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Yarmouth, Sept. 12.

THis morning a Fishing ship from *Greenland*, came into this road, and about noon set sail again for *London*, the rest of the ships of that company are returning home, but neither they nor the Dutch, or Hamburgers have had that success in their fishing which they expected. We are now fitting up with all diligence for our Herring fishing, upon which account here are arrived about 100 vessels from the West, and about 60 from the Northern parts.

Warsaw, Aug. 30. The time for the general Diet approaching; the Nobil ty and Gentry begin to repair to this City. The Arch-bishop of *Cnesne* is expected, with the Grand Marshal and Treasurer of the kingdom, and the Marshal of *Lithuania* from the Baths of *Carestat* in *Bohemia*. Major-General *Bokumbs*, a Substitute to the under-Grand-Veneur has been lately killed by a Peasant, who was hired to commit the murder by a Staroste; the assassin is since apprehended and committed prisoner in this City in order to his tryal.

The Crowns Army is posted about *Trembocola* having an Eye upon every motion of the Tartars, who tis feared may shortly give them an employment by an incursion, which we the rather apprehend since our Letters from those parts assure us, that the Grand S. gnior has lately sent a rich present to the Cham of Tartary, and another to the Bassa of *Bia-Jahod*, from whose conjunction we cannot but expect the usual ill effects.

The Uayuode *Wolgisky* is lately arrived at the Army, whose principal business it is to perfect the good work that is already well advanced for the reconciliation of the Grand Marshal *Sobiesky*, with the Vice Marshal *Wisnomisky*.

The Envoyes from his Electoral Highness of *Bran-denbourg* are gone home little satisfy'd, having not been able to obtain the confirmation of the Treaty made at *Bromberg* between King *Casimir* and the Elector their Master.

Several defamatory libels have been lately spread up and down the City, against the Chancellor and under Chancellor of the Crown, some of which tis believed may have dropt from the Cabinet of Marshal *Sobiesky*.

From *Muscovy* we are told, that the Rebels have (as it was feared) Lised on the Great City of *Astracan*, whose Garrison had before ill Principles infused into them, and were ready to favor their designs. Their numbers are much increased, by some success they have had in defeating a body of Sixteen thousand men, which were by the Great Dukes Command sent against them; insomuch as the Rebellion is grown very formidable, their Army said to be near an hundred thousand persons; they found Armes in the City of *Astracan* for 50000. men, and they are now marching thence with much Confidence towards *Moscow*.

Vienna, Sept. 4. On Monday last arrived here the Prince of *Lorrain* from the Army in *Hungary*; the Emperor intends to recal his Army from that King-

dom to avoid the jealousies of the Grand Segniors and the Bassa's of the frontier Countreys, who have made frequent complaints against the neighborhood of so great an Army, which notwithstanding was but necessary for the reducing of those Rebels, and the manning of the several Garisons which the Emperor is forced to keep for the preservation of the peace. The Turkish Bassas have had several Orders and Commands from the Grand Segnior, to take care that upon no pretence they should interest themselves or keep any correspondency with the Rebels of *Hungary*, and that upon pain of being discharged from their employments.

Several of his Imperial Majesties Ministers of State have represented the conveniency of keeping the Army in *Hungary*, till the end of the Assembly designed to be held at *Cassovia*, where the Emperors Commissioner and Plenipotentiary the Count *Rothal* is already arrived; and we are informed that the Army is to make some stop near *Trenschin*, where it is to continue till farther order.

This day the Count *Nadasti* was brought in prisoner to this City.

A Courier dispatch hither from the Emperors Resident in *Adrianople* informs us, that the Grand Visier finding the increase of the troubles in the Ottoman Family, and the many practices and contrivances of the Sultanes, which tend to the deposing of the present Emperor, and placing his younger brother in his room, has entertain'd thoughts of quitting his charge, which nothing has dissuaded him from, but the great importunity of the Emperor his Master, who being with much reason grown dissident of his Janisaries, has put off all thoughts of going to *Constantinople*, and resolves to pass the winter in *Adrianople*.

The Visier has delivered to the Resident all the Original Letters, which the Count *Nadasti*, and other Officers amongst the Rebels in *Hungary*, writ to him to persuade him to a Conjunction of their forces against the Emperor, and to offer him an annual Tribute upon the account of his assistance.

Count *Paul Esterhazy* is fled with his whole Family to a Castle called *Forderstein*, where he hopes for some time to secure himself;

Yesterday the Count *Serini* was sent away with a Guard of an hundred horse and as many foot to *Nieuskade*, where he is to be committed to prison for his life; the Emperor having assigned him 600 Rixdollers per annum for his maintainance, but his Lady and Son are to continue here till the Emperors pleasure be farther known. The Count *Franchipani* is to be sent to *Schorweim*.

By later letters from *Hungary* we are told, that the Emperors Army is divided into two parts, whereof one is to march into *Silesia*, and the other, towards the *Wagh* to quarter near *Trenschin*.

Bilboa, Sept. 5. Yesterday arrived here a Portuguese Carrivel from *Lisbonne*, and brings news that two English Fregats have lately taken an Argier man of War of 40. Guns, and 400. Mbores, and two Sally men of War, and brought them into *Lisbonne*.

Dantzic, Sept. 6. About 10 days since departed hence the Grand Treasurer of Poland in order to his appearance at the ensuing Diet at *Warsaw*; declaring that he will not refuse to submit himself to a fair and legal Trial.

