The Assurance Your Majesty has given to us, of Your Care in the Succession of the most Illustrious House of *Hamover*, is most Delightful to us; and we do, in a particular manner, acknowledge Your Majesty's great Goodness to us in that respect.

And we most earnestly pray, that this great and glorious Work which Your Majesty hath so auspiciously begun, may be soon accomplished, and brought to an happy Conclusion; and that Your Majesty may long live to enjoy the Benefit thereof.

*Copenhagen, Oct. 4. N. S.* We have received adyce, that the Swedes have landed some Forces in the Isle of *Rugen*. Their Number is not yet exactly known, but it is said, they consist of 8000 Foot, and that the Cavalry is not yet arriv'd. On the 2d Instant, an Express brought an Account, that his Majesty's Fleet was come to the Gulph of *Kiog*, after having taken and burnt several of the Swedish Transport Ships returning home empty, and one laden with Corn. The two Fleets were, for some Days, on the side of each other, and fired several random Shot: At last both of them gave the Signal of Engagement, which lasted but a very little while, the Wind and Weather obliging the Danes to bear off, and return to the Gulph of *Kiog*. Yesterday the King sent Orders to his Fleet, that it should return to Sea, and endeavour to engage the Swedes, in order to prevent, if possible, the Transport of the Horse, which it is suppos'd, is not yet made.

*Hamover, Oct. 7. N. S.* Letters from *Stralsund*, of the 30th inst give an Account, that the Swedish Transports were arriv'd at the Ile of *Rugen*. On the 20th they cast Anchor near *Wittau*, and the next Day most of the Troops

holz. On the 28th, the Vessels returned to bring the  
remainder of the Forces. Those Letters add, that great firing  
had been heard at Sea for two Days together, which gave  
occasion to think, that an Action had happened between  
the two Fleets.

*Brussels, October 8. N. S.* On the 4th Instant, at three in  
the Afternoon, the Garrison of Quesnoy beat a Parley, and  
agreed to surrender themselves Prisoners of War. The next  
Day the Marquis d'Alegre was detach'd with Thirty Batta-  
lions to reinforce the French Troops that have invested  
Bouchain. No Account is yet come of the Trenches being  
opened before that Place. Letters of Yesterday from Lille  
inform us, that on the 6th a Party from Ostend had sur-  
prized and taken Fort Knock, situate upon the Canal be-  
tween Ipres and Dunkirk, and had put the Garrison, con-  
sisting of Three hundred Men, to the Sword. Twelve Bar-  
rallions, which were encamped at the Gates of Lille, march-  
ed Yesterday in great diligence towards those Parts, in order  
to sustain the Troops that are in Possession of the Fort.

*Utrecht, October 11. N. S.* Yesterday Morning all the Mi-  
nisters of the Allies residing here met in the Town-house,  
as usual, and in the Afternoon the French Plenipotentiaries,  
who received an Expres from their Court the Night be-  
fore, had a Conference with those of Great Britain. In the  
Evening the Plenipotentiaries of the States-General were  
likewise in Conference with their Lordships, after which  
they dispatch'd a Courier to the Hague. Some Days ago  
those Ministers, by Order of the States their Masters, deli-  
vered to their Lordships a new Proposal for a General Peace,  
and Yesterday it was communicated to all the Ministers of  
the Allies.
