The humble Address of the High-Sheriff, Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Clergy, and other Gentlemen met at the Assizes held for the County of *York*, Aug. 2, 1712.

Most Gracious Sov. reign,

THE great Condescension Your Majesty has been pleased to shew, in imparting to Your Subjects the Terms on which a Peace may be made, is a further Instance of that unparallel'd Goodness and Affection to them, which You have so often express'd from the Throne, and for which we humbly beg leave to approach Your Sacred Majesty, with a full Assurance of the deepest Gratitude, and the sincerest Duty.

As we have a most grateful Sense of Your Majesty's more immediate Care of the true Interest of *Great Britain*, in providing so advantageously for our Commerce, as a Recompence of the unequal Burthen we have born during an expensive War; so we can't but express a Satisfaction in the Assurances Your Majesty hath given us, of Your taking the properest Measures for securing the Protestant Succession to these Kingdoms, as by Law Establish'd.

We can never sufficiently admire Your Goodness and Resolution in so steadily pursuing the Happiness of Your People; and as we wholly rely on Your Majesty's Wisdom to finish this great and good Work, we beg leave to assure Your Majesty of our untainted Duty and Obedience, and that we will be ever ready to assist and support Your Majesty against all Designs of Your Foreign and Domestic Enemies.

May Your Majesty live to reap the happy Fruits of all Your pious Endeavours; may Your Reign continue long and prosperous, and may all the Attempts of a restless Faction to dispute Your Majesty's exercising the just Prerogative of the Crown, or to disturb Your Quiet, be always disappointed.

Most Dread Sovereign!

When we reflect upon Your Majesty's wife and gracious Administration of the Publick Affairs, especially in this nice and difficult Juncture, we cannot but discern the Heavenly Pattern You set before You, in imitating the Divine Goodness, not only in making Peace for Your own Subjects and Your Allies, but also in condescending to shew how much You are pleased with as many of them as gratefully accept the Blessing.

How Beautiful is the Throne upon which Royal Greatness and real Goodness appear so entirely united in the same Person, and with what Delight do obedient Subjects present their Addresses of Thanks, where their just Expressions of Duty and Loyalty never fail of being graciously received?

This encourages us, some of the meanest of Your People, to lay our poor offering of Thanks at Your Majesty's Feet, for those blessed tidings of approaching Peace, which You have lately published from the Throne, and wherein the Revival of Trade is provided for, under the want of which,

we and our Families have as much suffered, as under the Burthen of a long exhausting War.

We, Madam, are a numerous Trading People employed in the Iron Manufacture, which has long wanted those free Passages of Commerce, that now, to the Joy of our Hearts, are opening to us, by the Dint of Your Majesty's Authority abroad, as well as the unanimous Concurrence of your great Council and faithful Ministry at Home.

While others ungratefully murmur at Their, as well as Your Majesty's Proceedings, and spurn at the Hand that would save them from sinking, we, considering the humble Station we are in, resolve not only to be quiet, and to do our own Business, but to express the sincere Thankfulness of Hearts, by praying Heaven to bring Your Majesty's indefatigable Endeavours for the Peace of Your Kingdoms, and of all *Europe*, to an happy Conclusion.

After which may Your Majesty long live to enjoy, and to delight Your Self, in seeing Your Beloved People also reap the Fruits of that common Blessing; a Blessing, which will not only extend the Power of Your Crown, but render Your Memory grateful to all Posterity, not only by opening a Trade for them as well as us, to Countries which we are yet Strangers to, but by securing the Succession of Monarchy and Episcopacy, those inseparable Twins, in the Protestant Line, as Established by Law.

Which Addresses Her Majesty received very graciously.

Venice, August 26. N. S. They write from Rome, that the Pope is very uneasy at the News from Naples, where they refuse Possession to those Strangers he has put into Ecclesiastical Benefices, and deny all Power to the Inquisition; upon the account of which Affair, Congregations have been held every Day of last Week.

Coin, August 30. N. S. Letters of this Day from Switzerland say, that the General Diet at Arau was broke up, after the signing and ratifying of the Peace on all Sides; and that Monsieur le Comte du Luc, the French Ambassador, made a Speech on that Occasion. The Conditions of the Peace are as follows.