The last Letters from Poland tell us, that there is like to be a great appearance of the Senators at that general Diet; that the Primate and the General *Sobiesky* intend to be there present. The Nobility of the greater and lesser Poland have resolved to be in Arms during this Session; that in case of a rupture they may take some other effectual course for the settling the Republick.

The Heer de *Wit*, Ambassador from the States-General of the *United Provinces*, intends the 8th instant to pass from hence for *Warsaw*, little satisfied that the Magistrates here delay or refuse to admit the Ships and Subjects of *Holland* to the same priviledges with the Burgers of this place, according to a Treaty made at the *Hague* in 1656. which they affirm was never agreed to by the Common Council of this place.

Letters of the 29th past from *Riga*, confirm the news of the rebellion of the Tartars against the Muscovites, with whom are joynd a great number of the Russians, and that they have taken the City of *Astracan*, drowning the Governor with other great Officers in the River *Wolga*, but doing no injury to the Commonalty.

Yesterday we had a report that the Czar had pacified the Rebels by the giving them a considerable sum of Moneys, but of this we expect confirmation.

Venice, Sept. 6. On Sunday last arrived here the *Golden Fountain* from *Suda*, which came thence the 15th of *July*, with whom is returned General *Batzaglia*, with about One hundred and fifty Gentlemen, Officers and Soldiers, who are all gone to make their Quarantines at the Old Lazarette: the same day arrived Five other ships which were conveyed by the Proveditor *Bernardo* as far as *Cursola*, and the rest of the way by Proveditor *Cornaro*, laden upon the publick account with Arms, Lead, and other materials more then were necessary for present service in the Islands of the *Levant*.

On Wednesday arrived here a ship in 41 days from *Constantinople* with Letters from Segnior *Molino*, our Minister in the Turkish Court, which tell us, that he made there his publick entry with great applause, the people filling not only the streets and windows, but also the tops of the houses, all the way by which he passed from his house to the Caymacan's Pallace, where he was honourably received and complimented in the name of the Emperor and the Divan; the Caymacan at the same time presenting him with a rich Vest, and Treating him at Dinner with all his Train, which consisted of above 60 persons in rich Liveries, besides many Gentlemen and Officers, 24 Interpreters, 12 Messengers, and many Christians, inhabitants of the Country; he since has kept open house, where he has given entertainment to above 500 of the Turks Officers and all the Caymacan's family, and went afterwards to *Adrianople* to his Audience from the Grand Segnior.

A Privateer of *Santa Maura* of an extraordinary bulk having One hundred men on board, was twice met by a Tartane, and let pass by vertue of a Flag of *St Mark* which they put up: some days after the same Pyrate landed 40 men in *Terra Firma* in the Ecclesiastical State, and met with some plunder and several prisoners, and took two small Barks away with them with about 30 men who were on board them; this gave an allarum to the neighborhood, who immediately manned out a Fregat which for some time gave chase to the Pyrate, but was not able to come up with her.

Several Ships are lately arrived from our Islands, amongst whom some from *Corfu*, which inform us that Proveditor *Bernardo* has employed many men at *Casope*, to fortify and raise defences, that may secure all the Fleet during the Winter season.

Segnior *Francisco Erizzo* is lading one of his ships with cloath of Gold, and several other rich Commodities bound for *Soria*, in company with some other of our Merchants who are thus beginning to revive their Trade with those parts.

Yesterday in the morning His Excellency the *English* Ambassador the Lord *Falconberge* took his leave of the Colledg, in order to his return homewards, which he intends by the way of *Germany*.

From *Maltha* we are told, that the Engineer *Valperga* intends to continue some Months longer there, to finish the Fortifications designed by him, in which they dayly imploy above two thousand men.

Amsterdam, Sept. 18. The greatest part of our Convoy from the *Streights* under the Command of Captain *Marrevelt* is come into the *Texel*, only one of them cast away; there is also arrived one ship from *Lisbonne*, two from *St Eustache*, and 8 or 10 of the *Greenland* Fleet.

Neer 3000. Families are here solliciting to be sent into the *East Indies*.

Hague, Sept. 19. The French Ambassador has not yet complied with the desires of the States General, in giving them in writing the Reasons (which he delivered to them by word of mouth only) why the Most Christian King his Master has lately entred upon the Dutchy of *Lorraine*, for which he pretends he has no orders from the said King. The Duke has written to the States to desire their protection.

The States of *Holland* are again assembled, but will imploy the first of their time in disposing of the Vacant Charges both Civil and Military.

A proposition has been made for a constant and perpetual raising of the thousandth penny, which will amount to a sum sufficient for the maintainance of 25 thousand men to be added to the standing Army, and tis believed they may shortly give order for some new Leavyes, and agree upon an Establishment of a considerable force both for Land and Sea service against the next Spring.

The Bishop of *Stratsburg* has been for three or four dayes entertained at a house belonging to the Rhinegrave neer *Maeßtricht*, and intends for *Brussels*; he found not that the Chapter of *Liege* could be moved from their resolution, and brought to leave to him the Administration of affairs during the absence of their Bishop, nor finds he any encouragement to move farther for the Coadjutorship.

The Council of *Spain* has not thought fit to remove the Ambassador *Don Estevoan de Gamarre* from this place, so that his Excellency has ordered his goods to be returned hither from *Brabant*, and tis believed he will pass the Winter here.
