The humble Address of the Lord Mayor, Aldermen, and Commons of the City of London, in Common-Council Assembled.

Most Gracious Sovereign !

**I**T is with the utmost Gratitude and sincerest Duty, that we presume to approach Your Sacred Majesty, to return our most humble and hearty Thanks for the great Confidence You have been pleased to place in Your Subjects, by condescending to Communicate to them the Terms on which a Peace may be made.

That affectionate Zeal which they have always shewn for Your Majesty's Person and Government, must take still deeper Root in their Hearts, and express it self in all the Instances of Loyalty and Obedience, from the grateful Sense they have of Your Majesty's tender Care in designing principally, and pursuing steadily, the true Interest of Your own Kingdoms.

As there is nothing nearer to Your Majesty's Heart, than the assuring the Protestant Succession, as by Law Established, in the House of Hanover, so there can be nothing more Grateful to Your Subjects, than to find that particular Care is taken to have it acknowledged in the strongest Terms.

We of this City should be utterly regardless of our Interest, as well as unmindful of our Duty, if we did not in a particular manner express our Thankfulness for the Inestimable Benefits we and our Posterity may hope to reap, from the distinguishing Care Your Majesty hath taken of the British Commerce; by securing our Trade in those Parts where it hath been molested, by restoring it where it hath been lost, and by extending it to Places to which it hath not, as yet, reached.

May Your Majesty speedily finish that good Work which Your Great Wisdom hath so far advanced, notwithstanding the Artful Contrivances, and envious Efforts, of a Factious and Malicious Party: And may You long live to reap the happy Fruits of a Safe and Honourable Peace.

**T**HIS Address is very Acceptable to Me, and I return you My Thanks for it.

My Aim has been to secure Our Religion, the Protestant Succession, and your Liberties, to provide for the Safety of My Allies, to ease My own Subjects of the heavy Burthen they lie under, and to improve and enlarge Our Trade: All which Benefits, I hope, will be obtained by the Blessing of God on the present Negotiations for Peace.

Most Gracious Sovereign !

**W**E humbly beg Leave to Approach Your Majesty, with a just Acknowledgment of Your Majesty's most Gracious Condescension, in acquainting Your People, That France hath (at last) been brought to Offer, upon what Terms a General Peace may be made.

We want Words to express our Gratitude to Your Majesty, for the Care You have taken of the Protestant Succession, as by Law Established, in the House of Hanover, the steady Pursuit of the true Interest of Your Own Kingdoms, and the Satisfaction of Your Allies, maugre all the Difficulties which have Artfully been contriv'd to obstruct the same.

Madam, As we have an entire Confidence, that nothing will be wanting on Your Majesty's Part, in the Progress of this Negotiation; so we humbly depend on Your great Wisdom, for the completing so Great and Good a Work.

To which Address Her Majesty was pleased to make this following most Gracious Answer.

**I** Give you my hearty Thanks for this Address. I am satisfied with your Duty and Loyalty, and you may depend upon my steady Endeavours to secure the Protestant Succession, and the Government as by Law Established in Church and State, and to promote the true Interest of all my Subjects.

And as a Mark of Her Royal Favour, Her Majesty was pleased to confer the Honour of Knighthood on John Cas, Esq; and William Stewart, Esq; the present Sheriffs of London and Middlesex, and Samuel Clarke, Esq;

By the Act for laying Duties upon Paper, Mildboard, &c.

**I**T is Enacted, That for all Paper Stock in hand, viz. For all Paper, (whether of Foreign or British Manufacture) and for all Pastboards, Mildboards and Scaleboards which any Merchants, Stationers, Wholesale-Sellers, Retailers, Printers, Paper-Makers, or other Dealers in Paper, or any Persons in Trust for them, shall be possessed of, or interested in, on the 24th of June Instant for Sale; and for all Paper printed, painted, or stained for Hangings or other Uses, which shall be in the Hands of any Persons for Sale on the said 24th of June, there must be paid several and respective Rates: That is to say;

ty) 30 l. per Cent. ad valorem.

And for Paper, &c. made in Great Britain, the

For painted Paper for Hangings 1 d. per Yard  
Square.

If Merchants, Stationers, Wholesale-Sellers, Re-  
tailers, Printers, Paper-Makers, or other Dealers  
in Paper, do not on or before the said 24th of June  
at the Offices for the said Duties, next to their re-  
spective Habitations make true and particular En-  
tries of the just Kinds and Quantities of all Paper,  
Pastboard, Mildboard, and Scaleboard, as well For-  
eign as British, for Sale, which they respectively  
shall then have, they respectively forfeit 50 l. and  
the Paper for which such Entry is neglected.