I. That the Treaty made the 18th of July last, shall remain in its full Force.

II. That the District in the Country called the Free Provinces, shall extend from Loncofen to Farwangen.

III. That the Canton of Berne shall be admitted into the Co-sovereignty of the common Bailliages of Turgow, Rhynthal, Sargans, and the rest of the Free Provinces.

IV. That the Letter or Instrument, of the Year 1531, shall be delivered up.

V. That the City of Raperfwil and its Dependencies, with the Bridge and little Village of Horden, shall be yielded for ever to the two Cantons of Zurich and Bernic.

VI. That the five Catholick Cantons shall do their utmost to procure a Peace between the two Cantons and the Abbot of St. Gall.

The Instrument that contains the aforesaid Articles, has been sealed with the Seals of all the Cantons. Another Diet will be held at Baden the 11th of September, and the Abbot of St. Gall is invited to it by the Neutral Cantons, in order to the adjusting the Differences between him and those of Zurich and Berne, that so a General Peace and Tranquility may be restor'd in these Countries.

Genoa, August 31. N. S. We have received Advice, that the British Fleet was seen off of Palermo the 19th Instant, with the Imperial Troops under their Convoy, bound for Barcelona.

Hamburg, Sept. 9. N. S. They write from Bender, that the King of Sweden has again had notice to depart, which his Majesty declared he could not do, without having a Conference with the Grand Signior. The same Advices add, that two of his Majesty's Servants have, in open Daylight, been Murder'd by the Janizaries; since which time his other Domesticks do not appear in the Streets so publickly as usual. The King of Poland has accompanied the Czar to Wolgart, in order to assist at the Attack of Rugen, which will be made the 10th or 12th Instant. Eight thousand Muscovites, with an Artillery of Sixty Pieces of Cannon, mounted on Danish Prams, or Flat-bottom'd Boats, are appointed for that Decent. The Czar had also sent to the King of Prussia, to borrow twelve Mortars for that Service, from which his Majesty excused himself, alledging, That would be too great a Violation of the exact Neutrality he is determin'd to observe between both Parties. The Report that the Plague was extended to Kelling, a League and a half distant from this City, is found to be groundless; for a Physician that has been sent from hence thither, to

Townay, September 4. N. S. The Prince of Hesse came hither the Thirty first of last Month, but returned next day to the Army, after he had been entertained at Dinner by the Earl of Alcomar, who will continue here some time longer. Boats arrive here every Day from Gand, with Stores of Ammunition and Provision for our Magazines.

Lisle, September 4. N. S. The great Convoy from Gand, consisting of a hundred Boats, laden with Artillery, Ammunition and Corn, arrived here Yesterday. The ten Battalions detached from the Army, under the Command of the Prince of Holstein Beck, our Governor, passed by this Place, and encamped near Maquette, half a League distant from hence, in order to be at hand for the Reinforcing our Garrison in case of Necessity. Great Diligence is used to put our Fortifications into a good Condition of Defence.

Brussls, September 14. N. S. The French Army continues in the Camp of Quevrain, and Marechal Villars hath his Head Quarters at Scourgh; we are assured that the Lines of Circumvallation are begun before Quinoy, and there seems to be no longer any Appearance of an Attempt for the Relief of that Place, as was reported to be intended: The French having rendered the Design of the Confederates impracticable, by coming into their present Camp, where they are strongly posted, and are much superior in their Infantry. Yesterday we received Advice from Mons, that the great Convoy of Provision, which had been sent from hence on the Eleventh Instant, for the use of the Army was safely arrived in that Place. Some Advices from Luxembourg say, that a great Body of French Horse was in Motion, between the Rhine and the Meuse, in order to make a second Incurtion into the Dutch Territories.

Gand, September 15. N. S. Brigadier Sutton, who Commands at Bruges, has been here to wait on my Lord Duke of Ormond, and at his return to his Garrison had Orders from his Grace to take Care that the Barracks there be forthwith put into a Condition to receive our Dragoons. The Confederate Army is encamp'd with the Right Wing at Queine near Mons, and the Left at Quevy. Prince Eugene having his Quarters at the Abby of Beian. Yesterday in the Evening Sir Thomas Hammer returned hither from Dunkirk.
