Falmouth, Aug. 29.

He 27th instant passed before this Harbor about 22 sail of ships standing away to the Eastwards, and were supposed to be the Streights Fleet homewards bound.

Lyme, Aug. 31. The 29th instant arrived here the Sarah of this place from o orlais, and yesterday a small French vessel from Crossick, telling us that the French men of war which were sitting out at Brest are designed for the Streights and other places, to be employed in the room of such other ships as have been long at sea upon the Mediterranean and other places, and are lately returned, or are now returning home.

Rome, Aug. 16. The Pope enjoys his health, and spends more of his time in giving Audience, and in dispatching publick affairs then could be expected of a person of his years and constitution, giving little heed to his Physicians, who advise him not to

weary himself with business.

Chevalier Borri, a person eminent for his Chymistry, but more known for his notorious Heresie, for which he was formerly condemned here, but made his escape, was the 7th instant brought hither prisoner from Vienna, and has endeavoured both by poyson and abstinence to avoid the execution of the sentence, which he expects will be pronounced against him; his Process will be suddenly formed, but upon the Emperors intercession, tis believed he may have the favour to escape the fire.

The Portugal Ambassador has not as yet prevailed with the Pope for the confirmation of the Bishops which were nominated by the Prince Regent to succeed in the vacancies in that kingdom, it being here pretended that the Right only of presentation belongs to that Crown, and that the example of King Phalip the IV is not to be alledged as a President, his nomination proceeding only from the Popes indulgence, as a special favour to that King.

This Ambassador intends a speedy return home to Lisbonne, whither Monsegnior Ravezza, the

Popes Nuncio is already gone.

Yesterday the Pope went to the Church of St Mary the Great, where after a folemn Mass, he made the usual distribution of Purses for the Marriage of feveral poor Virgins, but finding that the people did not fill the air with their acclamations as he had observed them to do to former Popes his Predecesfors, and being informed that they expected to be eased of their Gabels, and to reap some effects of his bounty, he feemed much concerned, declaring the great kindness he had for the City more then many of his predecessors, he being a Roman; that he found the Revenues of the Church much exhausted, but was endeavouring to retrench all unnecessary expences, which he had already began to do, both as to his Table and the Pensions which might be expected from him, so that he hoped in due time to give the people some eminent testimonies of his good affection towards them.

From Naples we are told, that the Banditi, who upon the approach of the Spanish Companies were

retired to their Mountains and fastnesses, were again returned into Abruzzo, where they committed many infolencies, and seised on several persons of Quality, whom they forced to redeem themselves with extraordinary sums of Money; The Viceroy sinding it was to little or no purpose to pursue them, with force, is endeavouring to reduce them by publishing a pardon in the Kings name to all such of them as will come in and list themselves for Three years in the Kings service.

umbstadt, Aug. 19. One of the Guards which lately attended the Young Prince Palatine in his. Travels, is lately returned from Zurick, where he left the said Prince in health, and much satisfied with the great Respect, and many demonstrations of affection he there met with, all the people from the Mountains and Towns adjacent flocking into the Town to see him.

He intends from thence to Visit Berne, and afterwards Geneva, in both which places the Magi-strates intend to receive him with all the Honour

imaginable.

Madam the Princess Palatine has been received very honourably at *Hanouer*, where she was attended and Visited by the Duke of Zel, and Bishop of Osnabrug, and most of the persons of the greatest Honour and Quality thereabouts: at her departure, the Duke of Hanouer made her a rich Present of a pair of Bracelets set with Diamonds and Rubies, and a rich Chariot with six Mares, presenting her also with several Bars of Silver from his Mines; giving also to those of her Train, several demonstrations of his Kindness and Bounty; accompanying and conducting the Princess as far as Cassl, from whence her Highness intends after some sew dayes stay, to return by the way of Heidleberg into France.

Madrid, Aug. 20. Since the disorders which happened at the Bull-sports, the Councils thought fit to desire the Queen Regent, that the Regiment of Guards, to whom they would attribute the disasters that have happened, might be sent out of Town to Quarter in the neighboring Towns, but the Queen was willing rather to find out some other method, and to order, that whosoever, Algozil or foldier should presume upon any quarrel to draw his sword should be immediately hanged without mercy; and to Command the Officers of the Regiment of Guards, to take carethat the soldiers be kept and confined to their Quarters, so that they may not appear in the streets to occasion any disorder. The Count de Melgar is still confined to Burgos, and an Alcaid who was observed to be over-active in the quarrel, banisht for ever from this City, and declared incapable of bearing any Office for the future within the Spanish Dominions.

The Queen Regent has thought fit to reward the services of the Marquis de Castel Rodrigo, formerly Governor of the Netherlands, with the charge of President of the Council of Flanders and Burgundy,

The Three Colledges are now falling upon the debate for the proportioning of numbers of forces which are to be charged upon the several Circles, and the present raising of them, every Circle is to hav a particular General of their own, but tis not yet thought convenient to proceed to the nomination of a Generalissimo upon the junction of the forces in case of necessity and publick danger.

The Prince Elector of Bavaria was expected the 24th instant at Saltzbourg; the Elector of Cologne has passed by Bartolfgaden, and is proceeding on

his way for Italy.

Letters from Poland inform us, that feveral of the lesser Diets were broken, and particularly those of Massovia, Czierko, Plosko, Lenza, Kiovia, Breslam, Podlakii, and Cracovia, but his Majesty intended to enable them by his fresh Letters to re-assemble be-fore the General Diet. The Deputies of Great Poland, Seradie, and some other Provinces intend to appear at the General Diet at Wr/ m on horseback with their Arms, and if possible, to prevent the Rupture of that Assembly.

One Tetera, formerly Ge eral of the Coslacks is lately fled into Walachia, endeavouring to porfwade the Turks to make some attempt upon Po-Hand. The Turks are repai ing the Bridges and High-ways leading towards Malachia in which Countrey they are making great Magazines for the entertainment of a great Army, which gives the Poles cause of jealousie, lest they may give them

fome disturbance the next Spring.

Letters from Rufsia mention the finking of a great Mountain of that Countrey into the Earth, in the place whereof remains at present a great Lake.

Letters from Uhrania assirm, that there has been a great engagement between the Polish Army and the he Poles have gotten a confiderable artar, n vict ry and slain ag eat number of the Tartar, b tn twithout the e pence of much Polish blood.