And in six Days after such Entry shall be or should  
be made, must pay or give Security to pay the said  
Duties in three Months.

Upon prompt Payment, viz. within the said six  
Days there is to be a Discount of 10 l. per Cent. for  
Stock in Hand for the said three Months.

Neglecting to Pay or give Security, within the said  
six Days, is a Forfeiture of double the said Duties.

Officers are to be permitted to enter all Houses  
and Places belonging to Merchants, Stationers, Whole-  
sale Sellers, Retailers, Printers, Paper-makers, and  
other Dealers in Paper, to take true and particular  
Accounts of all Paper, Pastboard, Mildboard and Scale-  
board, as well Foreign as British, for Sale, which  
they, or any in Trust for them, shall have on the  
said 24th of June Instant, refusing to let the Officers  
enter, or take such Accounts, is a Forfeiture of 20 l.

Clandestinely removing or hiding such Paper,  
Pastboard, Mildboard or Scaleboard, or any part  
thereof, or suffering the same to be hid or removed  
before the said Duties are paid or secured, is a For-  
feiture of 20 l. and of the Paper, Pastboard, Mild-  
board and Scaleboard which may be seized to the  
Use of Her Majesty.

The like Duties must be paid for all Paper, Past-  
board, Mildboard and Scaleboard, as well Foreign,  
as British, which shall be imported or made after  
the said 24th of June.

And if any Person who on or before the said 24th  
of June, shall make any Paper, Pastboard or Scale-  
board, or shall Print, Paint, or Stain, any Paper to  
serve for Hangings or other Uses, do not on or before  
the said 24th of June, give notice in Writing at the  
next Office for the said Duties on Paper, of their  
Names and Places of Abode, and of their Place and  
Places of Working; or if they shall afterwards  
change their Places of working; or if Persons who  
at any time, during the continuance of the said Du-  
ties on Paper, shall be a Maker of Paper, &c. or  
shall so Print &c. any Paper, as aforesaid, do not  
give the like Notice of their respective Names, Pla-  
ces of Abode, and Places of Working, they Forfeit  
for every Offence 30 l.

Using any place for drying Paper, &c. or making  
it fit for use (other than such place whereof such No-  
tice is given as aforesaid, is a forfeiture of 20 l. for  
every Offence.

All Makers of Paper, Pastboard, Mildboard and  
Scaleboard, and all Printers, Painters and Stainers of  
Paper once in every six Weeks upon Oath, or Affir-  
mation of Quakers, must at the next Office make  
true Entry in Writing of all Paper, &c. from time  
to time by them made, mentioning in such Entries  
the just Kinds and Quantities thereof, on pain to for-  
feit 50 l.

The said Duties must be paid and cleared off with-  
in six Weeks after such Entry shall be or should be  
made, on the penalty to pay double Duty.

No Person after such default in Payment must sell,  
deliver or carry out any such Paper &c. until he  
hath cleared off his Duty, or pain to be forfeit double  
the Value of such Paper, &c. so sold, &c.

Officers are to be permitted by Day or by Night  
(if by Night with a Constable or other Officer of the  
Peace) to enter all Houses and Places belonging to  
any Maker of Paper, Pastboard, Mildboard or Scale-  
board, or to any Printer, Painter, or Stainer of Pa-  
per for Hangings, or other Uses as aforesaid, and to  
take just Accounts of the Kinds and Quantities of the  
Paper, Pastboard Mildboard and Scaleboard, which  
shall have been from time to time by them made,  
printed, painted or stained, of which the Officer is to  
make a Report, which is to be a Charge upon such  
Makers, Printers, Painters and Stainers, who upon  
demand must have a Copy thereof, and if the Officer  
refuses such Copy he forfeits 40 s.

Officers are to be permitted to take Accounts of  
Rags, Cordage, and other Materials for making Pa-  
per, Pastboard, Mildboard and Scaleboard, which  
shall be in the Possession of any Maker, and of all  
Paper in the Possession of any Printer, Painter or  
Stainer, and of their proceedings in making, print-  
ing, &c. the same; and Persons obstructing the Of-  
ficers in the Execution of the Powers and Authorities  
to them given by this Act, forfeits for every Of-  
fence 20 l.

