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Windsor, October 15.

THE following Address from the County of *Flint*, was presented to Her Majesty by Sir *John Conway*, Kt. being introduced by his Grace the Duke of *Shrewsbury*, Lord Chamberlain of Her Majesty's Household.

To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty,
Most Gracious Sovereign!

WE Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and other Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of *Flint*, assembled together at the great Sessions held at *Mould* for the said County, do, with the utmost Gratitude, acknowledge Your Majesty's great Goodness, in endeavouring to procure, after so long and expensive a War, a safe and honourable Peace: Which, that Your Majesty may effect, and bring it to an happy Conclusion; and that You may live long to enjoy the Blessings of it, are the sincere Wishes, and hearty Prayers of, Madam, Your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.

The following Address was presented to Her Majesty.

To the *QUEEN's* most Excellent Majesty,

The humble Address of the Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the City and County of *Londonderry*, assembled at a general Assizes held for the said City and County, the ninth Day of *August*, 1712.

Most Gracious Sovereign,

WE are extremely glad of all Opportunities of assuring Your Majesty of our sincere Loyalty, and Affection to the best of Queens. As fatal Necessity once forc'd us to endure the utmost Calamities of War, in defence of our Religion and Constitution, so we are very sensible what Blessings all Your Subjects owe to Your Majesty, the Successes of whose glorious Reign shall be Crown'd with a lasting and honourable Peace: Such a Peace as will hereafter, put it out of the Power of the most ambitious Prince, to attempt the Universal Monarchy of *Europe*, promote the Good of the Church by Law Established, advance the Trade of Your Kingdoms, secure the Protestant Succession in the illustrious House of *Hannover*, as settled by Act of Parliament, and make it vain for any Popish Pretender (however assisted by any of Your Majesty's Foreign or Domestick Enemies) to Usurp any of Your Titles, or ever attempt to Invade any part of Your Dominions. These we well know, and gratefully acknowledge, are the Blessings Your Majesty always had at Your Royal Heart for Your People, and which we hope God Almighty will assist Your Majesty to obtain, in spite of all Opposition whatsoever. We beg leave to conclude, by renewing, in the most Solemn Manner, all Assurances of our firm Loyalty to, and profound Respect for Your Majesty, whom we will ever stedfastly adhere to, and stand by with our Lives and Fortunes.

Venice, October 7. N. S. On Monday last Monsignor *Mattei*, the Pope's Nuntio, had a publick Audience in the College, where he notified his being made Archbishop of *Fermo*, and that he is to be suc-

ceeded here by Monsignor *Aldobrandini*, who is at present Nuntio at *Naples*. On Tuesday last Signor *Venier*, one of the Council of Ten, coming out of the Council before the others, waited in the *Broglio* for Signor *Gabrieli*, another Member of that Tribunal, against whom he had an old Quarrel, and whose Office of Inquisitor of State was that Day expired. *Venier* struck *Gabrieli* over the Face, then drew a Stiletto, which it is Death to carry in the great Council, and would probably have killed him, if several Gentlemen had not interposed. Upon this Accident the Council of Ten assembled two Days after, where they resolved, that the Insult committed by Signor *Venier* was not done to Signor *Gabrieli* as a private Person, but as Inquisitor of State. Whereupon a Proclamation was publickly read against him, and he was ordered to surrender himself in twenty four Hours. It is reported, that he hath withdrawn himself to day out of the Dominions of this State, and on Monday next the Council of Ten will publish a Sentence by which he will be condemn'd to Death, deprived of his Nobility, his Estate confiscated, a Stone of Infamy erected, and Ten thousand Ducats promised as a Reward to any Person that apprehends him.

Copenhagen, October 8. N. S. The Danish Fleet is returning home, having been some Days ago in a very violent Storm. We have no Account yet of their having suffered by it, and two Ships that were separated from the rest are already come into this Harbour. It is said, the Swedish Fleet is gone into *Carlsroon*. The Court of *Holstein-Gottorp* being informed that the Danish Forces are to be quarter'd this Winter in the *Bailiwicks* belonging to that Duke, his Secretary here has spoke about it to the King's Ministers, who disown there is any such Design, but at the same time demand sufficient Security from the Court of *Gottorp*, that the Swedish Parties shall make no more Excursions into *Holstein*. The Ministers of *Gottorp* have returned answer, that Count *Welling* has assured the Administrator no more such Excursions shall be made, which is all the Security they can possibly give. The Danes insist this is not sufficient, and its supposed they may make that a pretence to put their Troops into Quarters in the Duke's Territories.

Berlin, October 15. N. S. The Day after the Czar arrived here, he went out early in the Morning to see the Arsenal, and being returned to his House, he received a Visit from the King. In the Evening he was entertained with all his Court by his Majesty at Supper; after which he took his leave of the King, and set out the next Day at seven of the Clock for *Carlsbad*. The Cannon was fired thrice round the Town at his Departure, which he declined at his arrival. During his stay here, he was attended by the Field-Marshal and Chambellan *Slippenbach*, and he seemed so well satisfied with his Reception, that he has resolved to pass by this Place again in his return from *Carlsbad*, where he intends to stay but three Weeks.

Brussels, Octob. 22. N. S. Letters from *Lille* of the 14th bring an Account, that the Prince of *Holsteinbeck* was returned thither with a Detachment which had march'd to sustain the Party that surpriz'd *Fort Knock*: He has reinforce'd the Garrison of that Place, which now consists of 400 Men: He has likewise sent in thirty Waggon's laden with Meal for their Subsistence: Besides which, the adjacent Villages have been Summon'd to bring in Pro-
