve thousand Men into Pomerania, and a Detachment commanded by Count Gallieze, will march thither thorough this Country. The Muscovite Envoy is daily in Conference with the Ministers of this Court, concerning the regulations to be observ'd by these Forces in their passage, for their provision and Subsistence, but the Methods are not as yet adjusted. Monsieur Plantancour is shortly expected here, to reside at this Court, as Envoy from the King of Poland, in the room of Monsieur Mautruffel. This Day we receiv'd the advice of the Death of the Margrave of Bareith, who was Brother-in-Law to his Prussian Majesty.

Cologne, May 10. N. S. The Palatin Regiment of Horse of Count Vehlen, and Colonel Woolfskeek's Regiment of Foot belonging to Wurtzburg, pass'd the Rhine on Friday last, part at this Place, and part at Mulheim, from whence they will pursue their March to the Meuse, taking their Route by Berchem and Juliers. There have been several Conferences held at Hadamar between the Deputies of the Princes of Nassau Dielenbourg, Siegen and Dietz, upon the Succession and Partition of the Dutchy of Hadamar; the Landgrave of Hesse-Cassel has his Plenipotentiary there, to look after the Interests of the Young Prince of Nassau-Dietz, to whom he is Guardian.

Brussels, May 19. N. S. The Regiments of Neubourg, in the Service of the Emperor, that were encamp'd in the Plains near the Gate of Anderlecht, together with the Horse Quarter'd in this City, march'd hence Yesterday for Flanders, by the way of Gand. Prince Eugene, of Savoy's Regiment of Horse, and another of Quinassers, together with four Regiments of Foot, came hither Yesterday; the Horse lie in the Town, and the Foot encamp in the Meadows; from whence, after having rested one Day, they will proceed directly for the Army.
