THE following Address from the County of Salop, was presented to Her Majesty by Robert Lloyd, Esq; one of the Knights of the Shire, being introduced by his Grace the Duke of Shrewsbury, Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household, and Lord-Lieutenant of the County of Salop.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen, and other Freeholders of the County of Salop, at the General Quarter Sessions holden at Shrewsbury the Fifteenth of July, 1712.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE Your most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects, being truly Sensible of Your Majesty's most earnest Endeavours (in Ease of Your People) to bring this tedious and expensive War to a glorious and speedy Conclusion, do, with most joyful and thankful Hearts, Congratulate and Acknowledge Your great Goodness and Prudence, in giving us (at this juncture) so near a Prospect of a long-wish'd-for Peace, the Terms whereof we conceive Honourable to Great Britain, and just to Your Allies.

By this our Trade and Commerce will advance and improve both at Home and Abroad, and we shall be secure thereof, whilst Dunkirk is Garrison'd by Your Majesty's Forces, and France obliged to quit that important and impregnable Fortress; as the nearest Recompence and Equivalent we can expect, for all that immense and unequal Share of Blood and Treasure we have sustain'd during this long and expensive War.

And herein we want Words to express our Abhorrence and Detestation of all such Practices as have been made use of, by a restless, turbulent, and factious Party, whose sordid Avarice, and boundless Ambition, prompts them to other Ends than are consistent with the Welfare of their native Country, and makes them join with our Rival Traders, and secret Enemies, to obstruct Your Majesty's present Negotiations and Purposes; for which we have so long contended under the greatest Difficulties; And it is still (Madam) our firm Resolutions to offer ourselves, and those Fortunes of ours (which Your Majesty is so solicitous to protect and preserve) to the utmost Hazards in Defence of Your Sacred Person and Prerogative, our present Constitution both in Church and State, and entire Security of the Protestant Religion; by fixing the Succession in the most illustrious House of Hanover.

May Your Majesty long Govern Your Kingdoms in Peace, Plenty and Prosperity: May You always (as now) be attended with a Wife and Faithful Council, and an Obédient and Loyal Parliament, to whose united Consultations and Advices (next under the Divine Providence) we owe all the blessed Effects of our late seasonable Relief, and the Prospect of further Glory, Happiness and Tranquility to these Nations.

The following Address from the County of Derby, was presented to Her Majesty by Aitbaet Furlton, Esq; Chairman, at the General Quarter Sessions of the Peace for the said County, being introduced by the Rt. Honourable the Earl of Scarisdale, Lord-Lieutenant and Custos Rotulorum of the said County.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of Derby, at their General Quarter Sessions of the Peace held for the said County at Bakewell, on the 15th of July, 1712.

Most Gracious Sovereign!

Permit us, amongst the rest of Your Loyal and Dutiful Subjects, who at this time presume to approach Your Royal Throne, to Congratulate Your Majesty and Your Kingdoms, upon the near prospect of an honourable and advantageous Peace; and to return Your Majesty our most humble and hearty Thanks for Your unparalleled Censcension, in communicating to Your Parliament the Terms upon which it may be made; the concluding and commencing of Peace and War, being the undoubted Prerogative of the Crown.

Peace is that great comprehensive Enjoyment upon which all others are dependant, being the highest blessing to a Nation, and indispensably requisite to the enjoying any other Good; and the more to be desired by Your People, who have so long laboured under their heavy and unequal Burthen in a bloody and expensive War.

Your Majesty's Care and Zeal for the Welfare of Your People, and Ballance of Europe, in the Commencement of this War, were worthy Your illustrious Self: But Your Wisdom and Christian Temper are more eminently conspicuous, by putting a stop to the Current of Your Victories, and giving a Ballance to the Powers Abroad, Honour to Your Self, and Peace and Prosperity to Your People.

A Peace so just and Honourable, so comprehensive and effective of those Ends for which the War was commenced (the Nature and Terms thereof being such as secure and execute themselves) whereby our most Primitive Apostolical Religion will be secured to us and our Posterity under a Protestant Succession; our Trade and Commerce secured, extended and improved in all its Branches, beyond whatever Britain could have hoped for, the Ballance of Power in Europe effectually secured, and ample Satisfaction offered to all Your Allies, that we can never sufficiently applaud Your Majesty's consummate Wisdom and Care, nor sufficiently honour and value the Integrity and Stability of Your faithful and able Ministry, in conducting and carrying on so great, so good a Work.

Neither can we forbear to express our utter Abhorrence and Detestation of those ungrateful factious Persons (that delight in War) who under specious Pretences, and to carry on Designs of their own, have dared to obstruct the just and honourable Measures of their Sovereign.

May Your Majesty proceed speedily and effectually to finish this great Affair, so Glorious and Honourable.
