Lisbon, May 24. N.S. The Lord Portmore is gone to the Frontier, where our Forces are canton'd about Estremos, Elvas, Villaviciosa, Borba, and the neighbouring Places: We have this Day advice from thence, that the Marquis de Bay has pass'd the Caya with a strong Body of Horse, and we hourly expect to hear of the further Motions of the Enemy. Commodore Morrice sail'd from hence for the Streights on the First Instant; and on the Second, Admiral Baker set Sail for the Western Islands, in order to meet with the Ships coming from Brazil, and convoy them fafe into this Harbour. The Convoy for England and Holland, confifting of Five English and as many Dutch Men of War, under Commoldore Crowe, are to Sail to Morrow.

Florence, May 17. N. S. Our freshest Advices from the German Camp import, that the Garrison of Monte Philippo, being about One hundred and fixty Men, were made Prisoners of War, but that the Garrison of Porto Ercole, confishing of Five hun-dred Men, were permitted to march out with the usual Marks of Honour, excepting that they were to take no Cannon, nor Persons in Masks along with them, as they had defired: There were sound in these two Places Thirty four Brais, and Twenty two Iron Pieces of Cannon, two Mortars, and a great quantity of Ammunition and Provisions. The whole loss of the Besiegers amounted only to Thirty six Men Kill'd, and Fifty Wounded. The Camp is broke up, and the Imperial Troops continue their March towards the Milanese. From the Camp at Solemes, May 28. N. S. The great Convoy of Artillery and Ammunition, confist-ing of an Hundred forty feven Poats, which came from Gand to Tournay, is arriv'd at Marchiennes, and will proceed from thence under the Guard of Count Vehlen with the Palatin Troops, and Six hundred Men out of the Garrison of Tournay. In order to secure all such Convoys as shall be sent from Marchiennes to the Camp, a Body of Troops, consisting of Thirty Squadrons of Horse, and Thirteen Bartalions of Foot, under the Command of the Earl of Albemarle, is encamp'd at Denain on the other fide of the Schelde, out of which his Lordthip is, upon occasion, to furnish such a Number of Forces as may be necessary to Guard the Lines drawn from that Place to the Scarpe. We have Intelligence from the Camp of the Enemy, that when the Detachment of Four thousand Horse of both our Armies, and all the Grenadiers of the Duke of Ormond's Army, advanc'd as far as the Source of the Schelde, the French endeavour'd to secure the Abby of Tochel, and are now making Retrenchments upon all the I affages of the Schelde, below that Place. We have Intelligence from Cambray, that the same Day, about Five a Clock in the Morning, all the Officers march'd out of the Town to the Camp, but return'd about Two in the Afternoon, when they began to perceive that there was only a Detachment lent to observe their Motions and view their Situation.

Utrecht, May 314 N. S. The Ministers of the Allies residing here, had Yesterday a Conference, as usual, at the Townhouse, and it was then agreed, that no Meeting of that kind should be held on Thursday next. fame Day Mr. Harley went to Amsterdam, designing to return to Night; he waits only the arrival of the next Letters from England, before he proceeds on his way to Hanover.

On the fourth of February last Capt. Constable, of the Panther, took the Gallatea, a French Ship of War of thirty Guns, and Two hundred and twenty Men; and on the Seventeenth a Merchant Ship laden with Wines and Brandies from Bourdeaux, as also another Merchant Ship on the Twenty first, laden with Wines and Brandies. On the Eleventh of February last, Capt. Smith of the Enterprize, took the John of Nants; on the Eighteenth the St. James, of Ten Guns, from Bourdeaux, both laden with Wine, Brandy and Provisions; and on the Twenty third of the faid Month, he took the Laloire, a French Man of War from Rochford, of Thirty Guns, and Two hundred thirty seven Men. On the Twentieth of February last, Capt. William Elford, of the Hector, took the Victoria of Bourdeaux, of Eighteen Guns and Seventy six Men. On the Twenty second of February last, Capt. Matthew Elford, of the Experiment, took a Ship of One hundred and eighty Tuns, and Twenty two Men, from Rochel, partly laden with Wine and Brandies. On the Twenty fixth of April last, Capt.
