## puvilities by Authority.

From Churg' ay, September 15. to Monday September 19. 1670.

London, Scpt. 17.

Esterday was held a Court-Marshal on board his Majesties Yacht, called the Bezan in the River of Thames near Tower wharfe for the tryal of Captain John Pierce Commander of His Majesties late ship the Saphire, unfortunately lost the 31. of March last upon the coast of Sivily, and of his Lieutenant Andrew Logan; where upon diligent examination and inquilition, it was clearly and fully evidenced by the testimony of Twelve credible witnesses upon oath; that the faid ship was basely and shamefully lost through the default and cowardise of the said Captain and Lieutenant, who upon the approach of Four sail, supposed to be Turks men of war, being post st with a pannick fear, ordered the ship to run from them, refusing to let go the Anchor, till the ship was struck, contrary to the sence, not only of the Master and Purser, who perswaded them to fight, the ship being in a fit posture, but of the whole company, who declared their readiness and defire of it by their chearful acclamations; upon these and other evidences, the said Captain and Lieutenant were by a general and unanimous consent adjudged and sentenced to be shot to death on Monday the 26th instant, on board any of His Majesties ships or vessels of war, according as the Prefident of that Court, Sir feremiah Smith should direct.

Rome, Aug. 30. The Pope has of late fallen into many fainting and swouning fits, which have much empaired the vigor of his body and mind, so that tis believed he will not very long hold the Chair; he has not yet taken the resolution to promote any Cardinals in the vacant places. Cardinal Chigy is using all his interest to prefer Cardinal Piccolomini to the Bishoprick of Massa in the Dutchy of Florence which is become void by the death of the late incumbent Accaregi, but Monsegnior Bichi, the present Bishop of Rhodes is his competitor, and like to succeed in that See.

The Inquisition is now employd about the examination of several Theses which have been held by the Sorbonists at Paris, about the limitation of several Canons in order to the national Council at Orle-#ns, with other matters which they suppose to tend to the diminution of the Popes authority; they are also confidering how to inhibit the Duke of Savoye from erecting a scale of Trade at Villa Franca, and making it a free Port: they are also projecting how to refuse to the Genoueses that authority, which after the example of Venice, they have much solicited by their Minister Durage, of limiting the power of the Inquisi ion in that State.

The Pope has lately bought the house of Segnior Benzoni, to adjoyn it to his Palace, defigned for those of his Family and name: Cardinal Altieri has endeavoured to place a new Governor in Rome, instead of Monsegnior Vareze, which is said to be designed for Monsegnior Albergati.

Wirfim, Sept. 1. From Mofcom they write, That the Heer Heinfius is dayly promised his dispatches and dismission, for which he has long attended with

much patience, but with little hopes of prevailing in point of Mediation.

We have this more certain news of the procedure of the Rebels in Muscowy, that upon their approach towards Astracan, the Governor of that place, had sent out a body of 6000. men, to secure a passage leading to the City; which being defeated, the City opened their gates to them, who plundered the Town; but upon the intermediate of the Metropolitan, were prevayled with to spare the Churches and Religious houses; their Cruelty was noto-rious in cutting off the hands and Feet of all Military Officers and Noblemen, with the Governor and his Brother and two of his Sons. This success has much increased their number, as well as their insolency, and given an Allarum to the Great Duke, who has Ordered his General George Alexiemit Dolgarouka to command all his forces to march towards them for their suppression.

Genoua, Sept. 6. Three days since arrived here one of the Great Dukes Gallies with 300 Bales of Silk for this place, and the next day put out again to lea intending for Legorn: as yet the Popes Gallies appear not with their lading. Centurione with his Gallies hath been seen about Palermo; those Gallies which were fome time in this Port, are plying about the Isle of Gorsica, but intend to return again hither to demand justice against a Captain of a ship of this place, who lying by them in this Port, had endeavoured by a Saw, conveyed under water, to have cut their Cables, of which they made complaint to the Duke, but the Captain and Seamen which were concerned, had then concealed themfelves.

Two days fince arrived here Two ships from Cadiz. One of them the St Andrew a Dutch ship, the other the Beata Rosa of this place, bringing with them 300 thousand pieces of Eight in Money, Fifty Chests of Indico, Twenty of Cuccinelle, and Five hundred and fifty bags of Pepper, besides other Goods of value, the rest of the Convoy past by for Legorn; about 17 days fince they left Sir John Har-man with Two men of War, a Fireship, and Four Merchants bound for these parts, and are daily ex-

From Milan they tell us, that the Duke d'Ossuna; Governour and Captain-General of that State, intending to have made a confiderable progress to vi-fit the fortifications, returned much sooner then was expected, having only seen Lodi, and has deferred his visit to the remoter parts till after the lying in of his Lady. The Marquis de los Balbaces Spinola is not yet gone for Vienna, but has taken his leave of the Duke and Dutchoss in order to his departure. The Dake has been very instrumental in composing the differences between the people of Monferat and Piedmont, which might otherwise in probability have speedily drawn on a war.

