The many and signal Victories which adorn Your Majesty's Reign, will sufficiently evidence to latest Posterity, the Success of *British* Valour, under Your Majesty's auspicious Government. And Your Majesty having settled the Protestant Succession in the House of *Hannover*, there will be nothing wanting but the Advantages of that Peace Your Majesty has graciously given us to near a Prospect of, to make us a flourishing and a happy People, and your Majesty's Reign most Glorious: That Your Majesty may long enjoy the blessed Fruits of a peaceful Reign, is the sincere Prayer of, may it please You Majesty, Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

The following Address from the Borough of *Monrofs*, was presented to Her Majesty by *William Lovingsstone*, Esq; their Representative in Parliament.

To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty, The humble Address of the Provoist, Bayliffs, Dean of *Guild*, Treasurer and Town-Council of the Borough of *Monrofs*, in that Part of *Great Britain* called *Soetland*, for themselves, and in the Name and Behalf of the Community of the said Borough.

Most Sacred Sovereign, WE are deeply sensible of the many and unparallel'd Blessings we enjoy under Your Majesty's most auspicious Reign; and do most humbly presume to congratulate Your Majesty, that the Treaty of Peace is, by the Blessing of God on Your Endeavours, so far advanced, as to give us Hopes that it will be suddenly brought to an happy and honourable Conclusion: And this is the more glorious both for Your Majesty and Your faithful and resolute Ministry, that the same has been set on Foot and Prosecuted, in Opposition to an Ungrateful Faction at Home, supported by very considerable Powers Abroad.

Our Loyalty to Your Crown and Dignity is Old, Habitual, and Unshaken; and we are hopeful that the tender Care Your Majesty has had of the Interest of Your Subjects, during the whole course of a long and expensive War, with the great Concern You have testified for an honourable, lasting, and advantageous Peace, and the intire Confidence which Your Majesty has shew'd in Your People, by communicating to Your Parliament, the Terms upon which this Peace might be had, before the same was concluded, cannot but have such happy and desirable Effects upon the Hearts of all Your Majesty's Subjects, who have the least Spark of Gratitude or Integrity, as to Inspire them with an ardent Zeal for promoting Your Majesty's Honor.

But we lie yet under a further Obligation, and do, with

all humble Sincerity, offer Your Majesty, most hearty Thanks for indulging us the Free Exercise of that Form of religious Worship used in the Church of *England*, which we are persuaded is the best; and for restoring our Patrons to their ancient and just Rights, and in that Point delivering us from the Tyranny and Oppression of Synods and Presbytery.

Though we are sensibly touch'd with the Loss Your Majesty's Allies suffered at *Denain*, yet we cannot but own that we bear it the more easily, because we are hopeful the Consequences of that unfortunate Action will convince these Potentates of the honourableness and safety of that Plan Your Majesty offered for a general Peace, their obstinate retuling of which, obliged Your Majesty to withdraw Your National Troops, the want of whole Valour and Conduct they have, by a fatal Experiment, learned to Value.

That Your Majesty may long, very long, Reign over us; and still continue the Favourite of the most High, and be directed in all Your Councils, and assisted in all Your Actings, by his Infinite Wisdom and Almighty Power, is the earnest Prayer of, may it please Your Majesty, Your Majesty's most faithful Subjects, and dutiful humble Servants.

Venice, September 23. N. S. Signor *Cornero* having been excused from going to *Constantinople*, the great Council met on the 21st to chuse a new Bailo in his Place. Signor *Andrea Memo* was chos'd, and it is thought he will accept the Emploment. The Doge has been dangerously ill at his Countys seat, but he is now perfectly recovered. They write from *Naples*, that great Diligence is used there to prevent Assemblies of Malecontents, who begin to discover their Inclinations against the Government in a very presumptuous manner. Advices from *Turkey* say, that the *Plague* destroys great numbers of People at *Constantinople*, *Smirna*, and *Scio*.

Berlin, October 1. N. S. The Morning the King came hither from *Landberg*, whic he had been in his way thro' *Coltz*. In the first Weather continous, his Majesty intends to go within a few Days to *Potsdam*, to be present at the Vintage there, as usual. The Field-Marshal is returned from *Oranienburg*, where he had been to receive the *Czar*, who has now alter'd his Resolution of coming to this Place. By our last Letters from the *Muscovite* Army in *Pomerania* we are inform'd, that they have at last resolv'd to make a Descent into the *Lie of Rugen*, and we expect continually to hear the Success of this Enterprize.

Hannover, October 4. N. S. On Saturday last Mr. *Harley* set out from hence towards *Great Britain*. We have an Account from *Pomerania*, that the *Czar* is returned to the Camp, upon a Notice that the Danish Fleet was under sail near the Coasts of *Rugen*, by the help of which Fleet he has resolv'd to make an attempt upon that Island with Ten thousand *Muscovite* Foot, sustained by Two thousand *Saxon* Horse. It is said, the Descent will be made at *Putbus*, a small Town within two Leagues to the South of *Bergen*. Monsieur *Labrice*, Envoy from the *Elector* to the *Czar*, is arriv'd at the Camp, and has deliver'd his Credentials.

Utrecht, October 7. N. S. On Wednesday the 5th Instant the Ministers of the States-General desired a Conference with those of Her Majesty, which was accordingly held that Morning at the Lord *Piivy* Seal's House, and in the Afternoon their Lordships dispatch'd an Express to *Great Britain*. The same Evening Mr. *Harley*, accompanied by several English Gentlemen, arriv'd here from the Court of *Hannover*, and this Day he set out for *Flanders*, in order to return home. Upon the coming in of an Express from *Mareschal Villars*, the Plenipotentiaries of *France* give out, that *Quefnoy* surrendered on the 4th, and that the *Trenches* before *Bouchain* were to be opened on the 6th.
