We cannot be insensible of the great and many Difficulties that Your Majesty must necessarily Encounter, in a Work of so weighty and important a Nature; and therefore we think it our Duty to implore, that the same good Providence that hath remarkably blest Your Arms with Success, during the course of the War, may so guide and direct Your Majesty, and Your Councils, in the present Negotiations, that a Peace may be accomplished on such Terms as will render the Protestant Succession in the most illustrious House of *Hanover* (which Your Majesty has so much at Heart and on which our Welfare so much depends) completely Secure; fully satisfy all your Allies, what they can in Justice or Reason expect, improve the Trade and Commerce of Your Kingdoms, and establish their future Tranquillity on a safe, honourable and steady Foundation.

May Your Majesty live many many Years, to enjoy the blessed Effects of such a Peace, with what other Happiness and Felicity Earth can afford: May Your Subjects be capable of no other Contention, than who shall out-do each other in Loyalty and Affection to Your Majesty's Person and Government, Zeal to the Protestant Interest, and Love to their Country: And may Your Majesty, whensoever it shall please God to afflict Your People with the Loss of so good a Sovereign, in lieu of an Earthly Crown receive a Heavenly Diadem, shall ever be the Prayers of Your faithful and dutiful Subjects.

The following Address from the Burgh of *Aberdeen*, was presented to Her Majesty by *William Lewingstone*, Esq; their Representative in Parliament.

To the QUEEN'S most Excellent Majesty:

The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town-Council of the Burgh of *Aberdeen*.

May it please Your Majesty,

THE grand Design of an expensive and bloody War being a safe and honourable Peace, we should certainly be very much wanting in our duty, not to congratulate Your Majesty upon the promising views thereof.

And considering Your Majesty's gracious and repeated Declarations of a deep Concern for the Quiet and Happiness of all your People, and particularly Your Royal Design, towards securing the Succession in the Protestant Line as settled by Law in the illustrious House of *Hanover*.

We cannot but upon these, in the most sincere manner, acknowledge the great Wisdom and Goodness of God, in preferring Your Majesty after the Death of your Royal and Glorious Predecessors, and that not only as the great support of the religious and civil Interests of *Britain* and *Ireland*, but also as the grand Hope of all the Reformed Churches.

Upon all which we most cordially pray, that God may signally Bless Your Majesty with a long and happy Reign; and so direct and influence Your present great Negotiations, as to produce a sure and lasting Peace, Glorious to Your Majesty, Establishing the Protestant Religion, and Prosperous to all Your Majesty's Subjects. May it please Your Majesty, Your Majesty's most Faithful, most Humble, and most Obedient Subjects and Servants.

Venice, Sept. 16. N. S. Signor Emo is lately returned hither from the Court of France, where he had been to adjust some Differences between that Crown and the Republick. The Council of Ten have recall'd the Lady Zenobio, who was banished some time ago for speaking disrespectfully of their Tribunal. Several Vessels richly laden, are come in here from the Levant, under Convoy of the Iris, a Man of War belonging to this State, on board of which the Signor da Lezze, and seven other Noblemen, are returned from their Governments. Letters from Naples say, that a Body of Algerines had landed in the Abruzzo, and carry'd away a great number of People of all sorts from the neighbourhood of the Cities Atri and Lanciana. They write from Rome, that the Marquis de Prie had a publick Audience of the Pope on the 7th, and on the 10th that Minister dispatch'd an Express to Vienna, with an Account of the Affairs of Naples.

Turin, Sept. 17. N. S. Upon repeated Advices that the French Army was marching in the Valleys of Demont, Meira, and Urraita, his Royal Highness sent an Express on the 10th to Marshal Dawn, and on the 11th another to Colonel Prela, the Commander in Chief of the Horse at Barges. On the 12th, the Marquis d'Ogliani arrived here, being dispatched by the latter with an Account, that he had met the Enemy between Vezzolo and Villeneuve, about

iments of Horse so successfully, that after a dispute of two Hours, they were obliged to retire, tho' superior in number to our Troops, and sustain'd by a Detachment of Grenadiers; several of their Men were kill'd or taken Prisoners in the Action: On our side we had only one Officer kill'd, and about Twenty or Thirty Troopers. The Enemy appear'd no more that Day, and we have since received advice, that they are retired from the Valleys. We are assured from the French Camp, that they have made a considerable Detachment for Catalonia, which some say consists of 18, and some of 25 Battalions.

Berlin, Sept. 27. N. S. On the 21st Instant the King went to Goltz, to divert himself with Stag-shooting. Before his departure he gave Orders for two Battalions of the Guards to be in a readiness to march, and it is supposed they are to join his Majesty's Troops on the Frontiers of Pomerania. Orders are sent to General Anheim, who commands Eight thousand Prussians in British Pay, to comply with the Cessation of Arms agreed on between Her Majesty and France, and to withdraw from the Army in Italy. The Field-Marshal is gone to Oranienburg to receive the Czar, and attend him to this Place, where he is expected in his way to Caisbad.

Brussels, October 5. N. S. The general Assembly of the States of Brabant was opened Yesterday, and they will continue Sitting for some Days. Besides the ordinary Affairs of the Province, they have under Consideration the Means to provide their Contingent of the Bread and Forage demanded for the Imperial Troops during the Winter. Letters of Yesterday from the Camp at Belian assure us, that Quesnoy continued to make a Defence; but the Counter-scarp being taken, and the Besiegers having erected Batteries upon it, which began to play against the Town Wall on the 3d, it is thought the Governor will soon be obliged to Capitulate. They write from Valenciennes, that since Bouchain has been Invested on all sides, the Enemy have been making Preparations to open the Trenches before it. Upon notice that Monsieur Quoad is in Motion with a Detachment of French Troops between the Sambre and the Meuse, four Regiments of Horse, who are to be quarter'd on that side during the Winter; were detach'd two Days ago from the Confederate Camp, and pursued their March this Morning from hence towards the Meuse. Advices from Namur and Charleroy say, great Magazines of Provisions and Warlike Stores are making in those Places.
