Petersburgh, May 23. N. S.

ON the thirtieth of the last Month in the Evening the Czar came hither from Chronshlofs, but returned back the next day, and on the fourth Instant put to Sea with four Frigats to Convey a second Transport of Provisions to Wyburg, where they arrived on the fifth, and having unladen returned back on the eighth, without meeting with any Accident. The Czar cruized all that time at Sea, but saw no Swedish Vessel. There are three Swedish Ships of force not far from Revel, which have winter'd in Helinslofs, but it is supposed that they wait for Stores and Provisions before they will venture to come up hither. The Magazines of Wyburg are now sufficiently provided for the ensuing Year: The first Transport carried Fifteen thousand Sacks of Meal, and the second had Twenty two thousand Sacks on Board with all other Stores in proportion. When the Czar returned the first time from Wyburg, he was in very great danger of being lost; for having imbarck'd on a half Galley, and missed his Frigats, which should have stayed for him, but did not observe the Signal, he was forced to cross over the Sea in a violent Storm in that sort of Vessel which is very improper for ill Weather, and they were more than once afraid of being cast away. On the eighth Instant in the Night a Courier arrived with Letters from Monsieur Schaphiroff of the sixth of April, old Stile, and the important News, that the Peace was confirmed with the Port for Twenty five Years, to which the good Offices of the English and Dutch Ministers, had not a little Contributed. The Czar received the News at Chronshloffe on the ninth in the Morning, and his Majesty came hither the same Evening. Yesterday the Czar made a great Entertainment, and desired the Ministers of England and Holland to return his Thanks to their Principals for this Mark of their Friendship. The Czar will set out for Pomerania about the End of this Month. The Admiral Apraxin is arrived here from the Ukraïn, and will stay here this Summer, to command in Chief on these Frontiers, during the Absence of his Czarish Majesty.

Turin, May 28. N. S. The Princess of Carignan being much indisposed of late, is advis'd to drink the Waters of Lucca, for which Place she designs to go by the way of Genoa: She has been at the Venerie, to take her leave of their Royal Highnesses. Upon the Twenty fourth Instant, his Royal Highness, with the rest of the Court, came hither to assist at a Procession, and the next Day they return'd to the Venerie, having chang'd the resolution of staying here, and deferred it till the next Month. All things are quiet on our Frontiers, as well as on the side of the Enemy. The Cavalry of his Royal Highness is now in motion, and will very soon be encamped at Oyballon, as in former Years.

Hamburg, June 10. N. S. Yesterday we had News from Breslaw, that his Swedish Majesty was come within Fourteen Leagues of Cracow, and this is confirm'd by other Letters from Dantzick, and

likewise by those which came from Cracow. His Czarish Majesty has provided a second Transport of Provisions for Wyburg, and is returned to Petersburgh, where he received upon the Day of his arrival, an Express from Constantinople, which brought the ratification of the Treaty of Peace between his Majesty and the Port. The Muscovite Troops that were encamped about Dantzick, are upon their March from those Territories. A Body of Seven thousand Horse of that Nation, are arrived at Landsgberg in their way to Pomerania. The Governor of Elbing has sent a Messenger to the Minister of the Czar, who resides here to let him know, that he Daily expects the arrival of the Czar, with all his Family, who will remain at Elbing, whilst his Majesty makes the Campaign in Pomerania. The Danish Fleet is at present at Bornholm, in a readiness to obstruct any Enterprizes that may be made upon them by the Swedes, but the Distemper which has lately rag'd among them, has been the Occasion that they are not so well Man'd, as they might have been otherwise. The Minister of the King of Denmark has receiv'd Orders not to send any more Letters to Coldingen, and his Majesty is expected at Rendsburg in a few Days. The Inhabitants of the Dutchy of Bremen, are under an apprehension, that the Danish Troops will March into their Territories, and thereupon the Principal Inhabitants have removed their best Effects into this Place. His Highness the Duke of Wolfenbuttle is expected here this Night or to Morrow, and he is to have an Apartment at the House of the Count of Schonborn; that Prince's coming hither has occasioned a great many different Speculations. The Diet of Holstein is finished, to the satisfaction of both the Regencies.

Hamburg, June 12. N. S. The Muscovite Forces have at last quitted the Territories of Dantzick, and have done it with so good Order, that the Senate of that City have had no reason to complain. The Prince Doloruki, who Commanded those Troops has sent a Party of Five hundred Men into the Bishoprick of Warsaw, to wait there for the arrival of his Czarish Majesty. General Ronne is to pass by Thorn, with a Body of Muscovites, which consists only of Infantry, and will go directly through the Upper Poland for Pomerania. The Aid de Camp which was sent to the King of Prussia by Prince Menzikoff has received an Answer to the two Proposals he was ordered to make to that Court, to this Effect, that his Prussian Majesty could not permit any Bridges to be made over the Oder; and that when the Muscovite Troops had Invested Stetin, he would forbid his Subjects to carry any Victuals or other Provisions into the Place.

Falmouth, June 6. This Day came in here Her Majesty's Ships Ruby and Bedford, to Convey the Tyr Vessels that are bound for London, &c. Just now sailed the Mercury Packet with two Mails for Lisbon, Capt. Green Commander; and the Coulston Galley of this Place, for the Canaries and Newfoundland.
