Copenhagen, Oct. 4. N. S. We have received advice, that the Swedes have landed some Forces in the Isle of *Rugen*. Their Number is not yet exactly known, but it is said, they consist of 8000 Foot, and that the Cavalry is not yet arrived. On the 2d Instant, an Express brought an Account, that his Majesty's Fleet was come to the Gulph of *Kiog*, after having taken and burnt several of the Swedish Transport Ships returning home empty, and one laden with Corn. The two Fleets were, for some Days, on the side of each other, and fired several random Shot: At last both of them gave the Signal of Engagement, which lasted but a very little while, the Wind and Weather obliging the Danes to bear off, and return to the Gulph of *Kiog*. Yesterday the King sent Orders to his Fleet, that it should return to Sea, and endeavour to engage the Swedes, in order to prevent, if possible, the Transport of the Horse, which it is supposed, is not yet made.

Hamover, Oct. 7. N. S. Letters from *Stralsund*, of the 30th inst give an Account, that the Swedish Transports were arriv'd at the Ile of *Rugen*. On the 20th they cast Anchor near *Wittau*, and the next Day most of the Troops
