OUR Will and Pleasure is, That the following Rules and Directions, for the better keeping Hyde-Park in good Order, be strictly observed and obeyed by all Persons concerned, under Pain of Our high Displeasure, viz.

That the Gate-keepers give constant Attendance at the Gates; and that neither They nor the Park-keepers do sell Ale, Brandy or other Liquors in, or near the said Park.

That no Person on Horse-back or Foot, do presume to leap, get over, or break down, any of the Ditches, Rails or Gates in the said Park, or by any means get into the Paddock adjoining to Her Majesty's Garden, excepting such Persons as are employ'd in the said Garden.

And no Person to ride over the Grass on the South side of the Gravelled Coach Road, but keep in the said Road, or in the open Ways leading to the Ring, &c. excepting Henry Wife, who is permitted to pass cross that Part of the Park leading from the Door in the Park Wall, next his Plantation to the gravelled Coach Road.

That no Grooms or others, who ride into the said Park for watering of Horses, do presume to ride over the Banks or Slopes of any Pond, or leap the Ditches; and after having been warned of so doing, and they do not observe it; then the Gate-keepers not to admit those Persons any more into the said Park.

That no Stage-Coach, Hackney-Coach, Chaise with one Horse, Cart, Wagon, or Funeral be suffered to pass thro' the said Park; and that this may be the better executed, the Ranger to appoint a Keeper or Gate-Keeper constantly to attend the Turn-pike near the Gate next St. James's Park.

That neither Keepers, Gate-keepers, nor any other Persons, do presume to Cut or Lop any Trees in the Park.

That the Ranger of the said Park do give strict Charge to the Keepers, diligently and constantly to go their Rounds, and take care that they and the Gate-keepers do their Duties in all respects, for the due Execution of these Orders; printed Copies whereof the said Ranger is to cause to be put up at the Gates, disperse and distribute from time to time as shall be requisite.

Florence, June 27. N. S. The Race of Chariots on the Place of *Sancta Maria Novella*, was perform'd here as usual, on the Twenty third of this Month. The next Day being the Festival of *St. John*, the Great Duke, Seated on a Throne in the Publick Square, received the Homage of those who hold Marquises, Counties, or other Fiefs from his Highness. In the Afternoon there were several Races of Barbary Horses. And the Great Prince was so well recovered, that he assisted at all those Solemnities.

Amsterdam, July 13. N. S. We have several Letters here of the Ninth Instant from *Dunkirk*, which say, that an Order of the French King bearing Date the Twenty seventh of June, was published there two Days before, by which the French Troops in that Town, as also in the Citadel, *Ryfbank*, and other Forts, are enjoined to be in a readiness to March out on the appearance of the English, into whose Hands that Place is to be delivered.

Brussels, July 14. N. S. We have received Advice that Colonel *St. Amour*, who was sent with a Detachment of Five hundred German Horse towards the *Senfette*, fell into an Ambuscade of Four thousand French, by whom he was taken Prisoner with about Two hundred of his Men, but the rest retir'd in good Order to *Douay*. On the Tenth Instant some Foragers from the Earl of *Albemarle's* Camp at *Denin*, approaching too near *Valenciennes*, were attack'd by a Party of the Garrison, in which Action we suffer'd some loss. *Monfieur Westers*, Receiver of the Contributions for the States-General, who commonly resides here, is appointed to regulate the Civil Government, and the Affairs of the Revenues at *Quefnoy*, for which Purpose he set out Yesterday towards that Place.

Utrecht, July 15, N. S. Baron *Renswood*, one of the Plenipotentiaries of the States-General, is lately gone to the Hague, from whence he designs to return hither in a short time with the rest of his Colleagues, who at present are there likewise. The Lord Privy-Seal sets out to Morrow for the same Place, where he will stay but a Day or two.

Westminster, July 8. This Day the Parliament was Prorogued to the Thirty first of this Instant July.

John Hungerford, Esq; is elected Member of Parliament for the Borough of *Scarborough*.
