May it please Your Majesty,

WE Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Magistrates, Town-Council, and Inhabitants of the Borough of *Inverness*, with all humble Gratitude, acknowledge Your Majesty's great Condescension and Goodness in communicating to the Representatives of Your People in Parliament, the Terms on which the general Peace may be made.

Your Majesty, whose undoubted Prerogative it is to make Peace and War, hath fill'd the Hearts of us, Your loyal Subjects, with inexpressible Joy, on the most agreeable Prospect of an approaching Peace; and That upon such Terms as we hope will make Your Subjects ample Satisfaction for the Burdens they have undergone during the whole course of the War.

Your Majesty, to our great Satisfaction, hath sufficiently secured the Protestant Succession, and, to our no small Encouragement and Comfort, has enlarged our Trade, by extending it to Coasts it never yet had reach'd.

As we detest and abhor all those Levelling, Republick Principles which have sometimes proved fatal both to Church and State; so we cannot fail to assure Your Majesty, that we will not be wanting in our Endeavours and Duty, to obviate, to our utmost Power, the Designs of any evil Minded Persons who may attempt to sow Sedition among Your Subjects, and, under specious Pretences, carry on Designs they dare not Own.

May the God of Peace grant, that in a long and quiet Reign, Glorious to Your Self, and Happy to Us, Your Majesty may long enjoy the Fruits of an honourable Peace, after so successful a War, is the sincere Prayer of, may it please Your Majesty, Your Majesty's most Dutiful and Loyal Subjects.

Florence, Sept. 13. N. S. Last Week a Festival, in Honour of Pope Pius V. lately Canonized at Rome, was celebrated at St. Lawrence's Church with great Solemnity. The Grand Duke, attended by the Nobility, and most of the Foreign Ministers, was present at the Ceremony, which lasted three Days. The Church was hung throughout with rich Hangings; there was a fine Composition of Musick, and an Oration on the Occasion, spoken by Canonico *Mozzi*. At Night the Guns round the Forts were fir'd, the Dome of the Cathedral was illuminated, and variety of Fire-works appear'd in several Quarters of the Town.

Genoa, Sept. 18. N. S. On Wednesday last Her Majesty's Ships the *Cornwall*, *Mary*, and *Lion* arrived here from *Leghorn*, where they took Aboard Provisions and Stores. Lait Night the *Lion* set Sail for *Port Mahon*, and the other two intend to depart as soon as the British Letters come in, if they are not prevented by bad Weather.

Hamburgh, Octob. 7. N. S. Letters from the Muscovite Camp say, the Czar had appointed the First of this Month to make an Attack upon the Siege of *Rugen*. We are assur'd that the Swedes have landed 9000 Men in the said Island, and that King *Stanislaus* has made his Entry at *Stralsund*, under a triple discharge of the Cannon. The Duke of *Wolfenbuttle* has acquainted his States, that finding himself grown Old, he is resolv'd to pass the rest of his Days in Quiet, for which reason he will resign the Government to the Hereditary Prince, his eldest Son, reserving to himself a yearly Pension of One hundred thousand Crowns. It is believed he intends to retire to *Rome*.

Hague, October 11. N. S. The States of *Holland* were assembled last Friday and Saturday, and dispos'd of several Military Employments. This Day they met again, and are to continue Sitting all this Week. Yesterday in the Evening an Express arriv'd here from *Brigadier Caris*, Commandant of *Ostend*, with advice, That notice being given him what a slender Garrison the Enemy had in *Fort Knock*, on the 4th Instant, he detach'd 180 Men thither, under the Command of the *Partizan de Ruc*, who, after having fetch'd a compass round the Country, found means to hide themselves in some Peasants Houfes, from whence they came out at Six in the Morning; And when the Gates of the Fort were opened, they took that Opportunity to rush in, and

having forced the Guards, they secured the French Governor, and made themselves Masters of the Place. The same Day Brigadier Carris sent thither forty Men more, who got in safe with all Sorts of Provisions for a Fortnight. The Garrisons of Furnes, Newport, and Ipres, are gone out to block up the Fort, but the Prince of Holsteinbeck having posted himself at Warneton with eleven Battalions, and two hundred Horse, it is thought they will hardly go on with their Design. General Hompefch, late Governor of Douay, arrived here last Saturday. Monsieur Matteoeff, Ambassador from Muscovy, intends to set out next Week, in order to return to the Czar, and Prince Cürakin is expected here in his Place.
