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Windsor, September 14.

**T**HE following Address from the Town and Corporation of *Penzance*, was presented to Her Majesty by *John Nicholls*, Esq; being introduced by the *Hon. the Lord Lansdowne*, Comptroller of Her Majesty's Household.

To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Gentlemen, Merchants, Traders, and others, being the Majority of the principal Inhabitants of the Town and Corporation of *Penzance* (by the Lands end) in Your County of *Cornwall*.

Most Gracious Sovereign!

**P**ermit us, Your faithful and obedient Subjects, the Sound and Loyal Part of the said Town of *Penzance*, (being the remotest of Your Subjects in the said County of *Cornwall*) with Hearts full of Love, Loyalty and Duty for Your Sacred Person, to approach Your Throne with our humblest Thanks for Your Majesty's unparalleled Condescension, in communicating to Your People (groaning under the weighty Burthen of a lingering and unequal War) the happy Terms upon which a Peace so Glorious to Your Majesty, so Advantageous to Your Subjects, and so Secure to all Your Allies, may be obtained; which great and good Work may Heaven enable You to bring to its wish'd Effect, and such, our Hopes are, is nigh at hand.

We bless the Dawning of that Day that gave Your Majesty Light into the dark and hidden Designs of the Enemies to Your Crown and Kingdoms; and we want Words to express our particular Joy and Satisfaction, in that we find Your Majesty's Heart so happily guided in a Choice of so Faithful and Able Ministry, as have with so great a Steadiness and Courage pursued Your and their Countries true Interest.

And when we consider Your Majesty's (ever to be remembered) pious Regard for our Establishment Church, and the fresh Instances of Your Zeal for improving her, by so graciously extending the free Use of her most excellent Liturgy to those of the Episcopal Communion in *North-Britain*, and Your peculiar Care for the Protestant Succession, all so highly conducing to the Security of our Establishment in Church and State, and the Peace, Happiness and Tranquility of Your Kingdoms: We must own Your Majesty the only and greatest Blessing of this Age to Your People; and that that Blessing shall ever acquire our true Duty, Loyalty and Obedience, and oblige us daily to implore the great King of Kings long to prosper, and continue Your auspicious Administration; and that, after a Completion of a happy Reign here, You may enjoy an eternal Crown of Glory.

Which Address Her Majesty received very graciously.

*Turin*, September 10. N. S. A Courier arrived here the Sixth Instant from *Marschal Dawn*, with an Account that the Enemy had decamp'd that Morning from *Oulx*, and to desire his Royal Highness's Orders thereupon, who immediately dispatch'd the *Contador General de Fontana*, to concert with him the most commodious-Place for the Subsistence of the Army. That Gentleman return'd hither Yesterday with *General Zumjungen*, to inform his Royal Highness what Resolutions they were come to in that Matter, and to receive his last Orders, so that we expect to hear in a Day or two, whether the Enemy will continue in a Body where they now are, or separate for their better conveniency of Subsistence. On the Eighth Instant, being the Anniversary of the Deliverance of this City from the Siege laid to it by the French in 1706, there were great Illuminations and Rejoicings here at Night: In the Evening his Royal Highness, with the Dutchess Consort, and the rest of the Royal Family, went to the Chapel of *St. John*, to see the *Santo Sudario*, which had not been shown for several Years before. The next Day, being the Nativity of the Blessed Virgin, was also observed as a Day of publick Thanksgiving on the the same Occasion, and the Duke with all the Knights of the Annuntiade, the two Dutchesses, and the whole Court assisted at the Chapel in the Cathedral Church, and afterwards made a Procession thro' the best part of the Town, with great Solemnity. This Night was also concluded with publick Illuminations, and all other Marks of Rejoicings. *Mr. Paget*, Son to the *Lord Burton*, arriv'd here Yesterday from *Lions*, in his way to *Italy*, where he is going to Travel. He confirms the News we had received some Days before, of the March of four Regiments of Dragoons from *Savoy* for *Catalonia*; and that the Enemy talk of detaching Twenty or Twenty five Battalions for the same County,

which they are confident will be more than sufficient, to oblige *General Staremberg* to retire under the Cannon of *Barcelona*. We hear that the Emperor hath given Orders to all the Governors, and other Military Officers in the *Milanese*, to obey *Marschal Dawn*; which Mark of his Imperial Majesty's Confidence in that General, gives his Friends hope that it is a step towards his being made Governor of that State.

*Berlin*, September 10. N. S. The King came hither Yesterday from *Charlottenburg*, to view the Damage occasioned by a Fire that broke out the Night before in the Magazines of Corn, one belonging to his Majesty, and the other to the Town; the said Magazines, and the Corn therein, to the value of Sixty thousand Crowns, were consumed; but how this Fire begun is not yet known, notwithstanding the Diligence that has been used to discover it. Some are inclined to suspect it to be a Contrivance of the Swedes, to disappoint the Bargains that have been lately made, by some of the King's Subjects, for supplying the *Muscovite Army* with Provisions; and they think their Conjecture the more probable, because this Town being still under the apprehension of the Contagion, the King will be oblig'd to forbid the Exportation of Corn out of his Dominions, till the above-mentioned Loss is repaired.

*Brussels*, September 19. N. S. The freshest Advices from before *Quesnoy* say, that the Trenches were not to be opened till last Night; the French having delay'd so long, in order to secure their Camp, which they have entrenched in the accessible Places. In the mean time the Confederates continue in their former Situation near *Mons*. On the 17th Fifteen hundred of their Horse, under the Command of *Count Altham*, fell upon the French Foragers, beat the Escorte, and brought away Three hundred Prisoners.

*Utrecht*, September 20. N. S. Yesterday Morning a Conference was held as usual in the Town-House, between as many of the Ministers of the Allies as were at that time residing here. In the Evening the Counts *Denhoff* and *Werthern*, the former Plenipotentiary from the King of *Prussia*, and the latter from *King Augustus*, return'd hither from the *Hague*; as did *Monsieur Marshal Bieberstein*, another of the *Prussian Ministers*, the Night before from *Amsterdam*; and several others, who have lately taken a turn to the former of those two Places, are daily expected from thence. The *Lord Viscount Longueville* set out from hence this Morning, on his way to *England*. *Sir Robert Brown*, Major-General in the Service of *King Augustus*, is come hither from the *Hague*, where he has been for some Weeks past, in order to sollicite the Payment of Arrears due to the Troops of that Prince, which are in the Service of the States General.