They fuddenly expect the arrival of Don Raphael Vigliofa to enter upon the employment conferred on him by the Queen Regent of Spain, of Chancellor of the State of Milan.

Legorn, Sept. 9. The 4th instant arrived the Dutch Convoy of two men of War and fix Merchant Ships from Spaine. We are are here informed that Captain Beach on his way from this place

to Sir Thomas Allen, met with two Argerine Barks, and took them both, with 250. Slaves.

Venice, Sept. 12. On Wednesday last arrived here the Prince Elector of Cologne with a Train of near Fifty persons his attendants, after 7 or 8 days slay here he intends for Loretto, and probably for Rome, but tis faid he designes to pass the winter in this City.

Segnior Carlo Contarini, defigned Ambassador to the Court of Spain, intends on Wednesday next to begin his journey by land.

The Duke of Savoyes Ambassador in the Court of Rome having endeavoured to procure a reception there as from a Crowned head, by reason of the pretensions which the Duke his Master has to the king-dom of Cyprus: This Republick has taken some of-fence thereat, it being a Title which they suppose with greater right belongs to them; they have upon this amongst other reasons, thought fit to recall their Minister Segnior Michaele from the Court of

His Excellency the Lord Falconberge intends in few days to leave this City in Order to his return home, but may make about 10 days stay at Padoua.

Colonel Annand a subject of His Majesty of Great Britain, who during the siege of Candia gave many demonstrations of his great Courage and Conduct, has besides his arrears of pay, a pension establisht to him of 1000 Ducats per annum, and as 2 particular and unusual mark of honour, is upon all occasions which may bring him to the Colledge, allowed to fit on the right hand of the Dake, in the place of the eldest Senator, which is usually given to Ambas-

Paris, Sept. 19. His Majesties forces in Lorrain having demolisht the works at Pont-a-Mouson, marched away from thence to reduce Espinal, a party of the French approaching the Counterscarp of the Fort of Chaftel, and finding that not a Gun was fired against them, demanded the reason from the Sentinells, and were told that they were com-manded by the Duke of Lorraine to observe this method. It being suspected least the Duke of Lorraine might use his interest with his neighbors in Franche Comte, to defend himself in this juncture of affairs; Letters have been fent to the Prince d' Aremberg the Governor of that County to let him know, that if he should lend any of his forces to assist the faid Duke, his most Christian Majesty could not but look upon it as a breach of the Peace between the two Crowns.

From Thoulon we are informed, that the Count de Vivonne has no intentions to go to Sea this year, but that the Count de Martel was to put to sea the 6th instant, with a strong squadron against the Corfairs of Tunis, with whom were embarked several

of the Kings Musqueteers.

The Archhishop of Bourges on Wednesday last received the ill news of the death of his Nephew the Marquis of Carbau, a young Gentleman of 22. years of age, killed upon the way by the Sieur de Clairay a Gentleman of Normandy; who upon a jealoufy of too great familiarity with his Lady, inviting him to his house to take the Air, set upon him in his Coach and shot him with his Carabin and Pistols.

cellent concerts of Musick; the 26th of the same month he came to Berne, where he was complimented from the Senate, visited by the Magistrates, and entertained till the 19th, when he departed thence to take a view of other parts.

Bruffels, Sept. 24. On Saturday last arrived here the Prince and Bishop of Strasbourg, attended by his own and a party of the Guards belonging to his Electoral Highness of Cologne, and was entertained by Monsegnior Ayroldi the Popes Nuncio in this

The next day arrived his Excellency the Count de Monterey from Antwerp, where he had continued some few days after his progress; on Tuesday in compliance with the defires of the faid Prince and Bishop, his Excellency gave him a private meeting in the Church of Nostre Dame de Luck, about Two miles distant from this City, where after many Compliments the faid Prince and Bishop beginning to fall upon some discourse of affairs of State; his Excellency was pleased to prevent him, by declaring that he could not in that place entertain him upon that subject, but would gladly hear him it a publick Audience if he should desire it; at which the said Bishop seemed to be much surprized: after a little flay their conference ended, the Bishop leaving the Town the next day without farther Audience intending for Antwerp, and from thence to return to Liege; his Excellency early the same morning with a few persons and 25 of his Guards going to Louvain, and thence to Leume, from whence he returned hither the fame evening, having taken a particular view of Leuwe with his Ingineer, it being thought fit to fortify that place, which is looked upon as a place of as great importance as any within the Province of Brabant for its scituation.

From Lorrain we are told that the French forces which came from wards Peronne, made three days halt at St Menehou, and are fince joyned with the other forces which first possess themselves of Nancy; fo that the whole number of the Army there consists of about Fifteen thousand men; they have pulled down the Walls, and dismantled Pont-a-Mousson, Veselige, Goudreville, Mirecourt, and Newcastle, with fome other places, and driven away the Parliament from St Michael upon the Meufe, for refufing to swear obedience to France. The Duke of Lorrain is faid to be about the Mountains of Vauge. The Baron de Chauvire is lately taken prisoner and

committed to the Cittadel of Merg.
