The Marquis de C ft s our Govéinour, and his Majesties Lieurenant Genetal of this Province, is lately returned hith r from Vivarets, and was at his Entry into this City, R cerred and Con plymented by the Confuls and other Magistrates, in which their address, they forgot rot to own the Obligations of the whole Province to hi, who by his presence and good Cond At, had bee very inftrumental in the Redustion of those Rebels to his Majesties Obedience, and r ftoring P ace to the Country.

H r bourg, Ano, 31. From Rostock in Pomerania they write, that Three Danish men of war and Eight Pleasure-1 at abethe e ex c ed to attend upon the Princess of Saxony, elder Sister to the King of Denmark; and rom Berlin, that the Elector of Brandenbo rg was g ne from Tangermond to Spendel, where h wa to meet and conferr with the Prince of Lun nbourg

From Rati b nne they inform, that the Emperors C mniftoner the Prince and Bifhop of Aichfult being t cov red from his indiposition, was removed from the Chartreux neer that City, to Arenfr dorf, havi  $\sigma$  hift rec ived from the Deputies of the Thr e Colledge the retolution of the Empire upon fev ral points of great concernment, to which they defir the Em erors confent, amongft others, is their re ult f r the raifing forces for the publick fecurity of the En pire, with the Garanty of the Ten Circless with the kingdom of Bohomia, and the indorporated Provinces. The Three Colledges are now falling upon the debate for the proportioning of numbers of forces which are to be charged upon the feveral Circles, and the prefent raifing of them, every Circle is to hav a particular General of their own, but tis not yet thought convenient to proceed to the nomination of a Generalifimo upon the junction of the forces in cafe of neceflity and publick danger.

The Prince Elector of Bavaria was expected the 24th inftant at Saltzbourg; the Elector of Cologne has paffed by Bartolfgaden, and is proceeding on his way for Italy.

Letters from Poland inform us, that feveral of the lefter Diets were broken, and particularly those of Maffovia, Czierko, Plosko, Lenza, Kiovia; Bresslam, Poslakit, and Cracovia, but his Majesty intended to enable them by his fresh Letters to re-assemble before the General Diet. The Deputies of Great Poland, Seradie, and some other Provinces intend to appear at the General Diet at W r/m on horseback with their Arms, and if possible, to prevent the Rupture of that Assembly.

One Tetera, formerly Ge eril of the Coflacks is lately fled into Walachia, endeavouring to porfwade the Turks to make fome attempt upon Poland. The Turks are repai ing the Bridges and High-ways leading towards Malachia in which Countrey they are making great Magazines for the entertainment of a great Army, which gives the Poles caufe of jealoufie, left they may give them fome diffurbance the next Spring.

Letters from *Rufsia* mention the finking of a great Mountain of that Countrey into the Earth, in the place whereof remains at prefent a great Lake.

Letters from Ul rania affirm, that there has been a great engagement between the Polush Army and the

artar, n he Poles have gotten a confiderable vict ry and flain ag eat number of the Tartar, b t n t without the e pence of much Polish blood.

P ris, S pt. 10. The Dauphin continues fill un. d r his diftemper, but the fits of his Ague lefs violent th n they were : fince the death of Monfieur de Per gni, the Bishop of Condom is defigned to fuce ed in his Charge as Tutor to the Dauphin.

The D ke of Lorrain is faid to be retired to Befinçon in Burgundy, without any force confiderable bef des t ofe of his Guards, leaving his Countrey to the French, who are posseffing themfelves of his Towns, and intend to rate the fortifications and to lay them fo open, that they may not be in a capacity for the future to make any opposition.

The King continues at St Germains, where on Saturday last he made a great entertainment, at which his Grace the Duke of Buckingham was prefent.

The Heer de Groot, Ambaffador Extraordinary from the States of the United Provinces has fince his arrival been fo much afflicted with the Gout, that he has not had any interval to put himfelf in order for his publick Audience.

Deal, Sept. 2. This day arrived the Welçome from Bantam laden upon the account of the East-India Company, having not touched ly the way at anyPort she has had a great mortality amongsther men, and had the missfortune about Seven moneths since to run on ground, where she lay in much danger for Three hours, but got off again not without some Leaks, for which they have been ever since obliged to ply their Pump.
