HE following Address from the County of Flint, was presented to Her Majesty by Sir John Conmay, Kt. being introdu-ted by his Grace the Duke of Shrewsbury, Lord Chamberlain of Her Majefty's Houshold.

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty, Molt Gracious Sovereign !

WE Your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the High Sheriff, Justices of the Peace, Grand Jury, and other Gentlemen, and Freeholders of the County of Flint, affembled together at the great Sections held at Mould for the faid County, do, with the utmost Gratitude, acknowledge Your Majefly's great Goodnefs, in endeavouring to pro-cure, after fo long and expensive a War, a fafe and hosourable Peace: Which, that Your Majefly may effect; and bring it to an happy Conclusion; and that You may live long to enjoy the Bleffings of it, are the fingere Wifnes, and hearty Prayers of, Madam, Your Majefty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.

The following Address was presented to Her Majefty,

To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majefty,

The humble Address of the Grand Jury, Justices of the Peace, Gentlemen and Freeholders of the City and County of Londonderry, affembled at a general Affizes held for the faid City and County, the ninth Day of August, 1712.

We are extreamly glad of all Opportunities of affuring Your Majefty of our fincere Loyalty, and Affection to the best of Queens. As fatal Neceffity once forc'd us to endure the utmost Calamities of War, in defence of our Religion and Constitution, so we are very sensible what Blessings all Your Subjects owe to Your Majelty, the Succession whole glorious Reign shall be Crown'd with a lasting and honourable Peace : Such a Peace as will hereafter, put it out of the Power of the moft am-bitious Prince, to attempt the Universal Monarchy of Europe, promote the Good of the Church by Law Eftablished, advance the Trade of Your Kingdoms, secure the Protestant Succession in the Illu-firious House of Hennover, as settled by Act of Parliament, and make it vain for any Popish Pretender (however a Sifted by any of Your Majefty's Foreign or Domeltick Enemies) to Usurp any of Your Titles, or ever attempt to Invade any part of Your Dominions. These we well know, and gratefully acknowledge, are the Bleffings Your Majefty always had at Your Royal Heart for Your People, and which we hope God Almighty will affift Your Majefty to obtain, in fpight of all Oppofition what-foever. We beg leave to conclude, by renewing, in the most Solemn Manner, all Assurances of our firm Loyalty to, and profound Respect for Your Majesty, whom we will ever ftedfaitly adhere to, and fland by with our Lives and Fortunes.

Wenice, Odober 7. N. S. On Monday laft Mon-fignor Mattei, the Pope's Nuntio, had a publick Audience in the College, where he notified his being Meal for their Subfiltance : Befides which, the admade Archbifhop of Fermo, and that he is to be fuel jacent Villages have been Summon'd to bring in Pro-

ceeded here by Mohfignor Aldobrandini, who is at present Nuntio at Naples. On Tuesday last Signor Venier, one of the Council of Ten, coming out of the Council before the others, waited in the Broglio for Signor Gabrieli, another Member of that Tribunal, against whom he had an old Quarrel, and whole Of-fice of Inquisitor of State was that Day expired. Venier struck Gabriell over the Face, then drew a Stiletto, which it is Death to carry in the great Council, and would probably have killed him, if feveral Gentlemen had not interpoled. Upon this Accident the Council of Tenvaffembled two Days after, where they refolved, that the Infult com-mitted by Signor Venier was not done to Signor Gabrieli as a private Person, but as Inquisitor of State. Whereupon a Proclamation was publickly read against him, and he was ordered to furrender himfelf in twenty four Hours. It is reported, that he hath withdrawn himfelf to day out of the Dominions of this State, and on Monday next the Council of Ten will publish a Sentence by which he will be condemn'd to Death, deprived of his Nobility, his Estate confiscated, a Stone of Infamy erected, and Ten thousand Ducats promised as a Reward to any Person that apprehends him.

Copenhagen, Ollober 8. N. S. The Danish Fleet is returning home, having been fome Days ago in a very yielent Storm. We have no Account yet of their having fuffered by it, and two Ships that were feparated from the reft are already come into this Harbour. It is faid, the Swedish Fleet is gone into Carlferoon. The Court of Holftein-Gottorp being informed that the Danish Forces are to be quarter'd. this Winter in the Bailiwicks belonging to that Duke, his Secretary here has fpoke about it to the King's Ministers, who difown there is any fuch De-fign, but at the fame time demand fufficient Security from the Court of Gottorp, that the Swe-difh Parties thall make no more Excursions into Holftein. The Ministers of Gottorp have returned answer, that Count Welling has assured the Administrator no more fuch Excursions shall be made, which is all the Security they can possibly give. The Danes infult this is not fufficient, and its fupposed they may make that a pretence to put their

Troops into Quarters in the Duke's Territories. Berlin, Ottober 15. N. S.
