To the QUEEN's most Excellent Majesty, The humble Address of Your Majesty's ancient and loyal Boroughs of Denbigh, Ruthin and Holt.

May it please Your Sacred Majesty,
THE Terms on which Your Majesty has told Your Parliament a Peace may be made, so fully answer all the Ends of Your Treaties and Alliances, are so honourable and advantageous to Your own Kingdoms, so grateful to every Heart, which is entirely English, and so suitable to the rest of Your Majesty's glorious and just Character, that we cannot tell which to admire most, Your extraordinary Wisdom and Steadiness in Procuring, or Your great Condescension and Goodness in Communicating them to Your People.

We have, not without some degree of Indignation, seen those Allies and those Subjects who lie under the strictest Ties of Amity and Duty, and who owe most of their present Grandeur to Your unparalleled Generosity and Bounty, with united Envy and concerted Malice, endeavouring to obstruct those prudent Negotiations You have enter'd into for the concluding a general Peace.

Were the greatest Instances of Friendship and Favour, of Protection and Assistance, capable of making proper Impressions on the Princes and States whose Titles and Dominions are so much increas'd by them, they could not chuse but join with us in rejoicing to see Your Majesty the Umpire of Europe, nor could they doubt but the Ballance of Power would be duly fixed, when the Scales are held in so just and Upright a Hand.

We, for our Parts, humbly beg of Your Majesty to proceed in this good Work, the happy Conclusion of which, we truly Long for; and that Your Majesty may enjoy an uninterrupted Share of those Blessings You are procuring for Your People, we earnestly pray that the God of Peace, who has abated the Pride and asswaged the Malice of Your declared Enemies, would, in his Mercy, vouchsafe also to confound the Devices of Your pretended Friends.

Genoa, Octob. 9. N. S. The British Consul here, has receiv'd Advice of the Cessation of Arms by Sea and Land, agreed on between Her Majesty and the Crown of France, with Orders to take care that the said Cessation be duly observed by all Ships that shall come to these Parts. The like Directions are sent to those residing at Leghorn and Naples. On Tuesday last the Superbe arrived here in six Days from Barcelona, and is to Sail for Port Mahon with the British Letters, as soon as they come in. They write from Spain, that General Wezel continues the Blockade of Girona, the Garrison and Inhabitants of which Place are in great Distress for want of Provisions.

Dantzick, Octob. 19. N. S. This Day General Kibinski went from hence to Marienburg, to review

some Troops, with which he is ordered, by the Great General, to take possession of Elbing, the Muscovites having given notice, that they are ready to evacuate that Place, as soon as the Poles appear. The Prince of Courland is returned hither, having been, as is supposed, Incognito at Berlin. We learn by Letters from Lemberg, that a Turkish Bey had been sent there by the Port, to examine whether the Muscovites had performed the Articles of their Treaty, in relation to Poland, and that he was return'd homewards very well satisfy'd with the Informations he had receiv'd from the General of the Crown. The Bey brought an Account there of a great Revolution which hath lately happened in Persia, the Sophi having been dethron'd by his younger Brother, and forc'd to take refuge in an Island belonging to the Grand Signor, who is resolv'd to take his part against his rebellious Subjects.

Hanover, October 21. N. S. Last Sunday the Prince of Bevern was married, at Brunswick, to the Princess Antonia, third Daughter of Prince Lewis of Wolfenbittel, and Sister to the Empress. The Wedding was private, contrary to the usual Method of that Court on the like Occasions. His Electoral Highness being now at Hitzaker, within a League of Gohre, two Deputies sent to him by the City of Hamburg are gone thither. Letters from Koningsberg bring an Account, that the Czar's Frigats have taken some small Swedish Vessels, and that the Muscovite Army, consisting of Fifteen thousand Men, which was encamped between Wybourg and Kexholm, had advanced a good way into the Country, and forced the Swedes to retire to Carelic, but, for want of necessary Subsistence, were obliged to return to their Camp. A considerable Number of English Horses for the use of King Augustus, have lately passed through this Place towards Dresden.

Berlin, October 22. N. S. The King having some time ago appointed Commissioners to examine what Desolation has been made by the Plague in Prussia, and to find out means of repairing the Losses his Country had sustained; Count Alexander Drona, President of the Commission, is come hither to give his Majesty an Account of what Progress they have made in the Matter referred to them. Count Wartemberg, late Great Chambellan, was Buried last Saturday in the Reformed Parochial Church, with great Pomp. Yesterday one of Her Majesty's Messengers arrived here, and this Day he proceeded towards Dantzick.
