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*Petersburg, May 1. N. S.*

**H**IS Czarish Majesty has had an Account from the Baron de Schaffroff, at Constantinople, that when the Keys of Asoph were brought thither, several Turkish Ministers of Distinction came to visit him, and wish him Joy of the prospect of the continuance of Peace between the two Courts, assuring him, that the greatest part of the Divan were inclinable to it; and that the Mufti had protested against the War, and the Janizaries would not hear any mention made of a Campaign. We have since had the agreeable News of the Confirmation of the Peace, and that the Articles were Sign'd. The Velt-Marshal Czerepnoff, and the High-Admiral Apraxin, are daily expected here. The Danish Secretary, Monsieur Pfalck, has frequent Conferences with his Majesty concerning the Affairs of Pomerania.

*Frankfort, May 14. N. S.* Several Hundred Recruits are pass'd thorough this Place for the Imperial Regiments in Flanders. They have a report here, that a Body of Ten thousand Hussars will march for the Low Countries, as soon as the Emperor is Crown'd King of Hungary. The Regiment of Diesbach is march'd for Vado to embark upon the Confederate Fleet for Barcelona. The Margrave of Brandenburg Bareith died the last Week. The Duke Regent of Wirtemberg is at present forming the Army of the Empire in the Lines of Etlingen, with great application.

*Frankfort, May 19. N. S.* We have intelligence from Alsace, that the Marshal de Bezons intended to form the French Army near Haguenau this Week, and that the Marshal d'Harcourt was expected at Strasburg with a Train of Artillery to open the Campaign with some Enterprize of Importance, but the greatest part of the German Troops which are to compose the Army of the Empire, being already arrived in the Lines of Etlingen, and we having certain advice, that the Regiment of Dragoons of Schonborn, and the Imperial Cuirassiers of Neubourg, are in full march towards the Upper Rhine, thorough the Upper Palatinate, and the Territories of the late Margrave of Brandenburg Bareith, we are in no apprehensions of what the French may undertake upon the Upper Rhine. The Margrave of Brandenburg Olnotzbaek is brought to bed of a young Prince to the great Joy of that Court.

*Stafford, May 12. N. S.* We have Advice here, that the Canton of Zurich had sent a Deputy to the three Leagues of the Grisons, to demand their Assistance, in the Name of both the Cantons of Zurich and Berne, in case they should have occasion for it, pursuant to their ancient Alliances; and that such Officers of the Grisons as were willing to engage in the Service of those Cantons might have Permission to do so; and we are assured that the Grisons have agreed to both the Proposals. The Troops of Zurich and Berne gain Ground daily in the Thurgaw and as they pass take an Oath of Fidelity to the Principal of the Communality. The Vallaisars, at the request of the Catholic

Cantons; have declared that they will put all their Militia under Arms, to make a Division upon the Canton of Berne, if they should come to an open Rupture. The Inhabitants of four or five Towns in the lower Tockenburg having at first taken the part of the Abbot of St. Gall, and afterwards taken an Oath of Fidelity to the Regency, and then gone over to the Abbot, leaving their Wives and Children behind them to have Subsistence in that Country, and give them Intelligence; the Officers of Zurich and Bern, that are in Tockenburg, have confiscated the Goods of all those Families, and sent them to their Husbands and Fathers who are now in Weil for the defence of the Place.

*Basel, May 26. N. S.* The Town of Weil is surrendered to the Troops of the Canton of Zurich and Berne, who having put a strong Garrison into the Place marched directly to Gassan, which immediately put it self under their Protection. These Troops have not only seized on the strong Castles of the Upper and Lower Thierberg, but have likewise made themselves Masters of the Abbey of St. Gall. In the mean time another Body of the Troops of Zurich entered the Town of Melligen, which surrendered at Discretion: After which both the Armies marched to Brengarten, a small Town upon the Ruis, which will not be able to make any great Resistance. The Neutral Cantons endeavour to dispose both Parties to an Accommodation, and they are not without hopes of effecting it.

*Berlin, May 27. N. S.* Prince Menschikoff pass'd through Swed on Monday last in his way for Pomerania. Upon the Advices that the Peace is concluded between the Turks and the Muscovites, the latter are said to design to augment their Troops in Pomerania to the Number of Forty thousand Men. They write from Dresden, that Monsieur Bislianski, Marshal of the Crown of Poland, was gone through Dresden to wait on King Augustus at Gareltsbad. Duke Christian of Saxe-Weissenfels, who succeeds the late Duke John-George his Brother, is lately married to the Countess-Dowager of Mansfeld at Axtorn.

*Hamburg, May 27. N. S.* We have Advice from Viepna, that Prince Antony de Lichtenstein some Days ago retired to his Country Seat in Moravia; and that the Prince de Trautson, the Count de Wratislas, and the Baron de Seilern, have lately received distinguishing Marks of Favour from his Imperial Majesty; and that the latter was named among other Commissioners to examine the Count de la Verne. Upon the Tenth of this Month *Te Deum* was Sung, and a triple Discharge was made of the Artillery, that being the Anniversary for the Deliverance of Barcelona in the Year One thousand seven hundred and six, from the Siege of the French and Spanish Troops. Our Letters from Paetzick bring us various Reports as to the Resolutions of the Senate and Burgeses of that Place; somewhat they will remain firm to the utmost Extremity, rather than agree to the Proposals of the Muscovites; but fresher Advices bring that they will instead of the Hundred thousand Crowns which they demand, furnish them with a quantity of Corn of an equal Value at their Departure. Yesterday a Courier

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
