THE following Address from the Burgh of *Culrofs*, was presented to Her Majesty by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Viscount *Dupplin*, being introduced by the Lord High Treasurer.

To the QUEEN'S most Excellent Majesty,
The humble Address of the Magistrates and Town-Council of the Burgh of *Culrofs*.

May it please Your Majesty!

WE Your Majesty's most Loyal and Faithful Subjects, the Magistrates and Town-Council of Your Burgh of *Culrofs*, within the County and Shire of *Perth*, being equally sensible of the Blessing of Peace, and the sad Effects of War, cannot (among others) omit to Congratulate Your Majesty, and to render our most humble and most hearty Thanks for Your Majesty's Care, in procuring to Your Nations the Satisfactory View of a Peace; which cannot fail by Your Majesty's Conduct, to afford Your Subjects all the Advantages proposed at the Undertaking this War, and to relieve them of the great and expensive Burdens thereof.

The making of Peace and War is Your Majesty's undoubted Prerogative; and Your victorious Arms shews where the Balance of *Europe* lies; so that what hath hitherto been the Motive of War, is now in Your Majesty's Power: And therefore we hope that Heaven shall bless Your Majesty with completing so great a Work, and that we shall never be wanting in our thankful Acknowledgments to God for so great a Mercy, nor in our dutiful Allegiance to Your Majesty.

Your Majesty's universal Care for all Your Dominions makes us Confident, that what concerns this remote Part of Your Realm, in the Negotiation of Peace, will not be omitted: And Your pious and constant Zeal for the Protestant Religion doth convince us, that Your Majesty will continue to take such Measures for securing to us a Protestant Successor, that when it shall please God to call Your Majesty from an Earthly to an Immortal Crown, we may still enjoy the Exercise of our Holy Religion, which is and ought to be dearer to us than any other Concern.

That God may grant Success to all Your Majesty's Undertakings, and a long and happy Reign to Your Majesty here, and that hereafter Your Memory may ever be Sacred, is and shall always be the Prayers of, may it please Your Majesty, Your Majesty's most Faithful, most Humble, and most Obedient Subjects and Servants.

Turin, Octob. 12. N. S. On the tenth Instant the Duke, with all the Court, remov'd from hence to the Venerie, where they intend to continue two Months, if the Weather will permit. Yesterday the Earl of Peterborough went thither to wait on his Royal Highness, and return'd in the Evening. The Imperial Generals, who have been here for some time, are now gone to their Posts at Livorno and Trino, at which Places the Troops are to remain till they march into their Winter Quarters.

Madrid, Octob. 13. N. S. On the fifth past, a Cessation of Arms by Sea and Land, between Great

Britain and Spain, was proclaim'd for four Months, to commence from the twenty second of last August. And soon after, in pursuance of the Treaty for the Cessation, an Order was publish'd to admit all British Ships to a free Trade, during the said Term of four Months, and to take off all Impositions laid upon the Goods of that Nation since the beginning of this War, which, it is said, amounted upon some to Seven, and upon others to Ten per Cent. The Cortes of these Kingdoms are to assemble here on the sixteenth, in order to pass a Law, to prevent this Monarchy from being ever united to that of France, and the Succession is to be settled on the Duke of Savoy's Family, as descended from the Infanta Donna Catharina, Daughter of King Philip the Second,

St. Augustin, (within six Leagues of *Madrid*) Octob. 17. N. S. The Lord Lexington is arrived at this Place, having been met by the Magistrates of every Town, through which he pass'd, and conducted by them through their several Districts. In all Places, he has been received with the highest Marks of Honour and Respect.

Hague, Nov. 2. N. S. On the 28th of the last Month, Count Sinzendorff and Baron Heems, were in Conference with the Deputies of the States General, in relation to the Affairs of the Spanish Netherlands. The States of Holland separated last Saturday, and are to meet again on the Ninth, and to receive the Project of the State of the War on the Twelfth. In the last Session they dispos'd of several Regiments, and other military Employments that were vacant. Prince Eugene arrived here this Day, and went immediately to the Earl of Albemarle's, where he is to lodge two or three Days, till a House he has taken for this Winter, is made fit to receive him.

Utrecht, Nov. 4. N. S. Several Ministers of the Allies, and those of France, are frequently in Conference with the Lord Privy Seal. Monsieur Marstal de Bieberstein, one of the Plenipotentiaries of Prussia, returned this Morning from Amsterdam, where he had been for a few Days. The Duke and Duchess of St. Pierre, came hither yesterday in the Evening from Brussels.

Windsor, Octob. 26. This Evening Count Fantoni, Envoy Extraordinary from the Duke of Guastalla, had his first private Audience of Her Majesty, to which he was introduced by the Rt. Hon. the Lord Viscount Bolingbroke, and conducted by Sir Clement Cotterell, Master of the Ceremonies.

In the Chapter which was held on the 26th, for electing Knights of the Garter, Sir William Oldes, Kt. was, by Her Majesty's Command, Sworn Gentleman-Usher of the Black Rod.

The Lords Commissioners of the Admiralty having, some time since, ordered the seven disabled Seamen undermentioned, to be entertained in Her Majesty's Royal Hospital at Greenwich as Pensioners, are pleas'd to give Notice, that if they do not apply themselves to Sir William Gifford, Kt. Governor of the aforesaid Hospital, within a Fortnight after the date hereof, other disabled Seamen will be entertained there in their rooms.