Removing, carrying or sending away any Paper  
made or printed, painted or stained, or any Past-  
board, Mildboard or Scaleboard, before account  
taken by the Officer, unless on two Days notice at  
least, is a forfeiture of 20 l. for every Offence.

If during the time aforesaid all Paper made, print-  
ed, painted or stained, and all Pastboard, Mild-  
board and Scaleboard not surveyed, be not kept sepa-  
rate from all other their Paper and other Commo-  
dities aforesaid, which shall have been surveyed,  
unless such Paper &c. shall have been sooner sur-  
veyed, it is a forfeiture of 5 l.

Fraudulently hiding or concealing any Paper, &c.  
chargeable by this Act, or any Materials for making  
the same, is a forfeiture of 20 l. for every Offence.

All Paper, Pastboard, Mildboard and Scaleboard,  
and all Materials and Utensils for making them or  
any of them, or for printing, painting or staining  
such Paper as aforesaid, found in any private Work-  
house, drying Room, or other place, of which no  
Entry

For try sh ll be made, are forfeited, and they or the value thereof may be seized for Majesty's use.

Her Majesty's Commissioners for the said Duties having duly appointed Offices for the said Duties to be set at the several Houses and Places where Offices of Excise are now kept, all Entries required by the foregoing Act are to be respectively made at such Houses and Places so appointed.

*Milan, June 11. N. S.* Some Days ago the Baron de Martinii, the Emperor's Commissary-General in Italy, Died in this City, being very much regretted for the Knowledge he had of the Emperor's Affairs, and the true Interest of this Country. Upon this Oration an Express was immediately dispatched to Vienna; so that we shall soon know who will be appointed to succeed him in that important Post. General Zurlauben who Commanded at the Siege of Porto Ercole arrived here some Days ago, and is preparing to go to Turin, to serve in Piedmont during this Campaign. Count Thaur is likewise daily expected here from Vienna for the same Purpose, it being thought that he will command the Army in Chianti, and that the Duke of Savoy will not take the Field this Year. All the German Forces design'd to be employed in that Army, are on their March towards Piedmont, and those intended for Catalonia, as we are assured, upon the Thirteenth Instant will be all arrived at Vado.

*From the Camp at Chateau Cambresis, June 18. N. S.* On Thursday the Sixteenth Instant, the Troops of Hanover, which make part of the Duke of Ormond's Army, were review'd by his Grace, and he found them all to be in very good Order. Prince Eugene, the Field Deputies of the States, with Monsieur Welden, and Monsieur Hop, came Yesterday to confer with his Grace upon the present situation of Affairs, after which his Grace gave them a splendid Entertainment. There is not to be great a Progress made in the Siege of Quesnoy, as otherwise might have been expected, because the Engineers have thought it proper to defer breaking Ground during the light Nights. Both our Armies, and that of the Enemy continue in their former Camp.

*Brussels, June 23. N. S.* Letters of the Twentieth from the Camp before Quesnoy, bring an Account that the Trenches were opened the Night before, about half an Hour after Nine. There were two Attacks form'd against the Place; four Battalions being commanded for each Attack. At that of the left, the loss of Men was very small, the Enemy not having perceived the Workmen till the Loss was made, but at the right Attack, the Loss was said to be considerable: Those Letters add, that some Advices mentioned the arrival of Major Grov in near Liez, from the Incurtion he had made into Champagne, and that he had brought with him several Prizes and great Booty. They write of the Eighth of Madrid, that the Dutchess of Anjou was brought to Bed the Day before of a Son.

*Utrecht, June 24. N. S.* Upon Wednesday the Twenty-seventh Instant, one of the Queen's Messengers arrived here with Letters of the Sixteenth and seventeenth from Great Britain, and soon after most of the Ministers of the Allies went to the Lord Privy Seal's House, where they had Conferences with the Lordship, and afterwards parted with marks of Satisfaction, upon what his Lordship had thought proper to communicate to them. The same Day Count Sinzendorf dispatch'd an Express to the Army, another to Vienna, and a third to the Court of the Elector Palatine, and in the Evening set out from hence for the Hague. The Counts Farouca and La Cunha, Ministers of the King of Portugal, are returned from the Hague, in order to assist at the Conferences, which of late have not been so frequently held, as they will necessarily be in the

Course of the present Negotiations of Peace. The Cardinal of Bouillon is come from Werden to this Place, and intends shortly to take a House here.
