Every true *English* Man must be pleas'd with the particular Care Your Majesty has taken of Your own People, and of the Succession as by Law establish'd, and the World will confess Your Justice to Your Allies.

May Your Majesty go on prosperously to perfect this great and good Work, to Glorious to Your Self, and so advantageous to all Your Subjects.

Nor can we doubt but You will happily conclude it, since Your Majesty is served by such Ministers, whose Honesty, Wisdom and Courage, neither Dangers can alight, Artifices deceive, nor Bribes corrupt, and especially since *France* has delivered up to Your Majesty that important Fortress, *Dunkirk*, a sufficient Pledge for its Sincerity.

May Almighty God continue to Bless and Prosper Your Majesty, and He give You a long and happy Reign over us; and may we, and all Your Majesty's Subjects, express our Thanks for so great a Blessing, by an untaught Loyalty, and dutiful Affection to so indulgent and good a Queen.

To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Lord Lieutenant, High Sheriff, Grand Jury, Deputy Lieutenants, Justices of the Peace, and other Gentlemen and Freeholders of the County of *Surrey*, at the Assizes holden at *Kingstone upon Thames*, on the 30th of July, 1712.

WE Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects take this Opportunity to return Your Majesty our most humble and hearty Thanks for Your gracious Condescension, in communicating to Your People the Terms upon which such a Peace may be made, as is every way honourable and advantageous to *Great Britain*.

A Peace, by which the Crowns of *France* and *Spain* are effectually diminished; our Laws, Liberties, and the Protestant Succession most firmly secured.

A Peace, by which our Commerce is establish'd upon a better Foot than it has been in any Age; and Your Majesty's Dominions very considerably enlarged.

A Peace, by which Your Majesty is not in Speculation only, but in Reality, the Arbitress of *Europe*.

The delivery of the Impregnable Forts of *Dunkirk*, is so important a Pledge, that we cannot but rest easy under the Hopes of seeing this great Affair speedily completed.

In the mean while 'tis with equal Wonder and Resentment, that we find Your Majesty so unworthily treated by those whom Gratitude should have oblig'd to have fix'd more suitable returns, instead of those Injuries offer'd to Your Majesty's Troops, under a General who's entire Obedience to his Sovereign's Commands is as eminent as his Loyalty and Courage; Virtues so inherent in his most Noble Family.

But 'tis still more astonishing, that Your Majesty's unparalleled Goodness should meet with such unnatural Opposition, where nothing but the humblest Duty and Submission could have been expected; however since Your Majesty's great Wisdom, assisted by the able and faithfull

Ministers, hath already surmounted the most perplexing Difficulties, we cannot but content the impatient Wish of those who are vain enough to imagine that Your Royal Resolutions can ever be shaken by the last Efforts of a restless but expiring Faction.

May Your Majesty long live to enjoy the Blessings of Peace, and transmit the same upon secure and lasting Foundations to late Posterity.

Genoa, July 31. N. S. The Imperial Horse design'd for Catalonia, which are to be Transported by the British Ships from *Vado* to *Barcelona*, amount to near Fourteen hundred, and Five hundred Dragoons more are expected, but it is doubted whether they will arrive time enough for this Expedition, since we are inform'd all the other Horse may be on Board by the 5th of the next Month. Three French Barks have been lately taken by Her Majesty's Ships, and brought into this Port, whereof one was entirely laden with Oil, and the third with Copper Wax, Hides, and Dying Wares, from the *Canaries* and *Barbary*.

Venice, August 5. N. S. On Sunday the Great Council met, in order to nominate a Bailo or Ambassador, to reside on the part of this Republic at the Ottoman Port, in the room of *Signior Domenico Tiepolo*, who has desired to be dismissed from that Employment, and the choice fell upon *Signior Marco Loredano*. The Council of Ten have lately banished a Woman of Quality, for speaking with disrespect of their Tribunal; for it is observ'd here, that Ladies have begun but of late to speak of Affairs of Government, which hath occasion'd an uncommon Severity, as an Example to deter others of that Sex from the like Practice. We have receiv'd Advice from *Rome*, that considerable Sums of Money have been remitted from thence, to foment and maintain the War in *Switzerland*, which would otherwise have been long since extinguish'd by the moderation of the Protestant Catholics.

Utrecht, August 19. N. S.
