Most Gracious Sovereign!

There is nothing more evident than that Your Majesty hath entirely at Heart the Good and Welfare of Your own Kingdoms, and the Settlement of the Protestant Succession in the House of Hanover, and the procuring a General Peace to Your Majesty and all Your Allies. We for our selves declare, that we are so affected with Joy, that we can't sufficiently express our just Sense of Gratitude for Your Majesty's gracious Condescension, in making known to Your Parliament the advantageous Terms whereon a general Peace may be had, which are not only for the Honour of Your Majesty, and for the Interest, Safety and Happiness of Your People, but are such as provide a necessary and convenient Barrier and Security for Your Allies, and whatever else is justly due to them by Treaties.

We heartily Pray that Your Majesty may long live in Health and Prosperity, to Reign over dutiful and loyal Subjects, to their Comfort, and to the frustrating the Contrivances of others.

Dread Sovereign!

WE Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects the Mayor, Recorder, Aldermen, Common-Council and Burgesses, of Your Majesty's Antient Corporation of Cambridge, do acknowledge with the greatest Humility, Your Majesty's most Gracious Condescension,

May the Almighty grant You, Ma'am, a long Life; may all Your Undertakings be Crown'd with Success; may Faction be buried, and Loyalty flourish, and may no Contention remain, but who can shew themselves the most dutiful Subjects to the best of Queens, and then we shall have no Occasion for a Foreign Guarantee to secure the Succession in the Illustrious House of Hanover; which after the unspeakable Loss of so great and good a Princess, we have most sincerely at our Hearts.

All which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Hamburg, July 4. N. S. Eight thousand Danes which for some time have been Quarter'd in Pomerania, pass'd the first of this Month near Wismar, and encamp'd at Lubau. The two Battalions of that Nation, which are under the Command of the Count de Sponeck, continue still about Rostock, and will remain there to block up that Place, while the rest of the Danish Army makes an Incurfion into the Dutchy of Bremen, where the Conternation is Universal, and the Inhabitants are withdrawing on all sides with their best Effects. The Forces of Denmark, which have Winter'd in Holstein, will march to Morrow to a Camp mark'd out for them near Bramsted, and when they have been review'd there, it is suspected they may make some attempt on Staden. King Stanislaus is returned to Carelsroon from Stockholm, where he had been to hasten the necessary Supplies for Pomerania and other Territories in Germany, belonging to that Crown.

Brussels, July 12. N. S. Nipe Squadrons of the Mercenary Troops in British Pay, which halted here for some time to refresh themselves, went Yesterday towards the Camp. They will be followed very soon by Fifteen hundred Recruits, when the Detachment is returned which was sent by the Commandant of this Place to Convoy some Waggons to Ghent. Yesterday, at two of the Clock in the Afternoon, his Excellency the Earl of Strafford arriv'd here in a Post-Chaise from the Hague, and was saluted with a triple Discharge of the Artillery. He alighted at the Post-house to change Horses, and having received the Compliments of several Persons of Quality, pursued his Journey towards the Army.

Utrecht, July 12. N. S. On the tenth Instant the Lord Privy-Seal return'd hither from the Hague, where he left the Earl of Strafford ready to set out for the Army in Flanders. And some other Ministers of the Allies, who went to that Place to confer with their Lordships, are daily expected back. The Ministers who are present here, held a Conference Yesterday in the Town-house, as usual.

Her Majesty has likewise been pleas'd to appoint William Strong, George Townshend, Philip Ryley, Esquires, Sir Marmaduke Wyvell, Bart. Edward Noell, Christopher Montague, Whitlock Bullstode, James Vernon, jun. and John Price, Esquires, to be Commissioners of Excise.

London, July 7. Brigadier-General Hill, being appointed by Her Majesty to Command the Land Forces, which were lately embark'd in the River Thames, set out Yesterday Morning, in order to go on Board the Fleet.
